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# Hilliardton Marsh hosts a chilly Christmas Bird Count

HILLIARDTON — It was a cold, windy day but enthusiasm was warm for the annual Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre's (HM-REC) annual Christmas Bird Count on January 4.

Little did Frank M. Chapman realize that when he started the Christmas Bird Count back on December 25, 1900, (to count birds instead of hunting them) that over a century later children and adults would be counting birds to help monitor their populations at the HMREC.

The Christmas Bird Count relies on citizens to count birds in their region and then become advocates for the protection of bird species.

The annual bird count took place from December 14, 2024, to January 5, 2025.

"What stood out for me was how much fun the day was and how happy every-

come to the Marsh," said HM-REC bird bander Bruce Murphy in an email interview.

"We are so lucky to get so many volunteers helping out and I really feel that Dennis

one always is when they Peddie from Cougar Ridge Farms always steals the show with his beautiful Belgium horse team and the ride around the Marsh. The other reaction is how hardy Northern kids still are on a cold day

and all I saw was rosy cheeks Temiskaming region. and big smiles from the kids."

The information garnered from the count lets conservationists and scientists track bird populations across Canada, including in the South

Despite the cold and windy weather, about 25 people showed up at the Marsh to help count 139 birds of 11 different species.

### EXTENSIVE DAMAGE

Fire, smoke and water damage to a house on North Quarry Road in North Cobalt was described as significant following a December 21 fire. Temiskaming Shores Fire Chief Steve Langford said there were people in the home at the time, and were alerted to the fire by a passerby. They escaped without injury, and two people have been displaced. Langford said the fire appears to have started in an attached garage. ### Chamberlain looks back and forward

CHAMBERLAIN TOWNSHIP -Chamberlain Township had a very busy year in 2024 as it worked to repair damage caused by a major April 12 rainstorm that dropped over 70 millimetres (about three inches) of rain over about a 24-hour period.

"We had seven or eight roads closed during that so it was a very hectic time getting culverts replaced and repairing the damage," said Reeve Kerry Stewart as he reflected in an interview looking back and forward for the municipality.

"We had declared a state of emergency during that time and that state of emergency is still in effect."

The state of emergency keeps the township in line for provincial funding support to offset expenses incurred in repairing the damage.

"We haven't received funding from the government for those repairs yet. We're hoping that it will be approved shortly and we'll get some funding to make up for what we had to do," said Stewart.

"Otherwise it looks like it might be an eight per cent increase in our tax budget if we have to cover that without dipping into our reserves. If we receive some government funding for that we should be alright."

The cost to do the repairs after the storm damage was between \$50,000 and \$55,000.

One private home in Chamberlain Township was damaged in the storm and the property owner there did receive funding assistance from the province, noted the explained Stewart.

### **PLANS FOR 2025**

The township has some plans for its roads and culverts in the year ahead, and will be continuing application of heavy gravel to selected

"It has been our plan to do two roads a year with good coatings of gravel and gradually we'll get everything up to date," Stewart said. "We've started using quarry gravel for a local pit in Chamberlain and we're really happy with the way it's compacting and building a good road base."

Last year about \$220,000 worth of quarry gravel was applied. That amount will be cut back slightly in 2025 "but we're still hoping to be able to get a good amount in place."

Only one bridge remains in the township hasn't recently been either completely renovated or reconstructed, and remaining bridge is still in good shape so the township is not anticipating any major expenses for the bridge in the near future.

However, there will be a couple of major culvert replacements that required, which Stewart hopes to have done in the next year or so.

The township's recreation committee has several new activities members and are being built up postpandemic.

Money has been received the Temiskaming Foundation and the township has plans to develop a community garden orchard on the recreation property near its hall, and develop it into a memorial orchard,

People will be invited to donate a fruit tree in memory of a loved one, said Stewart.

The hall itself is being well used for craft gatherings and other activities.

Englehart Minor Ball has been using the township's recently upgraded ballpark for slo-pitch practices.

There is also a set of playground equipment near-

The township still has plans to have washrooms, which will be accessible from outside, constructed at the hall.

"We're waiting on some funding applications," said Stewart.

The township uses the administration and public works services of Municipality of Charlton and Dack and Stewart says the township is "very satisfied" with that arrangement.

The township also works with other municipalities for the operation of the Earlton-Timiskaming Regional Airport, the Temiskaming Municipal Services Association, and the Central Temiskaming Planning Board, noted Stewart.

A funding application has been submitted to purchase a generator for the township hall so that it can serve as the secondary command centre for the emergency control group of the Town of Englehart, the Municipality of Charlton and Dack and Evanturel and Chamberlain townships.

Stewart noted that 2025 will see heavy work on Highway 11 as it's paved from Englehart north to the South Wye.

Here's to brighter days and taking care of each other.




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# The burden of sorrow

People on the Pacific west coast near Puget Sound have seen a mother killer whale carrying her deceased newborn calf for days on end.

This orca, named Tahlequah, lost another calf in 2018 and carried that calf with her for 17 days before letting go of it.

She has now clung on to her recently deceased calf travelling with it on her head, supported by other orcas in her pod.

When I saw a video of the orca holding onto the dead calf I immediately understood why she was doing it. And I comprehended how deep that pain goes.

It is primal.

Was she holding her baby on her head to show the human world that we must stop polluting the oceans with sewage, garbage and chemicals?

Orca calf mortality is high with only one in five pregnancies resulting in a calf that lives to its first birthday, says the Washington Centre for Whale Research.

I saw this type of loss exhibited when a mother loon was dragged off of her nest and killed on the day her two eggs were about to hatch.

Despite constant bombardment from people wanting to take photos of her, and an eagle dive-bombing her, she remained steadfast on the nest.

A predator - a fox, otter or racoon - dragged the mother loon off her nest in the early morning hours and killed her.

It was the saddest thing in the world to know that the mother was gone and the chicks were about to be born.

The chicks were then taken to an animal rehab facility and sadly did not survive.

But what happened next defied logic or human comprehension.

Upwards of 13 loons arrived on the lake and began wailing and wailing day and night.

At times they appeared to be scouring the shoreline searching for the mother loon in a funeral procession of sorts.

A scientist may scoff at the notion that animals exhibit emotions but I don't. We do not have the market cornered on grief.

Miscarriages, bereavement and bone-deep sadness of loss, that pain is a heavy burden to carry. orca, is literally carrying the burden of loss with her.

I recalled my own mother, who rarely spoke about it, but who dealt with the sorrow of several miscarriages.

I thought of Celine Ethier who has carried the heavy burden of her daughter's disappearance for over 28 years.

She is a beacon of strength.

And just recently a mom in our region is carrying the weight of her twin daughter's loss.

Anyone who had dealt with that type of loss deserves our utmost respect and kindness.

I think that all mothers or caregivers of children can relate to what Tahlequah is doing because grief is deep love.

There were 11 evening grosbeaks, of which 12 were colour banded. One common grackle, six blue jays, two ruffed grouse, four crows, two American goldfinch, eight American tree sparrows, five hairy woodpeckers, 20 black-capped chickadees and 40 white-winged crossbills.

Murphy said the story of the banding was the appearance of birds that should be in a more southern location, but for some reason are still here in the northeast.

"We banded eight American tree sparrows which should be near Lake Ontario and Lake Erie right now and

a lingering common grackle."

He mentioned the Marsh is part of a cooperative banding effort with the Finch Research Network.

"We are specifically interested in the movement of evening grosbeaks. Currently we are the only station in Canada as part of the project but we are excited to help out."

People could observe birds being banded, take a horse drawn sleigh ride and then make suet balls inside the visitor centre.

"A big thanks to all the parents and grandparents who brought their kids out to enjoy a great day at the Marsh," added Murphy.

# Snowmobiler dies after sled goes through ice

TEMAGAMI (Staff) - One person has died after the snowmobile they were riding went through the ice on Lake Temagami.

The body of the 82-yearold from Temagami was located January 7.

In a news release, Temiskaming OPP said police were contacted at about 4:15 p.m. the previous day when a snowmobiler failed to return home.

Temiskaming OPP and the Bear Island Police Service responded.

The search was assisted by the OPP Aviation Services, the Northeast Emergency Response Team and the Underwater Search Recovery Unit.

The investigation is continuing under the direction of the Office of the Chief Coroner and Forensic Pathology Service.

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# Coleman Township had a good 2024, looking forward to '25

COLEMAN TOWNSHIP -Looking back at the past year, Coleman Township's mayor said it was a good

year, with the confidence that 2025 will bring the same goodness to the township.

"Generally was a very good year for us," said Mayor Dan Cleroux in a sit-down

interview at The Speaker.

"Our council functions very well with little arguing or no arguing at all. We discuss items accordingly and move on to the next agenda item."

He said a big factor in what the township does has to do with the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) assessment process, which is supposed to take place every four years.

MPAC is a provincial non-profit corporation that does property assessments and shares those values with municipalities so they can determine property taxes and education taxes. Property assessments have been put on pause for the last few years.

"It was kind of a different year, there were no MPAC assessments. We have not been given new assessment numbers last year, which caught us off guard. At the end of the day we had to increase our taxes by two per cent. It is the first time since


I have been (mayor) there was a raise in taxes. This time around MPAC did not give us new numbers."

### **OFFICIAL PLAN**

Cleroux said there are no big, new projects on the go

in the township, but the biggest thing to stand out for all residents is the Official Plan, which will implemented in 2025.

"With the township seeing a lot of building per-



"The township has large lots and what do we do if someone wants to build not one but two homes on those lots? We will take a serious look at that and some bylaws will be created with the Official Plan approval. We need the community to become engaged in the process because it affects everyone."

He mentioned the township's planners will be at the municipal office on January 16 to present the Official Plan and to hear feedback from council and residents.

"This is a main event in the township and we look forward to seeing residents take part."

is asking municipalities to look for more green energy opportunities and the township will be part of a plan to use the power from the Latchford power dam.

"Back about three or four years ago we had an agreement with the First Nation communities of Temiskaming and Temagami and we were working with Latchford to look at what can be done with the dam and power output. New guidelines have come out so we are taking a second look at this opportunity," he

"We have our feasibility study done already. Former Latchford mayor George Lefebvre knows a lot about this project and perhaps Latchford will bring him on board to share his knowledge. This is very important for Latchford. They could lean on him a bit as he has the background on the project."

The mayor said he hopes they can move forward on this project and bring back some positive news for everyone involved in the coming months.

**BASS LAKE** 

The Bass Lake park is Coleman Township's crowning jewel as a recreation destination.

The mayor said they have intentions to repave the Bass Lake road but that takes a great deal of money.

"The park is generally in good shape and it is always a project that we want to improve to make sure people go to Bass Lake and have a fun day and a safe one. We don't have arenas or baseball fields but we have Bass Lake and we are fortunate to have it."

### **INTERNET ACCESS**

He said he knows there has been a new tower put up in the township that can provide internet access, but most people prefer to use the Starlink service, which seems to work for residents.

"For us the difficulty is in our trees and it is hard to get a signal when there are so many trees."

### **ROADS**

Mayor Cleroux said they will wait until the 2025 budget figures are assessed before deciding what new roadwork, if any, will be done in the coming year.

"We want to wait until our next the mayor. budget in 2025. We will keep on working with Miller Paving and we have meetings with them to improve and maintain our roads. The township has over 100 kilometres of roads."

### **MINING ACTIVITY**

The township has been informed of mining activity taking

"We do have some new mining activity in the area and SMC and Agnico-Eagle are doing well. Some drilling is taking place with good results. We meet twice a year with Agnico and they inform us of what areas they are working

He mentioned the township has a good relationship with the Cobalt Historical Society (CHS) with councillor Marilyn Lubbock as the council liaison for that organization.

The Society oversees the upkeep of the Heritage Silver Trail. Most of its sites are found in Cole-

### The township's new recycling

program, mandated by the provincial government, will take effect on April 1.

The program will see new recycling bins put out once every two weeks.

The landfill will have a bin set aside for hazardous waste, noted

"Our landfill has a new attendant who is doing a great job. We will have a hazardous waste bin for paint cans, florescent light bulbs, electronic waste, batteries and any hazardous materials. It will be emptied on a regular basis."

The township's landfill has a long lifespan with regular inspections done every few years.

The mayor also said the township will once again be hiring summer students.

### **GOOD SHAPE**

Overall he said the township is doing well financially with money in the bank.

"We are on target with our budget projections and we are keeping an eye on possible provincial and or federal elections as things governments change when change. We always look towards cost-cutting without affecting our residents. In other words we are working towards doing things more efficiently."

The mayor praised his office staff and public works staff saying they are helping to fulfill the township's mandate.

He saved special praise for the chief administrative officer.

"Our CAO, Chris Oslund and his staff of office administration, public works and fire department including summer part-time employees are functioning very well under his leadership."



### From the March 1 issue: COBALT COUNCIL WILL MEET ONCE EVERY FOUR WEEKS

COBALT - Cobalt council has agreed to try a system for the next year that does not include committee-of-thewhole meetings.

Councillors have agreed to meet once every four weeks, unless a pressing situation occurs, in which case an emergency meeting will be called.

Coleman's chief administrative officer Chris Oslund informed council of the successful funding application at the February 26 meeting of council.





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
