Donation powering Branch 629 energy efficiency

LATCHFORD - It hosts dart games and sports viewing parties, spaghetti suppers and dances, baby showers and karaoke nights.

Branch 629 of the Royal Canadian Legion in Latchford is a busy place.

However, it needed some help to make some repairs to cut its heating bill.

The Frog's Breath Foundation came through with \$37,000. The addition of spray foam insulation to the attic has begun, and the roof will be replaced when the weather is suitable.

Branch 629 is "a very important part of the community," said Susi Johanson, president of the foundation's board.

Like many Legions in small communities, she said it's one of the few places where people can get together.

The support is appreciated, said branch president Victoria Gray-Wilks.

She said members are working hard to raise money to upgrade the building, a former school purchased by the branch in the 1980s.

"We're trying to extend the life of the building and lower our operating costs," said Brenda Mosher, who oversees the branch's fundraising and grant

Longer term plans include new siding, new windows and doors, more insulation in the walls, and an extended kitchen.

Johanson hoped that the broader community would support the branch's efforts.

While the branch is a social hub, Gray-Wilks said it also pays tribute to area residents who have served and continue to serve in the Canadian armed forces.

On February 23, it's hosting a commemoration of the 80th anniversary of the death of Aubrey

Cosens, for whom branch is named. Cosens was posthumously awarded a Victoria Cross for his role in capturing a German position described as vital to the success of future operations.

FUNDRAISING

When it comes fundraising, Gray-Wilks said the branch is restricted in the use of proceeds from some specific initiatives.

Proceeds from the annual poppy campaign and sales of pull-apart Nevada tickets support veterans and their families, charitable initiatives coordinated by the broader Legion organization, and notfor-profit organizations.

Last year, Branch 629 gave \$5,500 to local charities.

It made \$1,000 donations to the Temiskaming Hospital Foundation, Northern Animals

Christmas Wish, the Cobalt, Latchford Coleman, Area Food Bank, and the school nutrition fund at The Temiskaming Foundation, and also donated \$500 to the Cobalt Veterans Cemetery.

To raise money for itself, the branch routinely hosts special events, and its hall is available for rentals.

Gray-Wilks said it wants to include the entire community in its activities.

A recently acquired pool table, for example, has proven popular. She said the branch has organized pool-related games for less experienced players, and veteran players are happy to teach younger people how to play.

What is Glaucoma?

Glaucoma is a chronic progressive eye disease characterized by a degeneration of the optic nerve. This can lead to serious vision loss if not detected and treated early. Glaucoma is one of the leading causes of blindness in Canada.

Who Gets Glaucoma?

Glaucoma most often occurs in people over the age of 40. There is also a greater risk of developing glaucoma when you have diabetes, high blood pressure or a history of eye inju-

Will You Go Blind from Glaucoma?

If diagnosed at an early stage, eyedrops and laser treatment can control glaucoma and little or no further vision loss should occur. If eyedrops are prescribed, they must be used always to control the eye pressure. If left untreated, peripheral vision is affected first, followed by central vision loss during late stages of the disease. Complete blindness may occur.

How is Glaucoma Detected?

A thorough eye examination is the first step to detecting glaucoma. Your optometrist will do a simple and painless procedure called tonometry during your routine eye exam, which measures the internal pressure of your eye.

How is Glaucoma Treated?

Treatment will depend on the type, severity and progress of the disease. It cannot be cured, but it can be controlled with daily eyedrops. Laser surgery is also an effective way to control glaucoma and maintain your remaining vision.

In more complicated cases, surgery may be needed to completely bypass the eye's natural drainage system. Once vision is lost due to glaucoma, it cannot be restored. This is why regular preventive eye exams with your optometrist are important.

How Often Should You Have an Eye Exam?

Most eye care professionals recommend a comprehensive eye exam every one to two years, depending on your age, risk factors and whether you currently wear eyeglasses or contact lenses. Children need regular eye exams to detect vision problems that may interfere with learning.

Perhaps if Ford wins another term in office we will have the government we deserve after this election taking place in the coldest month of the year.


And let us not forget Doug Ford was overheard saying he was happy Donald Trump became president.

After the death of my parents, a broken marriage and my daughter off to discover Europe, I needed to find me.

The silence and solitude of the outdoors helped me deal with loss. Being out on the land like that showed me a level of joy that was off the charts.

And being a Northerner, it

came easily to me to connect with the land.

It was once said, "If you pay attention to the land where you live, you enter into conversation with it, until it becomes a voice inside you, and some of the boundaries between you and it dissolve."

I felt like I was dissolving into the land in a good way and still do when I am out in my canoe.

Like no other vehicle, a canoe can transport you to another dimension, not found with cellphones, tablets or video games.

There are millions of people giving over their lives to machines that help them do their thinking for them.

Hey, Alexa, what time is

There are far too many people afraid to be alone with their own thoughts.

To me, that kind of alone-

ness and silence is the magic elixir to a hurried, harried life.

Silence and solitude really are the door to the temple and a kind of divinity.

In all that connecting to the land, somewhere along the line I developed a spirituality within myself, which I believe led me to have increased compassion for others.

I maintain that troubled youth need to be taken out on the land and they will surely be changed in positive ways.

I take comfort in the absolute joy I feel when I hear the sound of a loon calling for its mate in the early morning hours on a glass-like lake.

The pursuit of happiness is overrated - just step outside!







Cobalt's animal control bylaw under review

COBALT - Cobalt council is looking at updating its animal control bylaw.

At its February 4 council meeting, council opened a discussion on its bylaw and the registration of dogs and

Mayor Angela Adshead asked council members to bring some ideas to the March 4 council meeting toward updating the bylaw.

The existing animal control bylaw is "very outdated and it definitely needs a fresh outlook," she said.

The public is also being invited to review the town's bylaw on its website, which outlines regulations for the keeping of animals, and provides specified regulations for various species.

Town manager/clerk treasurer Steven Dalley added that the public can also reach out to the town office and provide suggestions on all of its bylaws.

One idea Adshead raised at the February 4 meeting was to add a regulation regarding the minimum square footage for indoor spaces where animals are kept "so that animals aren't crammed into very small places. It does not make for a happy animal and it makes for a dangerous animal," she said.

The question would be "how many animals in what size residence," Councillor Pat Anderson said.

"If you just have a small apartment you should be more limited. If you just have a room you should be even more limited. That's been a problem for the animals."

Adshead pointed out that if the building code imposes a minimum square footage for people, there should also be

a minimum square footage for housing animals.

"Everybody deserves problem here and to me it's a companionship but it should be geared to how you live as well," she continued.

> Adshead said she also wants introduce regulations regarding the keeping of

exotic animals, and while that is currently a matter controlled by provincial governance, she said Latchford has been looking into the matter with legal counsel on its goal of being able to regulate having exotic animals.


