TLA tackling invasive species

TEMAGAMI - Volunteers within the Temagami Lakes Association (TLA) are planning on removing a patch of phragmite plants near the Lake Temagami Access Road this summer.

TLA president Nicole Brooker approached Temagami council April 10 to outline the project and ask for the municipality's support with the project, such as donation of tools, signage and tarping.

Brooker spoke to council about the TLA's efforts to identify and respond if possible to any invasive species that have reached the Temagami area.

Along with the patch of phragmites near the Lake Temagami Access Road, there is another larger patch of the invasive species at Jumping Caribou Lake between Temagami and Marten River. The organization has been advised that patch will need government involvement.

The TLA has also pointed out Eurasian water milfoil is growing by the town docks in Temagami. Removal is expected to take place in spring 2026.

Brooker also mentioned to council the presence of the spiny water flea in the lake, as well as the banded mystery snail, and spoke about washing

stations for boats and canoes.

In a later telephone interview she said the TLA first became involved with identifying invasive species about 2018.

She said a past board member was "quite proactive when it came to invasive species" and the board member investigated the area and "was alarmed at what she saw. She could see the invasives in and around the lake that we may not have been aware of."

With the assistance of the Federation of Ontario Cottage Associations, a billboard was erected on the Lake Temagami Access Road by Highway 11, along with several smaller signs at various locations in the municipality to remind boaters to drain, clean and dry their boats.

TAKING OVER HABITAT

The phragmites can take over the area where cat-tails and bulrushes previously grew, she explained. Diligence is needed in removing it.

"It'll take a good three to four years to be able to eradicate that," said Brooker, adding that Temagami First Nation land guardians have also identified patches of phragmites in the backcountry of the Temagami area.

She said a proposal has also been made to the Temagami municipality "to see if we can get some

A Pope of the people

Pope Francis has passed away at age 88.

His 12-year papacy brought in a more welcoming Catholic Church, taking a step aside

from the doctrinal ways of the church to focus on the poor and the marginalized.

When he took the name Francis, as the new Pope, he

wanted to directly connect with people and he certainly did that.

He came to Canada in 2022 to apologize to Indigenous victims of Canada's church-run residential schools.

Perhaps this was a defining and healing moment for Canada's Indigenous peoples and, then again, maybe it wasn't for so many.

He said the system had carried out a cultural genocide and few can argue with that.

He ushered in several firsts, being the first Pope from Latin America and the first from the Jesuit order.

On the subject of LGBTQ2S he was asked by a reporter in June of 2013, what his views on gay marriage were.

He said, "If a person is gay and seeks God and his goodwill, who am I to judge."

He called laws that criminalized homosexuality "unjust."

Perhaps more of us could emulate his holiness in our acceptance of people who are marginalized and who have been systemically abused.

The Pontiff was the first Pope to appoint women to senior Vatican positions and give voting rights to female participants of a global church gathering.

He also changed laws to allow women to have greater roles during mass.

He did, however, remain steadfast in his opposition to women being ordained as priests, while other churches

have long since moved on from that mindset.

Francis was the first Pope to raise awareness that the church was about more than the European-Mediterranean culture and that it was a global entity, important to Catholics around the world.

If ever there was a Pope who was the most likely to be seen sitting at a diner late at night, buying someone a cup of coffee and offering kindness to a lost soul, it was Francis.

We remember when the world was so enchanted with the new Pope who seemed so deeply Christian and able to relate to everyday people.

Requiescat in pace, Francis.

paddler stations done because often these invasives only get into the backcountry through canoeists, so these paddler stations are critical for keeping these things out of the backcountry."

She said the objective is to have four paddler stations, but they will not be available until September, after most of the canoe season is over.

She explained the volunteers will be starting work to remove the phragmites in July when the plants are developing seeds and are at their weakest. The volunteers will be carefully snapping the phragmites off below the waterline, working not to allow any part of the plant to break off, and placing the plants in bags and then either burning them or leaving them in bags on land until they are dead. The volunteers will go back at the end of August to cut down whatever remains. The process will be repeated in the years ahead until the site is cleared.

EURASIAN WATER MILFOIL

Eradicating the Eurasian water milfoil requires the use of heavy tarps to smother the plant when the ice is pulling away from the shore at the beginning of the spring season.

"I think we can have that ready for next year," said Brooker.

The tarps have to be left in place for six to eight weeks, she said.

The milfoil, which can be found at the town docks, is a small fern used in aquariums, Brooker said.

"It's very prolific and it has pretty much taken over the town docks.... In order to eradicate that

particular weed we need to get approvals from different government associations to work in the water," she explained.

The volunteers will be attempting to convey the message to boaters to check their boats before leaving the docks to ensure they aren't carrying any part of the weed back over the lake.

"Invasives in and of themselves aren't bad if they're managed," she said.

Don't allow an invasive species to spread, she said.

She explained that Lake Temagami is a protected lake for the lake trout fishery. She continued that some invasive species can warm the water.

"The lake trout is a cold water fish so you don't want the temperature in our lakes increasing in and around Temagami. Temagami has well over 40 lake trout lakes that they have to protect."

She pointed out that it is not just boats and canoes that may be introducing invasive species into an area, but construction equipment as well.

She also added that invasive species are not just a problem for one municipality.

"Highway 11 goes up into Northern Ontario and back to Nipigon. There's all sorts of ways for these invasives to spread throughout the province."

She added that municipalities depend highly on tourism "so it's incumbent upon us to keep our lakes pristine, clean and drinkable as much as we can."

RFP issued for Temagami North water infrastructure

TEMAGAMI - Temagami council has given its approval for staff to issue a Request for Proposals for maintenance and monitoring of water system infrastructure in Temagami North.

At its March 27 meeting, council and staff discussed the need for a set of immediate, system-focused maintenance and monitoring measures aimed at addressing vulnerabilities in the system. Leakage and storm water infiltration have been identified in the area, according to a staff report.

Maintenance and monitoring are needed to keep the infrastructure safe and in

reliable working condition, according to staff.

The recommendations are for leak detection and repair, sewer camera inspections, Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition system upgrades to improve monitoring and early warning, and public education and water conservation efforts to reduce demand on the system.

An initial estimate for all the projects together is \$245,000, council was advised.

Currently, the status of the water system means that there could be only six new water connections and 53 new sewer connections.

Council discussed the possible need for system looping in the area, but Mayor

Dan O'Mara suggested the cost for that project could be about \$3 million.

Chief administrative officer Laala Jahanshahloo expressed support for the work to improve maintenance and monitoring of the system, saying doing so could free up some of the capacity in the area.

FONOM urges new government focus on Northern transportation

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) - A Northeastern Ontario municipal organization is urging the province's re-elected Progressive Conservative government to apply a Northern focus to transportation.

The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) is asking Premier Doug Ford to appoint a deputy minister or associate minister of transportation specifically responsible for the North.

"It is essential to recognize

that transportation responsibilities in southern and northern Ontario involve vastly different approaches and planning," wrote Danny Whalen, the federation's president and a Temiskaming Shores councillor, in an April 2 letter to the premier.

The federation represents 110 municipalities across the Northeast.

In his letter, Whalen said he frequently engages with Northern municipal representatives on their interactions

with the Ministry of Transportation.

"The overwhelming response from our members indicates that their concerns are often overlooked or addressed slowly," he said.

"This situation stems mainly from Ontario's vast geographical size and the extensive area the north represents. Factors such as weather conditions, traffic patterns, inattentive drivers, regional differences in highway maintenance, and the lack of accountability in

commercial motor vehicle driver training contribute to the public's ongoing fears when using our highways."

The creation of a new deputy minister or associate minister of transportation responsible for the North "could enhance the effectiveness of the current duties," he wrote.

He said the federation is "eager to work with you and your government to explore ways to reduce the high rates of fatalities and accidents on our highways."

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Heart Failure Society says “it’s not normal to be breathless”

OTTAWA (Special) - The Canadian Heart Failure Society (CHFS) is marking the seventh annual National Heart Failure Awareness Week from May 4-10 in Canada at a time when heart disease has become one of the fastest growing cardiovascular conditions in the world.

The society has joined forces with several national organizations to create free toolkits for patients, caregivers, and healthcare providers aimed to assist in the prevention, detection, and management of heart disease.

New data from the Public Health Agency of Canada reveals a troubling rise in cardiovascular disease across

Canada. This year alone, an estimated 120,000 Canadians will be diagnosed with heart failure. More than 800,000 people aged 40 and older live with heart failure. Heart failure touches one in three people in Canada, either because they have it themselves or because it affects a family member or close friend. Yet, just as many Canadians do not know that heart failure is on the rise.

Dr. Justin Ezekowitz, president of the CHFS, emphasized the significance of National Heart Failure Awareness Week.

“While we’ve made tremendous progress in preventing, diagnosing,

and managing heart disease, the rise in heart failure cases highlights the urgent need for continued awareness, education, and action. At the Canadian Heart Failure Society, we remain committed to informing Canadians about the warning signs of heart disease to help save lives.”

Now, Canadians can access free tools and resources to inform themselves about the signs and symptoms of heart failure, tips for managing existing heart failure, tips to prepare for healthcare visits, and when to seek emergency medical care. CHFS has partnered with the Canadian Cardiovascular Society (CCS), Cana-

an Council of Cardiovascular Nurses (CCCN), Canadian Association of Cardiovascular Prevention and Rehabilitation (CACPR), Canadian Heart Function (CHF) Alliance, Heart & Stroke, HeartLife Foundation and Ted Rogers Centre for Heart Research to provide toolkits and helpful resources for the general public, for healthcare providers and for people living with heart failure.

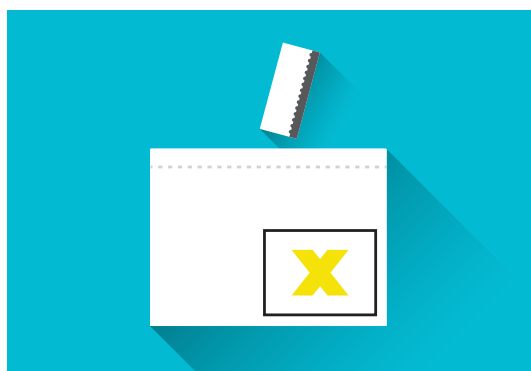
