May is Bladder Cancer Awareness Month

DID YOU KNOW?

- There are more than 80,000 Canadians living with bladder cancer
- Bladder cancer is the fifth most common cancer in Canada
- 8,700 Canadians will be diagnosed with bladder cancer this year
- The biggest warning sign of bladder cancer is blood in the urine
- Smoking is a common risk factor, as are age and work related exposure to specific chemicals

SYMPTOMS:

The most common symptom of bladder cancer is blood in the urine. The colour may vary from pale yellow-red to bright or rusty red. Blood may always be in the urine, or it may come and go. Sometimes the blood can only be seen with a microscope or found with other urine tests.

Other symptoms include:

- The need to pee often (also called urinary frequency)
- An intense need to pee (also called urinary urgency)
- Trouble peeing
- A burning sensation or pain when you pee
- Back, pelvic or groin pain

Because the disease may have progressed unnoticed, it is critical to see a health care provider once you begin to experience symptoms. Since many symptoms are similar to other medical conditions, bladder cancer is often misdiagnosed as, for example, a urinary tract infection. If you are concerned, ask your health care provider for a referral to a urologist to rule out bladder cancer.

If you are having symptoms, please call to schedule an appointment with your primary care provider. It may very well not be bladder cancer, but these symptoms could be the result of a urinary tract infection which will also need to be diagnosed and treated accordingly.

vention Month comes to a close, let's think about the issue of sexual assault,

As Sexual Assault Pre- the criminality behind it and how we can prevent it from happening in our communities.

In Canada, one in three women and one in six men will experience sexual violence at some point in their lives.

Sexual violence can happen to anyone at anytime and we need to be thinking about the root causes of sexual violence and how to prevent it from happening.

And to also ask the criminal justice system to hold perpetrators accountable for their actions.

Gender-based violence is rooted in misogyny, racism, and inequality.

We must also support the victims of sexual violence in our communities

with services and programs aimed at helping them overcome trauma. Sexual violence cannot be tolerated and it must come with clear consequences. Playing out right now in a London Ontario court room is the issue of sexual violence involving five Team Canada Junior hockey players allegedly assaulting one woman in a hotel room in 2018. The trial provides an opportunity for us to think about the issue of consent and it being truly and freely given. What is healthy and what is not healthy consent? And let us seek out education about consent being delivered in classrooms and in homes across the country. Police report sexual violence is on the rise in Canada with the prevalence higher for women over men, and more in certain groups like Indigenous women and people with disabilities. The United Nations has identified sexual violence as one of the most severe human rights violations globally. Tapping into survivor-led approaches to bring about change in shaping policies to prevent the violence might be a good idea.

How about we contact our MPP or MP and ask that Canada take a strong stance against the use of starvation in war-


There are various organizations, such as www.doctorswithoutborders.ca, where you can donate funds to to help feed and heal the children.

Conservative MP named co-chair of leader's growth council

OTTAWA (Special/Staff) – The newly elected MP representing Kapuskasing-Timmins-Mushkegowuk has been named a co-chair of the Conservative Party's new economic council.

The appointment of MP Gaétan Malette to the Conservative Party's Leader's Economic Growth Council was announced May 20.

In a news release, the party said the council will "identify the root causes of Canada's economic stagnation and propose practical solutions to unleash the country's full economic potential and bring it back from its position as the economic laggard of the developed world."

The council will be chaired

by Calgary Centre Conservative MP Greg McLean. Malette and Nova Scotia's Rick Perkins, who was defeated in his bid for re-election, were identified as co-chairs.

The party said council members will be selected from all ranges of sectors and regions, and will include entrepreneurs, business leaders, labour leaders, innovators, inventors, knowledge leaders, Indigenous leaders and leaders in non-profit industries.

It said the council's goals are two-fold – "greater buying power with earnings that rise faster than prices, so Canadians get better living standards," and "more growth to fund stronger defence and

borders and better social programs."

Its key findings are planned for presentation at the 2026 Conservative Party National Convention.

Malette has also been named the Conservatives' associate shadow minister for natural resources (mining and forestry).

Property owners encouraged to be FireSmart

TEMAGAMI - Property owners are being encouraged to become familiar with the guidelines provided by the FireSmart program.

Temagami council received a presentation from Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) fire advisor Ken Cox recently outlining the benefits of the program.

Temagami Fire Chief Jim

Sanderson said in a later interview that the FireSmart quidelines are important everywhere, and not just in Temagami.

The MNR has created a discussion paper titled "Modernizing Ontario's Wildland Fire Management," said Sanderson, and it has been projected that "the fire season will lengthen by more than 20 days by 2040. Ontario's expected to increase nearly 50 per cent in the wildfire occurrences in comparison with the number recorded prior to 1990. The average area burned will increase signifi-

The FireSmart program encourages property owners to remove fine combustible materials, like bark and brush, away from the sides of buildings, creating a two-metre

Woodpiles and similar materials, like piles of lumber, should be ten metres from the building (at least 33 feet). Beyond that, evergreen tree branches should be pruned to be at least two metres from the ground, and trees should be at least three metres apart.

Within the municipality, residential campfires are allowed in the evening, but larger bonfires and brush burning require a permit, and have conditions.

In Temagami, there are bylaws to consider that protect the skyline, and the new official plan for the municipality contains regulations addressing those guidelines. More can be determined by visiting the municipality's website.

The new official plan "starts to lay out how Temagami's dealing with the FireSmart principles within the context of protecting the visual and environmental integrity of the lakes."

Sanderson said the pillars for fire management are public education, prevention, mitigation and suppression.

The goal is to do as much as possible in those areas in order to not have situations which require suppression, he explained.

FIRE CAUSES

Roughly 50 per cent of forest fires are caused by lightning strikes that can't be prevented, he said, but human-caused fires can be prevented through education. Homeowners can take steps to help protect their properties if there are ever any fires burning in the area, he add-

The downtown area of Temagami and the townsite area in Temagami North have fire hydrants, but outside those areas, the fire department's ability to fight structure fires is dependent on water availability, such as nearby lakes. The fire department's two fire trucks can carry water to the scene - one has a capacity to carry 800 gallons and the other has the capacity to carry 285 gallons. The Marten River Fire Department also has two fire trucks - one with a 500-gallon capacity and the other with a 250-gal-Ion capacity. Once that water is used, the fire truck can refill at a nearby lake using its portable pumps, or it must be driven to the nearest location where it can refill.



Hilliardton Marsh celebrates Migratory Bird Day

HILLIARDTON — As a large flock of sandhill cranes flew overhead delighting birders with their loud dinosaur-like calls, people interested in birding were glad they had also flocked to the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre (HMREC) last Saturday where they were able to witness birds being banded, see aquatic life, take part in a nest-building event, see a attoo demonstrations and more.

The Migratory Bird Day celebration usually takes place on the second week of May, but this year inclement weather pushed the event to Saturday, May 24. The event had approximately 70 people in attendance, and featured educational activities designed to allow young and

old to understand bird behaviour, identify species of birds and understand conservation efforts around birds.

World Migratory Bird Day is a United Nations initiative recognizing the importance of birds as key indicators of the health of the environment, and was first initiated in 2006.

Kids could build a bird nest out of various supplied materials. They could see what a robin's nest with the pale blue eggs looks like.

Marsh bander, Joanne Goddard received a bird tattoo designed by one of her students at Kerns Public School.

Adults and children could witness birds being banded and learn about the species, and were able to hold the birds, feel their heart beat and admire their striking plumage before releasing them back into the surround-

ing forest.

An interesting and rare bird that was banded on the day included a black-billed cuckoo. This was the second time that this species has been banded this year at the Marsh, noted bander Mike Vratsinas.

Tennessee warblers, bay breasted warblers, yellow warblers, red-eyed vireos, tree and barn swallows and even a rare cliff swallow were among the winged visitors to the Marsh.

Overall the birds banded so far this spring number over 1,500 with over 60 species identified.

The next event on the Marsh schedule is the Paint N' Sip, a fundraiser for the Temiskaming Art Gallery and the Hilliardton Marsh on May 31, running from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The entry fee is \$40 per person. Contact the Marsh or Art Gallery to register.

CUCKOOS NEW TO MARSH




