Putting faces to highway accident experiences

DISTRICT - Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof is working to raise awareness that highway safety is about more than statistics, it's about people.

He and his staff are asking the public to send them their stories about their experiences on the highway where they were involved in accidents or close calls.

Since he was first elected as MPP in 2011, he has been pushing the issue of improved safety for northern highways.

However, "there's more to this than statistics," he said in a telephone interview.

To make that point, he and his staff are looking for stories to "put faces to what happens" on the highways, and "to put the focus on people."

He and his staff are doing a number of things to continue to raise awareness in an effort to get action on improvements.

He explained that winter road maintenance was the first big issue that he and his staff worked on.

"It was obvious that what the contracts stipulated wasn't what people were experiencing."

They created the Northern Road Report to allow drivers to report to them so that he had data available to back up his statements when he brought

> up the need for road maintenance improvements to the Ministry of Transportation of Ontario (MTO), along with specific cases compiled by his staff from reports from the public.

> That helped, he said, and more equipment was made available on the roads.


John Vanthof But the need for improving highway safety is a constant issue, he said, and obstacles on the road are changing.

"It's becoming much more complex."

Along with road maintenance and road infrastructure, there are more commercial and passenger vehicle drivers, he noted. The number of commercial vehicles on Highway 11 has grown to almost 2,000 daily.

As an MPP for a vast northern riding, Vanthof drives regularly on the highway and related that he has experienced four near accidents himself where he ended up on the side of the road to catch his

More powers for mayors

The Ontario government has just announced they extending "strong mayor powers" to 169 municipalities in the province to supposedly jump start housing initiatives.

The new powers means mayors can push through legislation without majority support of their councils and hire and fire upper tier staff.

This power push could be viewed as dangerous because we have seen too many high priced In-Commissioner tegrity reports whereby mayors and councillors have inappropriately acted towards staff and other council members.

And when a mayor does not like a decision made by their council, or staffers, they can now override those decisions.

That could very well weaken councils by reducing the influence of elected councillors.

Who is going to want to run for council seats if their voice is not heard and their decisions are trumped by a mayor?

Who is going to want to work in an environment where they are told their opinions do not matter?

The mayor of Kirkland Lake, Stacey White, has come out opposed to the strong mayor powers as she said it is an affront to democracy.

Democracy is the best system of municipal,

provincial and federal governance available to us.

However worthy the goal, we are not convinced that mayors who can run roughshod over councils and staff is a good idea.

The question is: Will the mayors use those newfound powers?

We hope the answer is

Mayors and councils that work together for the greater good of all and respect each other's decisions work best in a municipal democracy.

The Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) did a study on homelessness. It said Ontario is at tipping point for its homelessness crisis and more than 80,000 Ontarians were known to be homeless in 2024.

Without action and intervention, that number could double in the next decade.

The homelessness crisis originates from decades of underinvestment in affordable housing, mental health and addiction services.

But it isn't the sexy tariff issue of the day is it?





breath, thinking about how close it had been for him. Almost everyone in Northern Ontario can tell a story about a close situation they experienced on the highway, he said.

"The statistics bear it out." One statistic he cites regularly is that "if your car is registered in the district of Timiskaming and if it's involved in an accident, it's four times more likely to be fatal as anywhere else in the province."

He said that is a very sobering statistic.

However, he and his staff want to put faces to the problem, and they are asking anyone with a story to contact Vanthof's office at 705-647-5995 or by email at jvanthof-co@ndp.on.ca.

The information will be compiled and shared and, if they have permission from the people, some videos may also be put on Facebook.

"This issue is an ongoing issue," Vanthof said.

"We are continuing to push on the Northern Road Safety Strategy."

He said solid recommendations have been made to the government and he is going to continue to push for those recommendations to be implemented.

The current strategy though is "to put a face to the problem."

Armstrong considers funding of lift

ARMSTRONG TOWNSHIP

Armstrong Township council is faced with an expensive undertaking, which is to replace the lift at the municipal building even though it

received little use during the years it was functioning.

The township has set a portion of the needed money into reserves, and wants to review the other needs in the township before it commits further this year.

Speaking at council's April 15 meeting, Councillor Michele Rivard said the township is still working toward getting a new lift, but no commitment was made to do it this year.

Armstrong chief administrative officer Dan Thibeault said quotes of \$87,000 and \$88,000 have been received for the project.

There are two lifts in Armstrong. Thibeault said the lift at the recreation centre was repaired for \$5,300.

Councillor Dan Perreault noted that the lift at the municipal building does not get used often.

"Equipment like that, you have to consider that if it's not used it's going to seize up and it's going to stop working." The township will have to be paying someone to service it to keep it working, he noted. A professional will be required to inspect and maintain it, he continued.

Thibeault said the lift at the municipal building was broken before his employment at the township. He has been with Armstrong since October 2022. In the years the lift was working, it was used three times, it was pointed out.

The council mulled over the dilemma of the lift replacement and its high cost while at the same time being faced with other needs in the township which would be used by more residents.

Rivard expressed the preference to see fundraising efforts made for the lift, along with the township's contribution.

Perreault noted the high cost of the project and the fact that it has not been well used in the past.

Thibeault pointed out that the other township lift, located at the arena, is regularly used.

Perreault acknowledged the benefit of the lift at the arena which attracts people, and brings in rental money for its spaces.

Thibeault noted that the lift at the municipal building is more expensive to replace because it has three levels - the Armstrong Township Public Library, the entrance area, and the office level.
