

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DISTRICT (Special/Staff) – In a new twist on fishing, anglers snagged entertainment centres for the Englehart and Kirkland Lake hospitals.

A donation from Bassin' for Kids has provided a Fun Center for each of the sites run by Blanche River Health (BRH).

The mobile entertainment units feature flatscreen TVs and Nintendo Switch gaming systems. They can be wheeled into a patient's room, a specialist clinic or even the emergency department.

In a news release, the BRH Foundation said the units are also available to alternate level of care (ALC) patients, in-patients who are waiting for a space in suitable accommodations, typically a long-term care residence.

The units offer mental stimulation through puzzles and cognitive games as well as entertainment.

"This donation reflects the core mission of Bassin' For Kids," said Jamey Swartz, facilities manager at BRH and co-chair of the Bassin' organization.

"We wanted to make a tangible impact on the experience of children and families during their hospital visits, and partnering with Starlight Canada to bring these units to our local hospitals was a perfect fit."

"The Fun Centers transform the hospital experience, particularly for our youngest patients, by creating moments of joy and distraction during what can often be a stressful time," said Samantha Saudino, BRH's vice president, clinical services, and chief nursing officer.

Cassandra James, BRH Foundation executive director, described the units as "a heartfelt choice by Bassin' for Kids to enhance the hospital journey for younger patients."

Bassin' For Kids has grown from a small group of friends who got together 37 years ago trying to help local children.

It's now an annual fishing tournament held each September at Camp Wabikon on Lake Temagami that this year will host 270 anglers.

It has to date raised \$1.3 million. It has supported individual children with cancer and disabilities, sent kids to summer camp, and made donations to the Hospital for Sick Children and Ronald McDonald House in Toronto.

This year's Bassin' for Kids tournament will be held September 5 – 7.

Northern Ontario First Nation Youth Protest Bill 5

First Nation youth in northeastern Ontario took to the streets of Timmins to protest the Ontario government's recent introduction of Bill 5 which aims to fast track resource development in northern Ontario (and is now law).

"This is an important event for me to take part in because this government action will affect my future and it will affect everything including the land, the water and the animals everywhere. Their decisions will bypass laws, our people's rights and directly affect our lives. I wanted to be part of this protest and to help out in any way I could. It was astonishing to see how everyone came together and to see the Eagle staffs, the regalias, the drumming, the flags and the people. I want to say Kitchi-Meegwetch (thanks very much) to absolutely everyone who came out to support us," said 20-year-old Leeon Prince, Mattagami First Nation, who was one of the organizers.

The new bill aims to reduce regulatory processes across major infrastructure, mining and resource projects and allow the government to bypass critical processes that will affect environmental, ecological and First Nation rights, particularly in the Ring of Fire region of western James Bay. According to the Chiefs of Ontario, 'Bill 5 significantly weakens environmental protections, reduces oversight of mining and development projects, and limits opportunities for First Nations consultation and consent'.

"I was honoured to take part in this youth-led event and it was very inspiring to see youth from our community and from throughout the north take such direct action to protect our lands, our communities

and our rights. I'm hopeful that the government will reconsider what they've tried to push through and for them to recognize that they have fractured the trust that was being built between the provincial government and industry and First Nations communities and First Nations people," said Chief Jennifer Constant, Mattagami First Nation.

The Youth-Led Protest Against Bill 5 was organized and led by local Timmins First Nation youth Shem Mattinas, Katherine Jeremiah-Génier, Leeon Prince and Kendrick Jeremiah. They were supported by Vanessa Génier, a member of Missanabie First Nation and CEO and founder of Ouilts for Survivors, a nationally recognized group that advocates for and honours survivors of Canada's residential school system.

The event was led by MC Ariana Kioke-Budd and it started at the Participark in Timmins with a march by organizers, leaders, supporters and participants to the front of City Hall in the downtown area. Students from Mattagami First Nation

showed up to participate. Although originally planned for a small sidewalk event, police shut down the main thoroughfare of the city in front of City Hall as the crowd was larger than expected.

The gathering also included prayers and ceremonies by Elder Angela Shisheesh along with Elders Morris Naveau, Margaret Okimaw and other Elders who took part. The schedule of events also included traditional drumming and singing by local performers, as well as participants attending in traditional regalia and performing on ceremonial hand drums.

"I am here to support the youth of our communities. It is great to see our young people here today. We have to stand strong to support our youth, our land, our rights and for our Mother Earth," commented Elder Morris Naveau, Mattagami First Nation.

The event brought together many speakers and supporters of the protest including: Deputy Grand Chief Mike Metatawabin, Nishnawbe Aski

Hyperthyroid and Hypothyroid **Disorder Awareness**

According to the Thyroid Foundation of Canada, 1 in 10 Canadians suffer from a thyroid condition of one type or another. And as many as 50% of those are undiagnosed.

Thyroid Disease is a Family Affair

The two most common types of thyroid disease are:

- Hypothyroidism (underactive thyroid)
- Hyperthyroidism (overactive thyroid)

Clinical features of hypothyroidism may include: poor appetite; intolerance to cold; dry, coarse skin; brittle hair; fatigue; constipation; muscle weakness; and poor memory retention. Sometimes the voice becomes croaky and hoarse. Examination may reveal dry, scaly, cold, pale skin; a thickening of the skin and underlying tissues; very slow reflexes: and a slow heart rate.

Clinical features of hyperthyroidism may include: weight loss, nervousness, irritability, intolerance to hot weather, excessive sweating, shakiness, and muscle weakness. Other signs include a rapid pulse, loss of body fat and muscle bulk, thyroid enlargement (goitre), fine tremors of the fingers and hot, moist, velvety skin.

Thyroid disorders for the most part are treatable; however, untreated thyroid disease can produce serious results in other parts of the body.

Each person's experience of thyroid illness will be different depending on a number of factors; a patient will not necessarily have all (or even any) of the above symptoms; some patients have the symptoms and no thyroid disease, maybe due to other causes. A primary care provider should be consulted if a thyroid disorder is suspected. Early diagnosis and treatment are crucial.

While the news that both those organizations have to shutter their services has caused great concern, we appreciate their efforts and commitment to helping others and animals in need in our region.




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Teachings

We all have different things that give us purpose and a greater understanding of our place in community. But the bottom line, going back to what my mother taught me, is to do no harm to anyone.


First, do no harm is attributed to the ancient Greek physician Hippocrates.


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FONOM urges funding support for ICI recycling

TEMISKAMING SHORES - If a can of pop is consumed at home, the can is placed in a conventional blue box and producers are responsible for its recycling.

But if that pop is consumed at Queen's Park, then the provincial government bears the cost of that can's collection, transportation and processing for recycling.

Who pays to recycle that can, depending on its source, is at the heart of a resolution recently approved by an association representing Northeastern municipalities.

At its recent conference in North Bay, the Federation of

Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) called on the province to include products and packaging collected by the industrial, commercial and industrial sectors (ICI) in the extended producer responsibility approach.

"It was supported by every municipality in the room, so at least we're keeping the process alive," said Danny Whalen, the Temiskaming Shores councillor who chairs FONOM.

"Fingers crossed," he commented when city council met May 20.

At this time, producers cover only the cost of residential recyclables. But a number of municipalities, including Temiskaming Shores, have urged that ICI recyclables also be deemed eligible.

FONOM says ICI materials are now ending up in landfills, where capacity is "at a critical point" and the process to open new landfill space "is both lengthy and costly."

Or, it said, the cost of recycling the materials is being borne by the ICI sectors.

FONOM is calling on the province to amend regulations so that producers are responsible for end-of-life management of recyclable products from all sources.





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
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FONOM urges funding support for ICI recycling

northern municipalities, with subsequent annual increases linked to the consumer price index.

FONOM also supported a request to the province that it work with the federation and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario on a comprehensive social and economic prosperity review to promote stable and sustainable municipal finances.

It also asked for an equal role in discussions concerning a funding review of mandated public health programs.

Members also called on Ontario Premier Doug Ford to either appoint a deputy minister of transportation for Northern Ontario or create an associate minister responsible for Northern Ontario transportation.

"FONOM believes Northern Ontar-

io will be the economic engine that drives Ontario and Canada for the next 100 years and that the Province needs a dedicated team focused on improving today's network while planning for and acing on future requirements," its resolution read.
