Open house held for Temiskaming Shores area wind turbine proposal

DISTRICT - The Temiskaming Wind Project, proposed by ABO Energy, is investigating a possible wind turbine project in the rural areas surrounding Temiskaming Shores.

Areas being considered reach west along Highway 558 (the West Road) past Button's Corners, north up to Uno Park, Hanbury, and Maybrook, and east past Highway 65 East toward Sutton Bay.

An open house was hosted by ABO Energy August 7 at Riverside Place in New Liskeard.

Those present reviewing the displays and talking to team members included Temiskaming Shores Mayor Jeff Laferriere and other members of council.

Laferriere said public consultation is part of the process for the proposal.

The open house had many displays and company representatives present to explain the project to people.

Laferriere noted that opponents of the Kerns and Hudson townships wind turbine project also held an information session at Riverside Place on July 30.

He said he hoped people would take the infor-

mation from both sides, "looking at the pros and cons - the short, medium and long-term."

From that a decision can be made "taking into consideration all those factors," he said.

Temiskaming Shores council asked ABO to go ahead with public consultation, he said, and once that is done city staff can gather the information, share it with council, and provide a report from the municipality's senior leadership team, he said. The municipal staff will point out challenges, concerns and positives they see from the proposal, said the mayor.

He noted that if ABO Energy is going to proceed with a bid to do the project, it needs a municipal support resolution from Temiskaming Shores council before October 16 when the ABO bid would be due. The Independent Electricity System Operator has released the first of four years of requests for proposals from energy companies for proposed new energy projects, and the first deadline is October 16.

Laferriere added that if council gives a municipal support resolution for that stage of the project "it doesn't mean council is bound to that." He said even with a municipal support resolution, council or ABO Energy could make a decision to say there should be a change in course.

Melanoma Skin Cancer Awareness

Melanoma skin cancer often starts as an abnormal mole on the skin. A mole is a common non-cancerous growth. It's normally a small, round, or oval spot that is usually brown, tan or pink. It may be raised or flat. Melanoma is most frequently found on the back of men and on the back and legs of women. It is the least common, but most serious, type of skin cancer.

Risk Factors:

- Personal or family history of melanoma.
- Presence of moles--especially if there are many, or if they are unusual or large.
- Sun sensitivity--sun burning easily, or difficulty tanning.
- Light colored skin, eyes, and hair.
- History of excessive sun exposure.
- Diseases that suppress the immune system.
- Occupational exposure to coal tar, pitch, creosote, arsenic compounds, or radium.

The ABCDE rule below can help you look for the common signs and symptoms of melanoma skin cancer:

A is for asymmetry – one half of a mole does not have the same shape as the other half.

B is for border – the edge of a mole is uneven (irregular). It can look jagged, notched, or blurry. The colour may spread into the area around the mole.

C is for colour – the colour of a mole is not the same throughout. It could have shades of tan, brown and black. Sometimes areas of blue, grey, red, pink, or white are also seen.

D is for diameter – the size of a mole is larger than 6mm (1/4 inch) across, which is about the size of a pencil eraser.

E is for evolving – there is a change in the colour, size, shape or feel of the mole. The mole may become itchy or you may have a burning or tingling feeling.

Other signs and symptoms of melanoma skin cancer include:

- an area that does not heal
- a mole or sore that oozes or bleeds
- broken skin with an open wound (ulceration)

Melanoma is an aggressive form of cancer that can be life-threatening. Schedule an appointment with your primary care provider if you have any of these skin changes.

Fire bans due to dry conditions

We knew it was just a matter of time before area municipalities would be

issuing fire bans due to the dry, hot humid weather the region has experi-

enced this last while.

The fire bans took effect last weekend and will last as long as the conditions are dry and potentially dangerous for wildfires.

The City of Temiskaming Shores, Cobalt, Coleman Township and Harris Township have issued fire bans.

With the drought-like conditions here and the escalating threat of fire ignition, fire bans are necessary and must be heeded.

There will be no fires al-

lowed, even for cooking and warmth for people travelling in the back-country of the region.

The fire bans will remain in place until a significant amount of rainfall has fallen and temperatures cool down.

The lifting of the fire bans will be done in close consultation with area fire chiefs and municipalities, working together to protect area residents from harm.

There has been a wild-

fire crisis happening in the Western and Eastern provinces of Canada so far this summer and we do not want that situation to occur here.

A good number of those fires are due to human activity and people need to realize the consequences of their actions.

Everyone must respect a fire ban in their municipality or region.

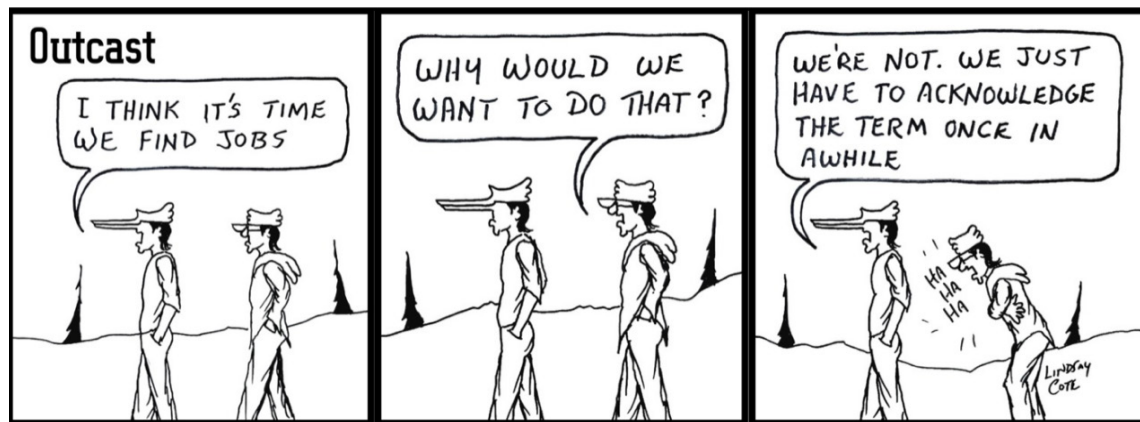

Wildfire smoke, air quality and your health

DISTRICT (Special) - With wildfire season well underway, people living in Ontario may again experience increased risks to their health and safety from exposure to fire, heat and smoke.

Wildfire smoke can travel thousands of kilometres from a fire zone and is a major source of harmful air pollutants. There is no

safe level of exposure for most of these pollutants. Smoke can cause negative health effects even at very low levels when we may not be able to see or smell it.

Symptoms and health effects from wildfire smoke exposure can range from eye irritation and coughing to dizziness, chest pains and even

heart attacks.

Prepare yourself for wildfire smoke events:

- Check local weather advisories and air quality conditions using the WeatherCan app and the Air Quality Health Index (AQHI)
- Protect indoor air quality by ensuring proper ventilation and using an air cleaner

- Limit outdoor activity and/or wearing a well-fitting respirator when outside
- Keep cool in combined wildfire smoke and heat
- Access mental health supports

Matthias Breuer from ABO’s head office in Germany was one of the company representatives on hand to explain the project and said, if approved, construction would take place in 2028. The first year would be focused on preparation of roads and access, collector lines and connection to the transmission line. In 2029 or 2030 the foundations would be prepared and the wind turbines would be erected. The wind turbines

in the ABO project would be 80- to 90-metres high. There would be 14 to 28 wind turbines if ABO is successful with the project bid, and it would take six to seven months to get all wind turbines erected, said Breuer. ABO Energy would always try to employ local companies. He added that there are also maintenance jobs once the wind turbines are erected.

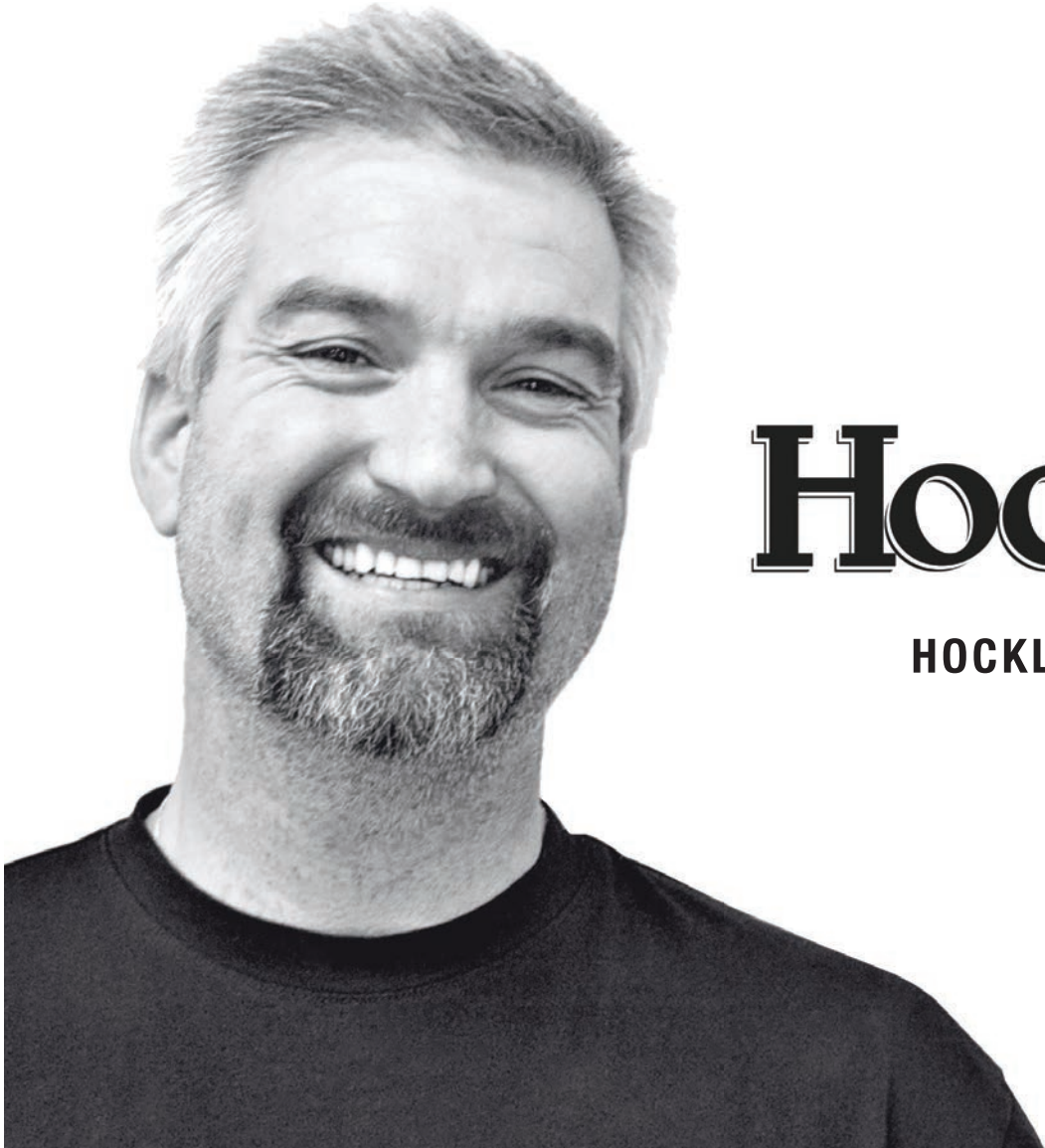
