Temagami preparing for parking fees

Implementation plan requested

TEMAGAMI — Pay parking is coming to Temagami, but not just yet.

At its August 14 council meeting, a bylaw was proposed which would require drivers parking in the downtown core to pay \$5 for up to four hours parking and \$8 to park all day.

This included the downtown core, the Fire Tower lot, and the Lake Temagami Access Road. The downtown core includes the O'Connor Drive Public Parking Lot (in front of the Medical Centre), the Stevens Road Public Parking Lot (across from the ambulance station), the public parking lot at the west end of Memory Lane 4, Temagami Waterfront Parking Lots and the Wildflower Avenue and Lakeshore Drive intersection parking lots.

However, the proposed bylaw provoked debate among council lead by Councillor Carol Lowery.

She questioned whether the cost to administer

a pay program and the revenue generated were known. "We haven't seen any plan demonstrating that," she said.

However, "the other thing is, we're trying to attract people to town. When we start charging them to park here and park there, I'm not sure that they won't just get their car and go," said Lowery.

"I don't think we're ready for this yet."

She wants to make sure that "when we do it, it's done properly. The signage is there. The rules are not sent out the day before the people are coming up (to Temagami)."

Prompted by these arguments, the bylaw was amended directing staff to bring back an implementation plan including parking rates and locations.

The final by-law will allow the municipality to begin parking enforcement and move toward a user fee system that can fund infrastructure improvements and offset enforcement costs. Parking fees and offence penalties will contribute to cost recovery, said a report to council.

LATCHFORD — Latchford council officially approved Malorie Robinson as the town's new chief executive officer at its regularly scheduled council meeting held on Tuesday, August 12.

She will begin her duties on September 2.

The appointment came by way of mayor Sharon Gadoury's motion to appoint Robinson and then hire her

during the council meeting, using her strong mayor powers.

Englehart council approves rezoning for medical clinic duplex

ENGELHART — Englehart will permit a rezoning for the construction of a duplex at 91 Fourth Avenue which will see one unit used as a medical clinic providing psychological services.

At an August 13 public meeting on the proposal, Amy Vickery, the town's chief administrative officer (CAO), said the use is permitted under the official plan, so approval was recommended.

The only public comment came from the Ontario Northland **Transportation** Commission (ONTC). It said

the proximity to the railway could produce noise and vibration. As a result, ONTC will not be responsible for any complaints about operation of the railway or, in the event of expansion or alteration of the rail facilities on the rightof way, any complaints about the operations on the right of

Councillor Jo-Anne Farmer raised a question of parking on the site. She said eight spaces were needed two for the residential unit and six for the clinic.

Vickery said the parking spaces can be accommodated on either side of the property.

However, Farmer asked if additional parking spaces, especially for a clinic with limited staff, are needed.

Corrie Brownlee, the co-applicant for the project, said it specializes in school psychology. "I see students to assess their learning skills," she said. They often would only have one student at a time, plus whatever staff are there. Since this is mostly students under the age of 18, parking would not be an issue.

The bylaw was approved by council later that evening. It requires notice to stakeholders with a 20-day appeal period.

Melanoma Skin Cancer **Awareness**

Melanoma skin cancer often starts as an abnormal mole on the skin. A mole is a common non-cancerous growth. It's normally a small, round, or oval spot that is usually brown, tan or pink. It may be raised or flat. Melanoma is most frequently found on the back of men and on the back and legs of women. It is the least common, but most serious, type of skin cancer.

Risk Factors:

- · Personal or family history of melanoma.
- · Presence of moles--especially if there are many, or if they are unusual or large.
- · Sun sensitivity--sun burning easily, or difficulty tanning.
- · Light colored skin, eyes, and hair.
- · History of excessive sun exposure.
- Diseases that suppress the immune system.
- · Occupational exposure to coal tar, pitch, creosote, arsenic compounds, or radium.

The ABCDE rule below can help you look for the common signs and symptoms of melanoma skin cancer:

A is for asymmetry – one half of a mole does not have the same shape as the other half.

B is for border – the edge of a mole is uneven (irregular). It can look jagged, notched, or blurry. The colour may spread into the area around the mole.

C is for colour – the colour of a mole is not the same throughout. It could have shades of tan, brown and black. Sometimes areas of blue, grey, red, pink, or white are also seen.

D is for diameter – the size of a mole is larger than 6mm (1/4 inch) across, which is about the size of a pencil eraser.

E is for evolving – there is a change in the colour, size, shape or feel of the mole. The mole may become itchy or you may have a burning or tingling feeling.

Other signs and symptoms of melanoma skin cancer include:

- · an area that does not heal
- a mole or sore that oozes or bleeds
- broken skin with an open wound (ulceration)

Melanoma is an aggressive form of cancer that can be lifethreatening. Schedule an appointment with your primary care provider if you have any of these skin changes.

A danger to us all

What if you had a medical emergency and your phone did not work?

Mobile phones in parts of Temagami, Marten River and the South Temiskaming region were out of order due to a telecom fibre cable being damaged recently.

The copper wire theft was the cause of the phone outage with several businesses and organizations reporting they had no landline service on August 13.

During phone outages people could not use 9-1-1 service or receive calls, which is a very dangerous situation.

Copper wire thefts were responsible for a number

of telephone disruptions in the community of Latchford as well.

Bell Canada has reported there were over 500 copper wire thefts involving their equipment in the first six months of this year.

The thefts often involve cutting down telephone lines thus disrupting phone service.

With the value of the metal copper rising in recent months, thieves are cashing in on the metal's value.

But these thefts bring

entire communities to a standstill and create unsafe situations like streetlight outages, no 9-1-1 services and no cell phone service.

And a mega copper wire theft occurred in Lorrain Township earlier this year.

Anyone with information on the wire theft is asked to call the non-emergency line at 1-888-310-1122. To remain anonymous, call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477.

All life on this planet is dependent on water.


As I danced barefoot in the grass after my whirlwind trip around the shoreline of the lake, I said to myself, this is heaven on earth.



City takes "paws" on off-leash area proposal

TEMISKAMING SHORES – After reviewing a proposal to change where pet owners can permit dogs to run leash-free, city council has deferred further discussion until September.

On August 12, Temiskaming Shores councillors discussed a proposal from city staff to amend a bylaw identifying off-leash areas.

Under the proposal, dog owners would be able to let their dogs run leash-free, on a seasonal basis, in the enclosed area of the Dymond outdoor rink from April 15 through November 30.

Staff also proposed that the area known as Laroque's Field in North Cobalt be removed as a leash-free area.

In a report to council, recreation director Matt Bahm said the Laroque's Field area is seeing increased use by the city's current tenants, including the Keepers of the Circle.

Bahm said it's also close to the dog park established by the municipality on Lakeview Avenue

in the former Murray Daniels ballfields.

But Mayor Jeff Laferriere suggested that more consideration be given to the loss of Laroque's Field as an off-leash area.

As the owner of two dogs himself, Laferriere said he sees how busy the area is.


"It is a well-used park with a number of animal owners," he said.

They continue to use the area, even though the Murray Daniels dog park has been open for some time, he said.

He suggested that more input be sought from residents before council makes a decision to stop the off-leash use of Laroque's Field.

Council agreed to defer the issue to its September 2 committee-of-the-whole meeting.

Temagami looking into liquor sales at events

TEMAGAMI — Temagami will investigate the feasibility, requirements and implications of obtaining liquor sales licences for events at eligible municipal facilities.

At its August 14 meeting, council directed staff to prepare a comprehensive analysis, including regulatory, insurance, operational and financial considerations, prior to any final decision. Temagami has received inquiries regarding the potential for the municipality to obtain liquor sales licences for events at municipal facilities.

A report to council says several Ontario municipalities have successfully integrated controlled alcohol service into their community facilities during events such as hockey tour-

naments, concerts, fundraisers and community celebrations.

Potential benefits include enhanced visitor experiences and event attendance, increased community engagement and additional revenue to support recreation programming and facility improvements.

By authorizing staff to conduct this preliminary research, council will be provided with a complete and informed overview of the regulatory, operational, financial and risk considerations related to licensing municipal facilities for alcohol sales. This approach will ensure that any future decision on the matter is supported by thorough analysis, community context and best practices.
