Temagami seeking landfill expansion

TEMAGAMI — Temagami has taken another step to extend the life of the Strathy Landfill.

Located approximately three kilometres northwest of Temagami, it is the municipality's primary waste disposal facility.

At its August 14 meeting, council agreed to proceed with the proposal from Story Environmental Inc. to support the landfill expansion application.

The landfill reached its approved capacity under Environmental

Compliance Approval (ECA) at the end of 2024. An expansion application, submitted in 2018, remains under review. If approved, it would extend the site's life by approximately 16.6 years, from 2025

The Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) has identified the application as a "district priority," but final approval is pending technical reviews, says a report to council.

The approved design capacity was 63,750 cubic metres. By year-end 2024, the site had accepted approximately 63,450 cubic metres of waste and cover material. This left no available remaining capacity under the current ECA.

> Closure was previously anticipated in 2025, with a cost estimate of \$1,194,000 for closure and post-closure monitoring, based on Story Environmental Inc.'s 2024 modelling.

> The municipality submitted an application in 2018 to expand capacity by 39,820 cubic metres, increasing the total authorized site volume to

103,570 cubic metres.

As of July 28, Brian Mills, MECP's environmental compliance officer, confirmed that the file has been designated a "district priority." Despite this status, MECP's technical reviews of the 2022 support requests remain incomplete and no timeline for approval or ECA amendment has been provided.

Ontario expanding RSV immunization to protect more seniors

TORONTO (Special) - The able to access RSV immu-Ontario government is expanding the Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) prevention program to include all individuals aged 75 years and older, helping to protect those most vulnerable during the upcoming respiratory illness season.

"Our government is ensuring the most vulnerable have access to the tools they need to protect themselves and their family during respiratory illness season," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health.

"We're once again expanding RSV immunization which will now include everyone 75 years of age and older so we can help protect more seniors and reduce unnecessary hospitalizations this fall and winter."

Starting this fall, RSV immunization will now be available through Ontario's publicly funded RSV immunization programs to all individuals aged 75 and older, building on last year's expansion of the programs that also includes:

- · Certain high-risk adults aged 60 to 74, such as residents of long-term care homes or retirement homes
- Infants up to eight months of age in their first RSV season
- High-risk children up to 24 months of age in their second season

Pregnant women will have the option to receive the RSV vaccine Abrysvo, which can help provide protection to infants at birth, while eligible newborns, infants and high-risk children can receive the Beyfortus immunization. More details on where families will be

nization will be provided in the coming weeks.

"As we prepare for the upcoming respiratory illness season, it's essential that we take proactive steps to protect those most at risk and reduce pressure on our health-care system," said Dr. Kieran Moore, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health. "Ontario's RSV immunization programs for infants, high-risk children, high-risk adults over 60 and everyone aged 75 and older is a critical part of our strategy to prevent severe illness, hospitalizations, and complications, especially among those most vulnerable to respiratory infections."

Routine and recommended immunizations help prevent the spread of serious diseases throughout communities, reduce medical visits and keep people out of the hospital. Everyone is strongly encouraged to stay up to date on their immunizations, especially children returning to school who may have missed routine vaccines.

Through Your Health: A Plan for Connected and Convenient Care, the Ontario government is providing people with the tools they need to connect to the care they need to keep themselves and their loved ones safe and healthy.



ratory virus that infects the nose, throat, and lungs. Infection is most severe in young babies and older adults and can cause serious lung infections that may require hospitalization. RSV infection can also make chronic health problems worse.

- · Every time your child gets a routine immunization, report it to your local public health unit to ensure their records for the ISPA are up to date. Health-care providers do not report these records for you.
- · Under Ontario's Immunization of School Pupils Act (ISPA), students must provide proof of immunization against diseases such as measles, mumps, rubella and whooping cough to attend school.
- Talk to a health-care provider or public health unit if you are unsure if your child has missed routine immunizations or if you are unsure about which immunizations they have received.

Should you get the **Pneumococcal Vaccine?**

What causes Pneumonia?

There are two main kinds of pneumonia, one caused by viruses and the other caused by bacteria. One type of bacteria is called Streptococcus pneumoniae (or pneumococcus). When these bacteria invade the lungs, they cause bacterial pneumonia. Most cases of bacterial pneumonia are caused by pneumococcus.

Why is Pneumococcal Vaccine important?

Pneumococcal vaccine can prevent pneumonia and other infections caused by 23 types of the Streptococcus pneumoniae bacteria. The vaccine protects about 50 to 80 per cent of people against pneumococcal infection. Vaccination also makes the disease milder for those who may catch it.

Who Should Get the Vaccine?

Anyone 65 years of age and older, as well as adults and children two years and older who have the following highrisk medical conditions

- Chronic heart, liver or kidney disease
- Chronic lung disease
- Nephrotic (relating to the kidneys) syndrome
- Cirrhosis of the liver
- Alcoholism
- Diabetes
- HIV infection and AIDS
- No spleen or a spleen that does not work properly
- Sickle cell disease
- Now also recommended for asthma

When should the Pneumococcal Vaccine be given?

The vaccine is offered routinely for adults at 65 years of age, but you should be vaccinated sooner if you have a high-risk medical condition (see above). An additional dose is recommended 5 years after the first dose if you have any of following medical conditions:

- Asplenia or sickle cell disease
- Hepatic cirrhosis
- Chronic renal failure or nephrotic syndrome
- Immunosuppression related to disease or therapy

After you get any immunization, make sure your primary care provider updates your personal immunization record.

The bargaining table

The Air Canada flight attendant strike was most certainly an act of defiance,

especially after the federal government ordered the employees back to work.

The Air Canada flight attendants held protests at all major airports across Canada, including Toronto's Pearson Airport.

The thousands of flight attendants refused to go back to work after the federal government invoked Section 107 of the Canadian Labour Code.

For all intents and purposes, Jobs Minister Patti Hajdu's back to work order backfired and, if anything, made those striking workers dig in their heels.

And miraculously, the two parties came to a deal that the 10,500 flight attendants with Air Canada will now have a chance to vote on.

Does the defiance of the Air Canada workers send a message out that companies who refuse to bargain with their employees in good faith, that they can then rely on governments to bail them out with backto-work orders?

Because if this is the case, they may want to think again when governments stack the deck against workers as those workers are quite willing to defiantly ignore the law.

labour relations should always begin and end at the bargaining table.

Canada Post workers are also thinking about taking strike action. Will they once again be told to go back to work by the Canadian Industrial Relations Board?

The "Tell about it" comes out in these weekly columns as you may know.

I have tried to keep some room in my heart for the unimaginable.

The other day I was at the beach swimming and it was absolutely gorgeous. I had the beach all to myself, I put my face up to the warm sun and I felt a rush of pure joy.

I can still picture my mother,

Protecting firefighters at lithium battery related incidents

NORTH YORK (Special) — As part of its plan to protect Ontario and keep communities safe, the Ontario government is increasing this year's Fire Protection Grant funding from \$10 million to \$20 million. The investment will help municipal fire departments expand cancer prevention initiatives and improve emergency response to lithium-ion battery related incidents.

"Firefighters are always there when we need them, running towards danger to protect our homes and our communities," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner in a news release.

"That is why we're doubling this year's Fire Protection Grant, giving firefighters across the province the tools they need to stay safe and effectively respond to life-threatening emergencies."

The Fire Protection Grant is available to municipal fire departments for both new and existing initiatives. Eligible projects include: equipment, supplies and personal protective equipment that enhance municipal cancer prevention initiatives; equipment and supplies for lithium-ion battery incident response; minor infrastructure upgrades and modernization, including enhanced broadband and internet connectivity.

"This funding increase demonstrates the commitment to firefighter health and safety. The Fire Protection Grant allows municipalities to address their individual needs to support firefighters on the front lines by giving them the tools to protect themselves and do their jobs effectively," said Ontario Fire Marshal Jon Pegg.

"With the growing risk of lithium-ion battery fires, this increased funding is another major step towards keeping Ontario's firefighters and communities safe and I encourage the fire service to apply."

Municipal fire departments can apply until September 30. More information on eligibility and how to apply is available online through Transfer Payment Ontario (TPON).

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) — The City of Temiskaming Shores has advised the public that the City and Harris Township have lifted their fire ban that has been in place since August 8, 2025.

Although open air fires are now permitted, the Fire Departments of the region would like to remind everyone to use extreme caution when burning.

Only burn when it is coolest and calmest and keep your fire small and in control.

You are not allowed to burn grass, garbage, plastics, rubber or anything that will cause excessive smoke.

Be mindful of your neighbours and where your smoke will travel after you have lit your fire.

Check the particulars of a burn permit for the municipality you live in and stay with your fire, taking full responsibility to make sure you keep it under control and fully extinguished before you leave it.


