

FONOM wants rubber to meet the road on highway improvements

TEMISKAMING SHORES — The amount of deaths and injury on Highways 11 and 17 has caused the president of FONOM to lobby the government of Ontario for road improvements, sooner rather than later.

Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) president Danny Whalen said the plan for the province is to open up the Ring of Fire for development. Meanwhile, the federal government has a Building Canada Act proposal, known as Bill C5, which is a law designed to speed up the approval process for infrastructure projects of national interest, which is a perfect time to address, as he says, the deplorable state of Highways 11 and 17.

Whalen told The Speaker in a telephone interview late last week he is pushing to make the northern highways safer. At the recent Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) conference he lobbied for safer roads and improved roads in the

HIGHWAY DEVELOPMENT PHASES

FONOM's highway improvement plan has two

The first phase is to modify Highway 11 into a three-lane highway with a centre passing lane, otherwise known as the "2+1" configuration between North Bay and Cochrane and to have the same configuration on Highway 17 between Renfrew and Sudbury.

The second phase would see the 2+1 improvements extended from Thunder Bay to Kenora on Highways 11 and 17, plus an added configuration from Sault Ste. Marie to Sudbury.

Whalen said it was encouraging when they were working with the former Minister of Transportation in Ontario, Caroline Mulroney, who agreed to the 2+1 idea, but "it isn't a priority and the new minister hasn't come on board as yet."

Whalen said if the governments at both the federal and provincial levels are looking to jump start the economy, putting people to work is the quickest way.

Should you get the Pneumococcal Vaccine?

What causes Pneumonia?

There are two main kinds of pneumonia, one caused by viruses and the other caused by bacteria. One type of bacteria is called Streptococcus pneumoniae (or pneumococcus). When these bacteria invade the lungs, they cause bacterial pneumonia. Most cases of bacterial pneumonia are caused by pneumococcus.

Why is Pneumococcal Vaccine important?

Pneumococcal vaccine can prevent pneumonia and other infections caused by 23 types of the Streptococcus pneumoniae bacteria. The vaccine protects about 50 to 80 per cent of people against pneumococcal infection. Vaccination also makes the disease milder for those who may catch it.

Who Should Get the Vaccine?

Anyone 65 years of age and older, as well as adults and children two years and older who have the following high-risk medical conditions

- Cancer
- Chronic heart, liver or kidney disease
- Chronic lung disease
- Nephrotic (relating to the kidneys) syndrome
- · Cirrhosis of the liver
- Alcoholism
- Diabetes
- HIV infection and AIDS
- No spleen or a spleen that does not work properly
- Sickle cell disease
- Now also recommended for asthma

When should the Pneumococcal Vaccine be given?

The vaccine is offered routinely for adults at 65 years of age, but you should be vaccinated sooner if you have a high-risk medical condition (see above). An **additional** dose is recommended 5 years after the first dose if you have any of following medical conditions:

- · Asplenia or sickle cell disease
- Hepatic cirrhosis
- · Chronic renal failure or nephrotic syndrome
- HI\/
- Immunosuppression related to disease or therapy

After you get any immunization, make sure your primary care provider updates your personal immunization record.

If you are a patient of the Temagami Family Health Team and would like to have the pneumococcal vaccine or you have questions about the vaccine, please call the office at (705) 569-3244 to schedule an appointment.

Magic to my ears

The local lake that I have fallen in love with and call my spirit place is where I hear the haunting call of loons.

The sound is pure joy when it reaches my ears.

I have pinpointed the time the loons will laugh together, which is close to midnight.

The loons wail together for hours on end and it is one of the great mysteries of the natural world.

Are they wailing together about the weather, that woman who paddled past in her blue canoe, the orange-faced leader who is tariffing the world, or just because it is a glorious summer?

I don't try to overanalyze their sound because it is a language unto its own.

When I hear the four different calls of the loon - the wail, tremolo, hoot and yodel - I listen with my heart, not my head.

Ornithologists (birders) say the most often heard (and most wolf-like) is the wail: three or four drawn-out notes serving as a location check-in. (I'm over here!)

I love loons because they rely on water for life and water has long been a symbol for dreams and hope.

Their lineage dates back 55 million years when fossil records show they were on the planet with mastodons and sabre toothed tigers.

The common loon is the official bird of Ontario and sadly, their numbers are declining.

Just this summer I noticed loons did not nest on the lake, likely due to high water levels.

And I have seen loons on

other lakes in our region not nesting either, so high water levels may be the culprit.

This beautiful bird is losing ground on its efforts to survive as large motorboats can swamp the newly hatched chicks.

Predators like pike, otters and racoons can be dangers to baby loons and the parents, particularly female loons sitting on nests for up to 30 days at a time.

I saw this happen on my favourite lake, when a mother loon sat religiously on her nest for 30 days, then the morning her two eggs were about to hatch, something dragged it off the nest and killed her.

A fox was hanging around the beach that summer and otters were often seen near the nest, so who knows what got

Her eggs hatched and the chicks were then taken to a wildlife centre, however, both chicks ended up not surviving the ordeal.


The amazing part of this story was 13 loons showed up immediately on the lake and wailed and wailed for days on end at the exact location of her

I hope never.



BRH Foundation eyes service expansion

KIRKLAND LAKE - Local waiting lists for cataract procedures are expected to get a little shorter, thanks to funding from the Blanche River Health Founda-

The foundation has provided \$50,000 in new surgical equipment for use by a North Bay ophthalmologist who performs the eye surgeries at clinics held at the Kirkland Lake hospital.

"The equipment provides the potential to increase from an average of 10 to 12 surgeries per clinic to up to 20," said Cassandra James, the foundation's executive director, in an email.

An additional eye surgery stretcher and the supporting trays of surgical tools have been purchased, and are already in use.

In a media release, the Blanche River Health (BRH) Foundation said current wait times for the procedure are up to 18 months.

It said the additional capacity to perform more surgeries will benefit patients in the Kirkland Lake, Englehart and surrounding areas.

The procedures are currently performed by Dr. Niranjan Vijay, founder of the Eye Specialists of Northern Ontario in North Bay.

BRH said cataract surgeries are among the most common day procedures at the Kirkland Lake hospital, and demand continues to increase.

"This purchase is a direct response to community need," said Samantha Saudino, BRH vice-president of clinical services and chief nursing officer, in the release.



"By adding a second stretcher and more trays, we can increase efficiency in the OR and dramatically reduce delays for patients waiting to have their vision restored," Saudino said.

"This investment helps ensure that seniors and others needing cataract surgery aren't left waiting or travelling far from family for treatment," said Mitch Moreau, a member of the boards of both BRH and the foundation.
