

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Remembering local entrepreneur with new park

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The Niska Park is now ready and welcoming everyone to its grand opening Saturday, October 4. The event will take place between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. and will include live entertainment with Steve Benoit.

The park has been constructed in memory of Nicole Guertin.

With the blessing of the City of Temiskaming Shores, which owns the land at 284 Farr Drive in Haileybury, Jocelyn Blais and Felicity Buckell have been spearheading the project since 2022.

Blais related that he and Nicole "would take walks here. It was just a green mowed flat space, and she always commented there was more potential for this property. It should be something someday."

After receiving approval from the city to develop the land south of the city hall, grant applications and fundraising were undertaken. Construction of the park started in the fall of 2023.

The park has three main areas: a community garden area with a garden shed and a sandbox for kids; a gathering circle with a fire pit and a small outdoor stage for performers; and a third section with outdoor musical instruments, a telescope and benches.

"That really was meant to be our quiet contemplation area - a little bit more of our Nicole-focussed area," said Buckell.

"You can sit here and see Farr Island," a special place for Guertin.

"She would love to sit and look out here at the island."

Trees have been added to the park as part of its development, and Blais envisions the park years down the road with grown trees.

Grasses have been added along with wildflowers and other plants that will grow well in the space.

Peaceful atmosphere

Bilingual signage throughout the park tells some of Nicole's story, a few of her projects, a history of the region, information about the lake, information about climate change, and information about the area's art and artists.



Northern College unveils new strategic plan

TIMMINS (Staff) - Northern College has completed its five-year strategic plan and implemented a new set of strategic goals.

In a press release, it says the college's strategic plan outlines specific objectives for the institution, providing both detailed benchmarks and more aspirational goals that serve to ensure the constant evolution of the institution leading into 2030.

These guiding directives are a reflection of community consultation, employee input and a broader understanding of the direction in which we wish to take the institution," says Mitch Dumas, president and chief executive officer of Northern College.

"The implementation of a strategic plan allows us to remain focused on our mission and vision for the institution, with checkpoints along the way to ensure that we're on track."

An invigorated senior management team will lead the strategic plan for the next five years, with the new plan having a new set of strategic goals co-developed with Meyers Norris Penny through consultation and collaboration with Northern College staff and various sectors across all communities in the region.

Before moving forward, the college recognized the accomplishments of the 2020-2025 strategic plan. The plan had three strategic directions with 12 objectives focused on Indigenous Education and Empowerment, Innovative Approaches to Access and Invigorating Northern Experiences. As this plan is now sunset, the college feels a sense of accomplishment, even through difficult times during the COVID epidemic and the ever-changing post-secondary landscape due to the restrictions with international recruitment from Immigration Refugee and Citizenship Canada.

"Our goals are founda-

tional in nature, representing our commitment to returning to our roots as a community college," says Dumas.

"We are placing focus on community, industry and business needs as well as partnership and growth opportunities that allow our region to grow together for the betterment of all involved."

These goals are to strengthen community sense of belonging, to strengthen ties with Indigenous communities, to become the destination of choice for students and employees, to expand industry partnerships and to modernize operations and infrastructure.

"The central pillar of this strategic plan is building," says Jaret Dicks, director of marketing, communications and external relations, "building relationships and partnerships, reinforcing existing connections and bolstering our role as a regional post-secondary institution and hub for inno-



vation, growth and opportunity in our communities and for our community partners."

As part of the implementation of the new plan and Northern's focus on continuous improvement and community service, it will issue a community climate survey. The survey allows the college to gauge its role within its region. It also allows the college to further refine institutional goals and ascertain areas of focus when it comes to improving and building relations with residents and industry across the Northeastern region.

"We enter this new chapter in our operations with optimism and enthusiasm," says Dumas. "We are excited about what we hope to build in the north, rooted in our mandate as a community college."

Arthritis is Canada's most prevalent chronic health condition - for which there is no cure

Fast Facts:

- Arthritis strikes people of every age, from infants to adults, and stays for life.
- Arthritis is a complex disease with over 100 different types. Major types are inflammatory arthritis (like rheumatoid arthritis, childhood arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis, psoriatic arthritis, and gout), and the most common form, osteoarthritis. Fibromyalgia has similar symptoms to arthritis.
- Arthritis results in painful inflammation and stiffness in joints, limiting the ability to move.
- Left untreated, arthritis can cause permanent joint damage and/or changes.
- A significant proportion of people with arthritis are overweight or obese and are physically inactive, adding undue stress to their joints.
- Some types of arthritis can affect the heart, eyes, lungs, kidneys and even the skin.
- A significant proportion of people with arthritis also have other serious diseases like heart disease or diabetes.

Warning Signs of Inflammatory Arthritis

There are many forms of inflammatory arthritis; signs that are typical for most include:

- Pain, swelling and stiffness in one or multiple joints
- Morning stiffness in and around the affected joints lasting at least one hour
- Pain and stiffness that worsens with inactivity and improves with physical activity
- Reduced range of motion
- Sometimes fever, weight loss, fatigue and/or anemia

Arthritis affects everyone differently so treatment planning should be tailored to individual needs with guidance from members of your healthcare team (e.g. family doctor, rheumatologist, surgeon, physiotherapist, occupational therapist etc.).

For the over 6 million Canadians living with arthritis, pain is one of the many challenges they face on a daily basis. And though medication is only one option in terms of arthritis treatment, it can provide pain relief (and slow joint damage in many cases of inflammatory forms of arthritis). Keep in mind that many lifestyle changes, such as healthy eating, exercise and treatments such as physical therapy, should also be explored.

Domino effect

You could not have lined up a set of circumstances any better for job action than when the government limited foreign students from enrolling in Canadian universities and

colleges.

Last week 10,000 Ontario Public Service Employees Union support workers at Ontario's colleges walked off the job because of college budgetary cuts they say have negatively impacted their workforce.

Without a doubt, the lack of foreign student enrollment revenues in the province have negatively affected college budgets causing all kinds of austerity measures.


Almost a year after the number of international students coming to Canada was capped by the Trudeau Liberals, resulting in a drop of 50 per cent for Ontario, colleges have had to make deep cuts in their budgets.

Why is the government addressing increased immigration rates on the backs of foreign students who are attempting to attend higher levels of learning in this counThe federal cap is set to become tighter still next year, when Canada issues 437,000 study permits, down 10 per cent from the 485,000 permits issued in 2024. The colleges are dealing with two sides of a losing coin, looking to manage their financial health while providing enough graduates to fill Ontario's labour markets.

he green and white Franco-Ontarian flag was created at Laurentian University in Sudbury and flown for the very first time on September 25, 1975.

Now, 50 years later, the flag represents the pride Francophones have in their language, culture, heritage and indomitable "joi de vivre" spirit.

I've always loved that flag and I am not even a francophone.

Fast forward to when I was a Cobalt councillor and I put forth a motion to have the Franco-Ontarian flag raised in Cobalt.

The City of Temiskaming Shores had just raised the flag. Given the fact that an entire section of Cobalt was named French Town, I thought we should also raise

And of course we even have a mayor of Frenchtown.

But seriously, I wanted to raise the flag in Cobalt to honour all the francophone families that had made Cobalt as great as it is and added so much to life in the town.

On the day we were supposed to raise the flag outside of the Town of Cobalt's office, the flag had mysteriously vanished.

It was found years later tucked away in the back of the vault in the town offices.

Fortunately, Jean-Claude Carrière gave us another flag from ACFO and we proudly raised the flag where it flies freely today in our downtown

As an elected official at the time, I took flack for that decision from a few people in town and I don't regret it one

Having pride in who you are matters. When I see French language elementary students singing the flag song, mon beau drapeau, with such emotion I get emotional myself.

It is such a beautiful thing.

We are stronger together. The north is where both English and French stand side by side in solidarity as Ontarians and Canadians.







Financing program to help businesses affected by tariffs

Ontario government recently launched the Protect Ontario Financing Program, the first phase of the \$5 billion Protecting Ontario Account that was announced in the 2025 provincial budget.

The program will provide Ontario-based businesses that have been impacted by higher (section 232) tariff rates, including the steel, aluminum and auto sectors, with up to \$1 billion in liquidity support in the form of loans to protect workers and oper-

TORONTO (Special) — The forts to protect workers and businesses from the economic challenges facing Ontario," said the Minister of Finance Peter Bethlenfalvy in a news release.

> "The Protect Ontario Financing Program will help keep workers on the job in sectors that are being hit hard by tariffs while building a more resilient and self-reliant Ontario economy for the long term."

> Ontario-based businesses in these sectors that are facing tariff-related challenges, such as payroll, lease payments and utility payments, will be able to access the pro

gram in addition to federal government supports, such as loans and loan guarantees, and would undergo rigorous assessment and due diligence to determine eligibility and ensure taxpayer funds are used responsibly. This funding will help businesses avoid closures and layoffs as well as protect critical supply chains in the face of U.S. tariffs and economic uncertain-

"The tariffs levied by the U.S. government have left Ontario's steel, aluminum, and auto sectors exposed to unprecedented challenges," said Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade Vic Fedeli.

"Through (this) program, our government will provide \$1 billion in critical relief to protect workers and businesses at the front lines of our economy, ensuring that critical supply chains are equipped to weather the uncertainty of today, while building resilience to seize the opportunities of tomorrow."

To help Ontario-based businesses determine if they are eligible for funding under the program, the province is launching a website. Impacted businesses in applicable sectors are encouraged to visit the site for program details and complete an eligibility tool to determine their potential eligibility for loan support under the program. Businesses that successfully screen through the preliminary eligibility requirements will be contacted to discuss their applications and next steps to qualify. To ensure an agile and flexible approach, a third-party financial agent will be procured to effectively and efficiently process applications that have passed the initial screening process.

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Temagami Big Canoe funds being returned

TEMAGAMI - Temagami will return the original five donations of \$2,500 for the Big Canoe Project.

Council also decided last month to close the trust account for the project, following disbursement of refunds.

In or around 2020, a Temagami resident initiated the Big

Canoe Project, a community effort to construct a largescale canoe as a cultural landmark for the municipality. A volunteer group was assembled to support the initiative and the municipality agreed to hold all project funds in trust until required.

The project, through generous donations, raised \$12,600, says a report to council. These funds were deposited into a dedicated trust account administered by the municipality.

The total project costs ended up being \$2,674.30 which Temagami will absorb.

More recently, there have been informal discussions within the community realternative uses for the donated funds. Two suggestions were: using the funds to develop a

boat-washing station, for which some donors have reportedly expressed support, and reviving the original Big Canoe Project, which others have indicated they are still willing to support.

However, with these competing interests and in the absence of a clear consensus or formal direction, Temagami staff believe it would be most prudent to return the original donations to the donors directly. This would allow each donor to make a decision about whether they wish to contribute to either initiative or another of their choosing.

Staff will contact the donors. Any undeliverable or unclaimed funds will be brought back to council for further direction.



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
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
