

CLOCKING THE WAIT

Alamos Gold's Young-Davidson Mine recently donated \$43,300 to the Blanche River Health Foundation (BRHF) for new emergency room wait clocks for the hospitals in Englehart and Kirkland Lake. The campaign had a goal of \$40,000 and the additional funds from the mine's contribution will be used to cover the first year of operating costs, ensuring the clocks are not only launched but also maintained in their first year of use. Cobalt supports call to ban widely used herbicide

COBALT - When Cobalt Councillor Doug Wilcox was about eight years old, he went to collect blueberries in the bush, dreaming of blueberry muffins, pies and pan-

When his bucket was about three quarters full, a gentleman from the department of lands and forest came walking out of the woods and told

the young Wilcox he had to dump his bucket as the area had just been sprayed.

He shared this with Cobalt town council at its September 16 meeting to argue in favour of supporting a Township of Moonbeam resolution asking the federal and provincial governments to immediately end the aerial spraying of glyphosate for forestry.

The Moonbeam resolution notes the chemical poses significant biodiversity loss;

harmful health effects on wildlife; loss of use of land for recreational, tourism and hunting/gathering purposes; water contamination; and concerns about the effects on human health.

There is also a loss of biodiversity as glyphosate kills broadleaf plants and reduces habitat diversity. This can lead to soil erosion due to the loss of vegetation and loss of habitat and nutrient sources for wildlife, insects and aquatic life. Glyphosate promotes monoculture, which reduces forest resilience, and also kills non-targeted species such as moose, birds, snowshoe hares and insects.

It can also contaminate drinking water sources and chronic exposure to glyphosate is suspected of having a negative impact on human health, including endocrine disruption and concerns that it is carcinogenic.

Wilcox said, "oddly enough,

it's only later that I realized that all kinds of other things, like bears and moose, also eat blueberries."

Glyphosate is an ingredient in Roundup, a brand name for a herbicide that has been at the centre of substantial legal and scientific controversies.

Council agreed, as Wilcox suggested, it "jumped on the bandwagon" and called for an end to its use.







House fires: are you aware of the dangers of electricity?

Fire Prevention Week runs from October 5 to 11, 2025. This year highlights the importance of electrical safety in the home. Did you know that half of all residential fires are caused by human error? Here

are some simple tips to keep you safe.

- · Always buy electrical appliances that are CSA or ULC approved. Take the time to read the manufacturer's instructions for safe use.
- · Avoid using extension cords for long periods. They're only intended for temporary
- · Never try to fix or alter electrical devices yourself, and never strip any wires.
- · If you notice any drops in power or flickering lights, get a certified electrician to check your electrical system.
- · Get rid of damaged, very old or non-compliant electrical appliances as soon as possible by taking them to an authorized disposal point.
- · As soon as you notice any wear and tear, replace the protective covers on your electrical outlets, junction boxes and switches.



- · Never paint over electrical wires or extension
- · Always use the charger that came with your device, or a compatible one that's approved
- · When using a power strip, only plug in lowpower devices like lamps or TVs.

Remember that you can never be completely safe from electrical fires. Smoke alarms are still the most effective way to save lives. Make sure you have functioning smoke alarms on every floor of your home and check them twice a year.

Every year, cigarettes that aren't properly extinguished and issues with e-cigarettes lead to numerous preventable fires. You can avoid these incidents by following some simple preventive measures. Here's how to stay safe.

SMOKING CIGARETTES

If you smoke cigarettes, follow these

•Use a stable, deep, heat-resistant If you vape, take these precautions:

Questions to ask about your first mammogram

Mammograms are an essential part of 4. WHAT HAPPENS IF preventative care for women over the age of 40. Although getting your first mammogram can feel overwhelming, being well-informed can help ease your anxiety and ensure that you make the most of your appointment.

1. WHAT CAN I EXPECT DURING THE PROCEDURE?

Understanding what happens step by step can make the experience less intimidating. Ask how long the test will take, whether it might be uncomfortable, and what you should wear.

2. WILL THE MAM-MOGRAM BE 2D OR

Standard 2D mammograms are widely available and considered reliable for screening. A 3D mammogram can provide more detailed images and may be recommended for people with dense breast tissue.

3. WHEN AND HOW WILL

I GET MY RESULTS? Make sure you know when to expect your results and how you'll receive them. Your clinic may provide results by phone, mail or online portal. Ask if a follow-up appointment is necessary.

SOMETHING ABNORMAL IS FOUND?

It's good to be prepared. Most abnormalities aren't cancer, but it's wise to know what additional steps might be needed, such as more imaging or a biopsy.

5. HOW OFTEN SHOULD I HAVE A MAMMOGRAM?

Guidelines can vary based on age, family history and risk factors. Typically, women aged 40 to 74 should have a mammogram every two years. Ask your provider for a personalized screening schedule.

October is Occupational Therapy Month

What is Occupational Therapy?

Occupational therapy is a type of health care that helps to solve the problems that interfere with a person's ability to do the things that are important to them.

An Occupational Therapist (OT) may check:

Your physical abilities like strength, balance and coordination Your mental abilities like memory, coping strategies, organizational skills What materials or devices you use to participate in activities like furniture, utensils, tools or clothes

What social and emotional support is available to you at home, school, work or in the community, and

The physical setup of your house, classroom, workplace or other environment

Depending on the problem, the OT can help you solve it by:

1. Helping you overcome your disability. OTs do this by: educating or instructing you on how to do things with the abilities you have - e.g. getting around your community in a wheelchair suggesting activities that will help you improve or maintain the abilities you have - e.g. improving your coping strategies

2. Adapting the materials you use. OTs do this by changing the things

around the house - e.g. a special key holder to make turning keys easier in sports or leisure activities - e.g. a playing cards holder at work or school – e.g. special tools that help prevent injury to hands

3. Recommending changes to the environments where you do your everyday activities. OTs do this by recommending that you:

change the physical layout of your workplace, home or school - e.g. lowering/raising desktops, countertops or cupboards

find out about the supports in your community – e.g. specialized public

work with the people in your community – e.g. providing education about a disability to the teacher or employer

work with the government to encourage health living - e.g. request funding for special equipment
