Momentum growing for local hospice care Need Joe O'Grady

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Raising awareness is almost as important as raising funds for a local group of volunteers seeking hospice care facilities for the south Temiskaming

Spearheaded by former local librarian Chris Gallagher, the group held its first fundraiser October 17-18, a book and art sale, at the New

Gallagher said the ultimate goal is to create a four to five bedroom residential hospice, includaccommodations for family and friends. The facility would provide "respectful and dignified" end-of-life care to local patients.

The area served would extend from Earlton in the North to Temagami in the south, west to Elk Lake and east to Temiskaming Shores.

Gallagher said she was pleased with the success of the group's first "small steps" in hosting the fundraiser.

"Despite the weather, we were gratified to see quite a good turnout," she said in an email interview.

"We were blessed with hardworking volunteers who helped with everything from sales to packing and loading boxes to and from vehicles."

In an interview during the event, Gallagher told The Speaker one of the first challenges for the group is to educate the

public about the difference between palliative care and hospice care. The former is aimed providing symptom relief and support for those with serious, life-limiting illnesses, while hospice care provides comfort and support to the terminally ill. Continued on Page 3.

Diwali festival of light celebrates good over evil

TEMISKAMING SHORES -The Indian Community of New Liskeard and Surroundings celebrated Diwali on October 18.

About 100 people were in attendance at the Bun Eckensviller Community Hall in New Liskeard to mark the festival of lights which celebrates the victory of good over evil.

The event was also attended by Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Pauline Rochefort and her husband Ronald Roy.

Foram Shah explained the legend behind the festival.

"Lord Rama, who was in exile for 14 years, killed the demon Ravana, and the victory of good over evil happened at that time. People cele-

brated the comeback of Lord Rama with lights, with diyas, with colours. We do rangolis. We make sure Lord Rama eats a lot of sweets so we prepare a lot of good things for him."

She continued that the Indian Community of New Liskeard and surrounding area has also organized Navratri festivals in past years as well as Christmas events.

The events bring together friends and families such as the Mazumdar family.

Krishna Mazumdar, a teacher at New Liskeard Public School, and her husband Viplav Mazumdar, an engineering manager at Wabi Iron and Steel, have been in New Liskeard since 2012 with their daughter and were one of the first Indian families in the community.

that her husband joined Wabi in 2012 as a planner and the family moved to New Liskeard after he became employed by the company.

"When we came here we

were among only a few families"

It was very difficult to join in celebrations such as Diwali at that time because they would have had to travel to Toronto to participate, she explained. But with time, people began organizing events locally.

"We are really grateful so that we can gather," she said.

"The wish for more Ontarians is to die at home, but that's not always possible," she said. "It's concerning. Our battle, besides money, is to differentiate palliative care versus hospice care."

Gallagher was motivated to begin the quest after the death of a close relative. Before her passing, the relative noted there was no hospice care locally and suggested to Gallagher "you should get on that."

"This community's always been good to me so this is one way to give back," she said.

The group's next fundraiser will be a Christmas bake sale

on November 8 at the Hudson Hall.

Through the winter, there are tentative plans to make presentations in some of the smaller communities in the area to gain further public awareness and support.

Gallagher said there are many ways the project could come together, possibly even with donated space, but she is determined to see it through until a local hospice is in place.

"It definitely would be a very good idea to have one," she said, noting demographic trends point to an ever increasing number of seniors in the community.

spend a few dollars and go home with an astonishingly beautiful artwork.


I won't forget how kind she was to me when my brother, David Brydges, passed away earlier this year.

Spirometry Screening for Asthma and COPD

Spirometry is a common and effective diagnostic test that can easily be done in your health care provider's office. Spirometry is the most reliable way to test your lungs for COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease) and asthma. The earlier it's done, the earlier lung disease can be detected and treated.

Who should have spirometry testing?

- People with asthma
- Spirometry is an important diagnosis and management tool for people with asthma. If you have asthma and have never had a spirometry test, please talk to our respiratory therapist about spirometry.
- Smokers and former smokers

If you are over 40 and smoke or used to smoke, you may have COPD. Take this quick test:





Questions to ask about your first mammogram

1. WHAT CAN I EXPECT DURING THE PROCEDURE?

I GET MY RESULTS? Make sure you know when to expect your results and how you'll receive them. Your clinic may provide results by phone, mail or online portal. Ask if a follow-up appointment is necessary.

SOMETHING ABNORMAL IS FOUND?

It's good to be prepared. Most abnormalities aren't cancer, but it's wise to know what additional steps might be needed, such as more imaging or a biopsy.

5. HOW OFTEN SHOULD I HAVE A MAMMOGRAM?

Guidelines can vary based on age, family history and risk factors. Typically, women aged 40 to 74 should have a mammogram every two years. Ask your provider for a personalized screening schedule.

Every year many people get infections in parts of the body that affect breathing, such as the throat, airways, or lungs (respiratory infections). These infections are usually caused by viruses (germs) like COVID-19, Influenza, RSV, and colds. Other germs such as bacteria can cause infections in the lungs (pneumonia).

Many respiratory infections have the same symptoms but can cause very different illnesses and outcomes. No matter what the respiratory illness is, there are actions that can be taken to help keep yourself and others healthy and stop the spread of respiratory illness.

- Preventing Respiratory Illnesses:


