Prime Minister Mark Carney announced a new budget aimed at making life afford-

Our government led by able for middle- to low-income Canadians.

> For too many families and individuals, the cost of living

presents daily pressures: groceries, rent, childcare, heat and gasoline, which are all big challenges to face.

The National School Food Program is a step in the right direction making sure kids have enough to eat.

Kids, who represent the future of our country, can't learn on an empty stomach so this is an excellent program.

In addition, Canadians will have access to benefits like GST credits and Canada Child Care Benefit as the Canada Revenue Agency is preparing pre-filled tax returns for almost one million Canadians with low and fixed incomes starting in 2027.

More positives include the National Dental care program which has been expanded to cover all age groups.

But the average Joe or Jane may not even notice a change in their income from the Carney budget.

Does the Carney budget cater to the corporate elite of this country?

Carney has increased military spending to an annual \$150 billion from \$40 billion in peacetime.

Should billions of taxpayer dollars get eaten up by a bloated military budget, what programs will have to be cut in the long run?

We need to bring the country together and take care of all Canadians, which means the lower income bracket folks who are the working poor accessing food banks while working 40 or more hours per week.





In Ontario last year, 89 per cent of the women and girls who were beaten, murdered, raped and abused knew the person who violated them.

In other words it was someone who had pretended to love and cherish them, a husband, uncle, brother, boyfriend, grandfather, etc.



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Temiskaming Shores backs more glyphosate study

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A resolution is gaining momentum in Northeastern Ontario to suspend the use of the glyphosate herbicide for forestry management until its impact can be further studied.

The motion came to Temiskaming Shores council October 21 and received council's support.

Councillor Nadia Pelleti-

er-Lavigne, before the motion was approved, commented that "if we carried this motion we would stand with our neighbours in Northeastern Ontario."

She also requested that the city forward their motion to the Temagami Forest Management Corporation.

In an email interview with Temagami Forest Management Corporation (TFMC) general manager Craig Yeates, he told The Speaker that TFMC "has not yet decided whether we will utilize glyphosate spray as a forest management tool in the upcoming year."

The topic of glyphosate came to Temiskaming Shores council after a resolution was received from Larder Lake council, which expressed the fear that aerial spraying of glyphosate "may impact residents and ecosystems."

The resolution states that "new scientific evidence published since Health Canada's last assessment of glyphosate in 2017 has linked glyphosate-based end-use products to cancer, metabolic and neurological diseases, reproductive toxicity, and ecosystem

The resolution noted that glyphosate use in Quebec for forestry purposes has been banned, and forest thinning is used as a safer alternative.

The resolution states that "many residents have expressed concern regarding the potential environmental and public health risks associated with aerial spraying of glyphosate-based herbi-

Temiskaming Shores council has followed up on the resolution and called on Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry Mike Harris Jr. to "reconsider the planned use of glyphosate-based herbicides in the Timiskaming Forest and suspend the aerial spraying initiative until further independent research and updated risk assessments are completed and reviewed."
