EDITORIAL

The silent killer

New rules came into effect on January 1, 2026, concerning carbon monoxide alarms in homes.

The alarms will have to be placed on every floor of a home with gas-burning appliances, like a furnace, a wa-

ter heater or stove.

The update to the Ontario Fire Code comes as part of an effort to better protect residents against carbon monoxide poisoning, also called the silent killer.

Previously, carbon monoxide alarms were only required outside every sleeping area. Under the new code, those will remain in place but the extra alarms are intended to

add an extra layer of protection, according to the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs.

The association says 88 percent of all homes have something that poses a carbon monoxide poisoning threat.

On average, 11 deaths per year in Ontario are caused by carbon monoxide poisoning, mostly occurring during the fall and winter months.

Changes are also coming to

multi-residential buildings including apartment buildings and retirement homes.

If in doubt about where or when to install a CO2 alarm, contact your local fire department.


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Our future thinkers

It was during the Christmas Bird Count, held on December 27.

When I went to the Marsh to attend the Christmas Bird Count for kids there were about 200 people in attendance that day, mostly parents with young children looking for a way to connect with nature via birding.

I have been to the Marsh many times to cover events there but this year something was different.

It was most likely parents eager to have their kids take part in a wholesome outdoor activity.

With technology encroaching on our lives, and artificial intelligence ever present, being in nature is a healthy antidote.

There is nothing artificial about birds and birding.

Let us not underestimate the importance of green space for a child's development.

Nature has been scientifically proven to reduce depression and to lower cortisol levels in the body (stress hormone).

More than one in five children worldwide will experience a depressive episode, with childhood depression on the rise, says John Hopkins Medical.

I have noticed, since the 2000 pandemic, that people are seeking ways to connect with nature and birding has taken flight like never before.

It has been a rough year for so many people and there is much to worry about here in our region and beyond.

The holidays can also be a challenging time for so many, with illness, financial worries and so on.

For a short while, being around the people at the Marsh that day watching Dennis Peddie take visitors for sleigh rides with his hors-

es, the uncertainty of the world went away. All those eager children laughing and having fun lifted up the heaviness I felt.

I thought of how easily I may have caught COVID or the flu being in a large crowd like that but somehow it did not matter.

When Pope Leo called for peace in the world during his Christmas message he sent a message that was meant to uplift.

I guess the only people that didn't heed his message are the American president, Donald Trump, and the U.S. military.

I wanted to hug all those parents who visited the Marsh trying to bring their kids up with a connection to the land knowing our world can be a scary place. The surest way to foster thinking young people is to have access to land-based learning. It will change the world for the better.

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

Network provides shelter when there is no warming centre

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A network of community partners in New Liskeard are on alert when cold weather hits and they set off a call-out to homeless people to go to certain locations in the community where they can keep

warm during the day.

Even though there is no official warming centre in the city, the partners open their doors so they can try to ensure people have a place to go.

New Liskeard Salvation Army Lieutenant Robbie Donaldson is the co-chair of the Community Safety and Well-being Housing and Homeless Pillar, which he says is a passion for him.

Previously, when stationed in Kirkland Lake, he was involved with helping with the establishment there of Hope Haven - the six-bed transitional house for men, which he said has been very successful.

Now in New Liskeard for three years, Donaldson is one of the main people involved in collaborating to make spaces for people to keep warm during cold snaps.

A.J. Davey named ACFO Youth Personality of the Year

A.J. Davey, 17, a Grade 12

student from Ecole secondaire catholique Sainte-Marie (ESCSM), accepted the L'Association canadienne-française de l'Ontario (ACFO) Youth Personality of the Year Award at the annual ACFO luncheon, held at Riverside Place in New Liskeard on January 19.

Davey has been volunteering since the age of five, including completing 500 hours at the secondary school level.

"When I found out I had won the award I said 'whoah.' I thought there would be someone else that had done more meaningful volunteering than me," said Davey in an email interview.

"I knew I had done a lot but I was really surprised to hear the news."

Over the years Davey has volunteered at Village Noel Temiskaming, at the Paula Davey Dance Studio, Small Pond Theatre, NEOFACS Angel Program, the Northdale Manor, Open Studio Libre, Centre de santé Témiskaming, One Light Temiskaming, the Temiskaming Lodge, at Ecole catholique St-Michel and more.

Davey is humble about the work they have done to benefit others.

And that trait of being humble and ready to help out whenever needed is rare these days.

City library goes fine-free on many materials

TEMISKAMING SHORES - For the past year and a half, forgetful borrowers have enjoyed a break at the Temiskaming Shores library.

For 18 months, the library issued no fines if some materials were not returned by their due date.

It's now making the fine-free experiment a permanent part of its collection.

"We believe libraries should be spaces where everyone feels welcome," said library CEO Rebecca Hunt in a media release announcing the policy.

"By going fine-free on many items, we're removing barriers that may have prevented some members of our community from using the library.

"Our mission is to provide access to resources and learning opportunities for all, and this policy is a major step forward."

The fine-free pilot ran from July 2023 to the end of December 2024.

During that time, the library charged no late fees when some materials – books, audiobooks, DVDs, magazines and puzzles – were not returned on time.

Board forecasts electrical system improvements

TIMMINS - The region's English public school board credits a new partnership with improving the safety of its schools' electrical systems and saving money.

In a media release, District School Board Ontario North East said it faced challenges in updating its aging infrastructure to meet current safety standards and improve energy management.

It hired CircuitIQ, which is based in Sudbury, to map power systems in its facilities.

The board said the collaboration provided it with comprehensive circuit mapping and streamlined reporting.

As a result, it said it achieved significant savings in safety compliance, operational efficiency and costs.

"First and foremost, it's about safety," said Lesleigh Dye, the board's director of education, in the release.

CircuitIQ highlights the board's story on its website. In a short video, board officials said up to 15 per cent of the 500 work orders staff responded to each month were related to electrical issues.

Firm commends

Temagami for efforts to save money

TEMAGAMI (Staff) - The firm working with Temagami council to optimize costs recently recognized the municipality for exceptional financial management, noting

the smallest savings potential of any municipal client in the past five years. It also commended staff for outstanding account management.

The status of the Strategic Cost Optimization Partnership with cost reduction consulting firm Schooley Mitchell was updated October 9 in a report to council.

On March 27, the partnership was authorized. It provides a comprehensive line-by-line audit of municipal expenditures under a contingency model - no fees are payable unless measurable and approved savings are achieved. The audit scope includes telecommunications (wireless, local lines, internet), software licensing, facility/office supplies and fuels.

Several categories of municipal expenditures were

audited. The telecom review is complete, with agreements executed.

Schooley Mitchell's find-

The telecom audit, for example, showed potential savings of \$783.96 annually (43.3 per cent) for wireless clients and \$1,488 annually (13.1 per

cent) for internet, a total of \$11,359.80 over five years.

ings revealed the smallest savings it has found for any of the more than 20 municipal clients it has had in the last five years.

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
