Veterinary program expanded to support agricultural industry



DISTRICT — The provincial government is taking action to help the livestock industry remain competitive and resilient in Northern and rural Ontario through its Veterinary Assistance Program (VAP).

This was the message coming from the Minister of Northern Economic Development and Growth George Pirie last week when he announced changes in the program. It's aimed at assisting the province's agri-sector to support the vital work veterinarian services play in safeguarding livestock health.

"In the face of economic uncertainty, our government is protecting Northern and rural Ontario's agriculture sector by cutting red tape and streamlining this vital program to help the industry thrive," said Pirie in a press release February 25.

"The Veterinary As-

sistance Program has a long history of strengthening the program to better support agricultural production."

VAP was created in 1945 to provide financial help to veterinarians delivering care to animals across Northern and rural Ontario, including support for locum assistance, travel costs and continuing education costs for vets.

The program was reviewed by the government in 2024 receiving feedback from veterinarians, producers and sector partners to improve access, efficiency and long-term sustainability of the assistance program.

UPDATES

The province will upgrade the Veterinary Assistance Program on April 1 to include expanding eligibility so all veterinary practices providing services in eligible areas can apply.

They are streamlining the application process by allowing vet clinics to submit applications directly to the Ministry of Northern Economic Development and Growth while recognizing registered veterinary technicians as eligible participants.

The government is adding honeybees and fish as eligible livestock and increasing the call compensation rate for isolated vets by nine per cent and also increasing the kilometre rate paid to non-isolated vets by an additional 30 cents.

Telemedicine will also be an eligible expense under the changes to the program with updated budget allocations to ensure available funding is fully utilized.

VANTHOF REPLIES

John Vanthof, New Democratic Party MPP for Timiskaming-Cochrane, serves as the official opposition critic for agriculture, food and rural affairs and is himself a former dairy farmer.

"While we appreciate that the Ministry is expanding the scope of the program to include more species and allowing Veterinary Technician calls to be included, they have unfortunately not raised the overall funding for the program," said Vanthof in a release to The Speaker.

"This will lead to fewer livestock calls being funded as well as impair financial viability of large animal services in Northern Ontario," noted the MPP.

"At a time when many parts of Ontario are struggling to access large animal veterinary services, it would have been more beneficial to see a financial expansion of this program."

It has been reported that 158 or more school-aged girls went to classes in Iran one morning and did not return home.

The American orange-faced leader and the state of Israel bombed Iran and killed scores of civilians, including those young girls.

Girls that are the future of their country. The ones who could possibly represent change in attitudes in Middle-Eastern countries towards women and girls.

The girls who could potentially grow up to be like Iranian mathematician and professor, Maryam Mirzakhani.

She became the first woman in the world to win the Fields Medal due to her groundbreaking work in mathematics and how we understand geometry and the dynamics of curved surfaces.

On the cusp of International Women's Day, women and girls in Canada have more rights than many places around the world.

And yet, women can't walk down the street at night with-

out fear, they have difficulties going into the wilderness alone because they could be attacked by a man and they fear how they will be attacked at boardrooms, council tables and elsewhere for their mere presence.

And woman and girls are being threatened, beaten, abused and even killed in their own homes.

Sadly, if you are an Indigenous woman you are three times more likely to experience violence.

The alarming rate of violence against Indigenous women and girls cannot be swept under the rug.

Since 1990, there have been over 1,020 victims of femicide in Ontario, says Woman ACT.

At one time in my life, I came close to being one of those statistics.

I applaud all the municipalities in the north who declared their support for women to live violent free lives.

But I wonder how many of those councils saw men making jokes about their women colleagues and it being

laughed off as simply a "joke."

I thought it was brilliant when Timmins Mayor Michelle Boileau stood up at her council table in 2023 and said, "We implore the Ontario government to reconsider and recognize the devastating act of intimate-partner violence is epidemic."

Women at all levels of public life need to feel safe and valued.

When I was a member of Cobalt council I had threats of violence made against me that were not made to the male councillors at the table.

It got so bad that the police issued a restraining order on one individual.

I never thought that wanting to help my community would lead to some of the scariest moments in my life.

I, however, am not deterred from speaking up for human rights, for decency and respect for all women and girls.

What will it take for women to feel safe in their own homes and communities?

- In a recent study, 27% of Ontario girls 12-18 years of age were reported to be engaged in severely problematic food and weight behaviour;
- Eating disorders are now the third most common chronic illness in adolescent girls;
- The death rate associated with anorexia nervosa alone is more than 12 times higher than the overall death rate among young women in the general population;
- Recent studies show that 25% of eating disorder cases occur in young boys and men

If the way you eat and think about food interferes with your life and keeps you from enjoying life and moving forward, then that is disordered eating. Take it seriously and talk to someone who can help.

How older Canadians can stay safer from seasonal illnesses

NC – As winter turns into spring, the change in seasons brings some safety concerns that are obvious, like icy sidewalks, and some that are harder to see - it's also the season for respiratory viruses.

Older Canadians can be at higher risk for short- or long-term impacts from an infection, so it's important for them to take steps to stay safe.

Here are some simple steps that Canadians can take:

- Wash your hands often. Use soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after being in public spaces.
- Be mindful of the items you carry with you. Phones, keys, wallets and reusable shopping bags all have the potential to carry germs - wipe them down regularly.
- Avoid peak hours in crowded indoor places like stores or pharmacies. If you can't avoid crowds, wear a well-fitted mask.
- Consider getting vaccinated. There are preventive options, including vaccination, that can help protect you during respiratory virus season.

RSV

Why are older Canadians at greater risk?

While the flu and common cold often get the most attention, another virus is also circulating: Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). It's a common contagious virus affect-

ing the lungs and breathing passages and can be serious for children as well as adults.

RSV can lead to serious complications for those over the age of 50 and those with chronic health conditions. For higher-risk individuals, an infection can result in hospitalization and long-term impacts.
