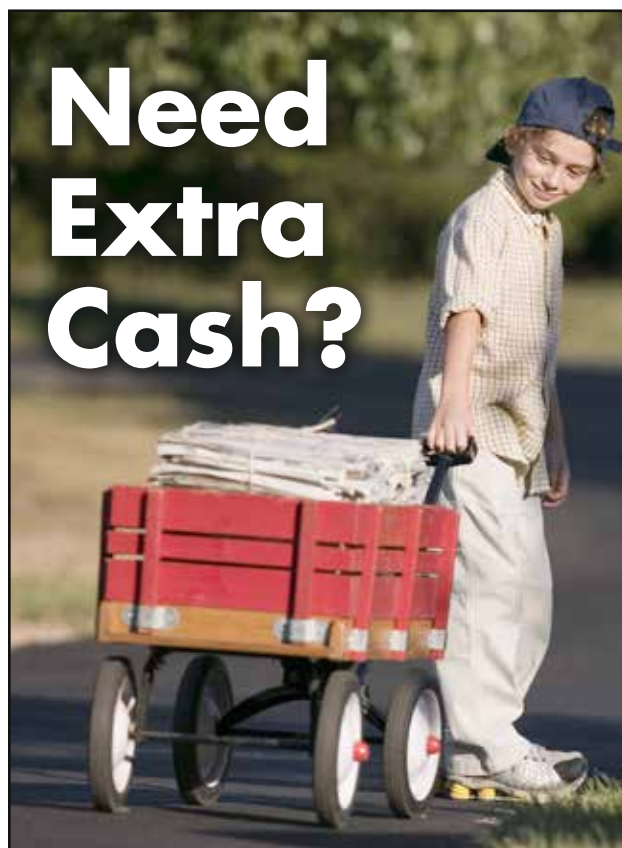




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Snapping turtle hatchlings emerge in Coleman Township

COLEMAN TOWNSHIP — It's that time of year when the geese fly south and tiny snapping turtles crawl out from their sandy nests.

A nest of snapping turtles hatched from their roadside nest to make their way over to Loon Lake in Coleman Township on September 20.

Tim Moore, who lives near Loon Lake, has been watching snapping turtles hatch from their nests for years.

Some years in early spring - anywhere from May to June - he sees the mother snapping turtle wind her way up from the lake to the gravel roadside to scratch a hole in the ground laying upwards of 50 or more eggs.

After she lays her eggs, Moore places a wooden box around the nest and bright orange cones alerting motorists of the presence of the nest and to avoid driving over it.

That's the last time the mother snapper will see her babies as they will hatch all on their own and make their way to

the nearest lake to grow and mature.

It takes between 60 and 90 days for eggs to develop into hatchlings that will tear their soft leathery eggshell with their egg tooth.

The egg tooth is a sharp bump on their snout that allows them to break open their shells.

The amount of eggs that hatch into baby turtles varies each year. This year Moore hasn't seen as many compared to previous years when he watched upwards of 50 turtles crawl out of the nest going in all directions.

They measure about two inches long at this

point.

TURTLE BOXES

He has rescued them from the nearby road where cars and trucks drive past and from the nearby woods, placing them gently on the shorelines of the lake, the turtles' new home.

He encourages people who love turtles to protect their nests after the turtle lays her eggs by installing a protective box around the site.

The boxes have small holes with which the hatchlings can escape when it's time for them to hatch and the boxes protect the nest from predators who dig up 90 per cent of turtle nests within a few days of lay-

ing.

The boxes should have open bottoms to allow rain, air and sunlight to reach the nest for normal incubation.

It is a dangerous time for newly hatched turtles as predators like herons, skunks, raccoons and large fish will feast on the tiny creatures.

If they survive their first year, they can live up to 30 to 40 years.

The baby snappers will burrow down in the mud at the bottom of the lake when the weather turns cold and emerge next spring as one-year-old turtles.

Then he is rewarded in the fall when the hatchlings appear, the grin on his face is evident of another successful hatching year for the turtle family.

Moore says in the spring the mother snapping turtle will choose a spot near Portage Bay Road for her nest, lay down and deposit her eggs.

Then he watches all summer long over the nest to make sure no predators get to it or cars do damage to the nest site.

Snapping turtles are not considered an endangered species but they are listed as a species of special concern. This means they are not endangered but they live with significant pressures that endangered status, says the Centre.

Who decides?

If you were to stand outside most Temiskaming and Ontario polling stations on October 26, you would likely see the age groups who are most likely to show up to vote. Elections Ontario says if you look at the data from the past

few years, municipal elections are largely decided by middle-aged to older voters.

The highest voter turnout seems to come from people aged 55 to 64 and older, with the lowest voter turnout of people aged 18 to 24 and 25 to 34.

Older voters tend to own homes and are more concerned with property taxes, roads, policing, public transit and long-term planning.

The older voters have established a pattern of voting

over their lifetime and they may have fewer work obligations, pay attention to politics more and have more time on their hands.

Younger voters may vote less because they are busier, pay less attention to municipal politics and feel a disconnect from politics in general.

The "grey vote" is something that municipal candidates running in the 2026 election can direct their campaign energies toward.

Voter turnout across Ontario

fell to just 32.9 per cent in 2022.

We hope that voter turnout across our region is high and that all age groups show up to cast a vote to determine the outcome.

Votes build roads, parks, transit, community services and ultimately the future of a community.

On October 26, the people who will show up to vote will make the decisions for everyone who does not vote.

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Never forgotten

I have written many, many headlines in my days as a reporter and interviewed a wide variety of people for stories.

But each year at this time, there is a story and an interview that pulls at my heart-strings as a reporter, a mother of a daughter and a human being.

It is the bizarre disappearance of 15-year-old Melanie Ethier.

Melanie was last seen walking home on the evening of September 29, 1996.

She has not been seen since that night and that was 30 years ago.

She would be 45 years of age today.

She was an honours student, a talented athlete, a beautiful young woman who left every room brighter than when she found it.

The headline I long to write is this: Melanie Ethier has been found.

We can only describe the people who may know details about Melanie's disappearance as monsters who walk among us.

To see the pain on Melanie's mother's face, to know the grief and heartache she lives with day in and day out is truly heartbreaking.

How do I put myself in Celine's shoes? I cannot.

But I understand

a mother's love for her child and I understand the immense pain she must feel not knowing where her child is and what happened to her.

She walks a lonely road in her grief and I have nothing but compassion for her.

What I further understand is that hatred and violence directed at innocent children and their families is a scourge on all of us.

It isn't who we are and it will never be who we are in this Temiskaming region.

As Celine said, she is not interested in prosecuting anyone at this point in time, she only wants to find her daughter or know what happened to her.

This is truly a wonderful example of compassion as maybe others would be mad as hell at anyone who has information and doesn't come forward with it.

Grieving a missing child re-

sults in a lack of closure leaving a mother suspended between hope and mourning.

This has been Celine's reality for 30 years - enough is enough. She is exhausted, physically, emotionally and spiritually.

And yes, we still live in a world where young girls can and do disappear.

The trope of the missing girl is a familiar one, the numbers of young girls who go missing in Canada is staggering.

The Melanie Ethier story is one of grief and loss, but it is also a story reminding us of human endurance and the human faces behind tragedies like this.

That face is one of a mother who has not hugged or kissed her child in 30 years.

May we all strive to be the best examples of love and humanity that we can possibly be during our brief stay on this planet.

Cervical Cancer—What You Should Know

Each year in Canada, more than 1,300 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer and over 400 die from the disease. Almost all cases of cervical cancer are caused by the human papillomavirus (HPV), which is preventable through the HPV vaccine. The publicly funded vaccine is provided to male and female students in every province and territory through school-based programs. Regular screening of adult women is also vital as cervical cancer caught at an earlier stage has a high survival rate. Most cervical cancer (67%) occurs in women aged 30-59.

Risk Factors

The main risk factor for developing cervical cancer is the sexually transmitted human papilloma virus (HPV) that infects the cervix.

Other risk factors for developing cervical cancer include:

- Becoming sexually active at a young age; having many sexual partners or having a sexual partner that has had many sexual partners.
- Smoking.
- The use of birth control pills for a long period of time.
- Giving birth to many children.
- Having taken diethylstilbestrol (DES), or being the daughter of a mother who took DES.

Who Should Be Screened:

- Cervical screening is recommended every 5 years for anyone with a cervix (women, transmasculine and non-binary people) 25 years old and older who are or have been sexually active.
- Women who have had a hysterectomy (an operation to remove all or part of the uterus) should talk to their doctor or nurse practitioner to see if they need to continue having cervical screening.

Regular screening can stop between the ages of 65 and 69 for individuals with a history of negative results.

You should still have cervical screening to check for cells that could lead to cervical cancer if you:

- feel healthy and have no symptoms
- are no longer sexually active
- have only had one sexual partner
- are in a same-sex relationship
- have been through menopause
- have no family history of cervical cancer
- have received the HPV vaccine

If you are due or overdue for cervical cancer screening, call your primary care provider today to schedule an appointment. Screening is the only way to find the early changes that might lead to cervical cancer.
