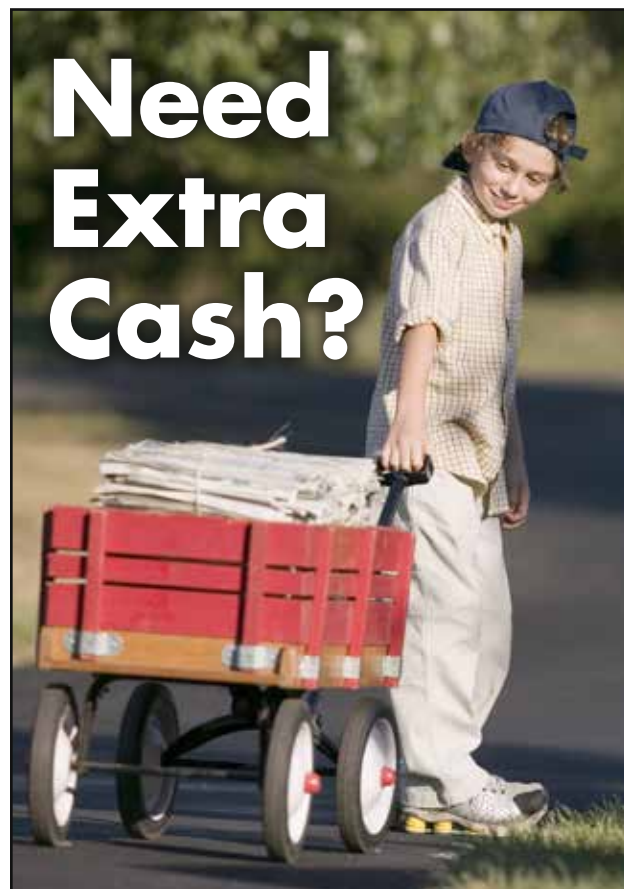




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Cobalt headframe revitalization plan progressing

COBALT - With the planned demolition of a historic downtown mining headframe having been averted, efforts are continuing to rehabilitate the Pan Silver headframe under the guidance of the Cobalt Historical Society.

Coleman Township Mayor Dan Cleroux appeared at Cobalt council on August 18 to provide an update on the plan to remove the deteriorating stiff legs - the wooden support timbers which give a headframe its distinct appearance. Cleroux said he continues to be in contact with Agnico Eagle, which is poised to loan some expertise and possible assistance on the project. While the major international gold mining company has no direct ties to this particular headframe which was part of Cobalt's historic silver boom, Agnico Eagle was founded in Cobalt and remains

a key community benefactor.

"I think it's very impressive how things are moving along," said Cleroux, whose neighbouring municipality is a partner in the preservation initiative.

At Cleroux's request, fencing has been erected around the headframe for public safety, pending removal of the stiff legs. While stiff legs are important structurally to support a working headframe, they are strictly decorative in this case and can be removed without impacting the building's structural integrity, officials say. Cleroux floated the idea that metal be used in place of timbers if new stiff legs are erected, to prevent future deterioration from the elements.

Formerly part of a working mine in North Cobalt, the Pan Silver headframe was relocated to downtown Cobalt in 1998 to be a showpiece of the Heritage Silver Trail, a self-guided tour of historic mine



sites which put the town on the map globally during the silver boom of the early 1900s. The trail is a three-way partnership of Cobalt, Coleman and the Cobalt Historical Society.

Earlier this summer, Cobalt municipal officials unilaterally issued a two-week notice to the Historical Society to remove its belongings from the headframe, declaring that the structure was to be demolished due to safety concerns. The society then launched an 11th-hour campaign to save the headframe, drawing in widespread community support which prompted the town to recon-

sider.

At its August 18 meeting, Cobalt council adopted a resolution to "reaffirm its commitment to work collaboratively with its Heritage Silver Trail partners" and formally designated the Historical Society as "project manager for the remediation and repair work" at the headframe. The town stopped short of Cleroux's suggestion that ownership of the headframe be transferred to the Historical Society outright.

Mayor Pat Anderson thanked Cleroux for his work on the initiative and pledged to continue to work collaboratively with the partners.

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\$489,000 approved for new plow

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The city will be forced to dig deeper in its pockets to find almost \$500,000 for a new snow plow.

An inspection of the existing machine found irreparable problems with the frame, forcing Director of Transportation Services Mitch McCrank to give it its last rites.

“This machine needs to go to the cemetery,” he told city council at its recent regular meeting.

“It’s not ideal (to be forced to purchase a replacement) but this piece of equipment is vital.”

When questioned by city councillors, McCrank said the town’s official fleet replacement plan “is pretty optimistic,” but even so, the deterioration of the plow’s frame was unexpected.

“We didn’t know about the frame,” he said. “We were hoping we could make it last, but it just wasn’t feasible.”

McCrank said the city could “tap into the 2027 budget” to cover the \$489,000 price tag, but staff needs to start the procurement process now.

“Ideally we’d like to get this

piece of equipment ready to go for the winter,” he said. Councillor Melanie Ducharme echoed the sentiments of several in attendance that there is no choice but to approve the purchase of the new equipment. “Winter road cleaning is a necessity,” she said. Council approved the request.

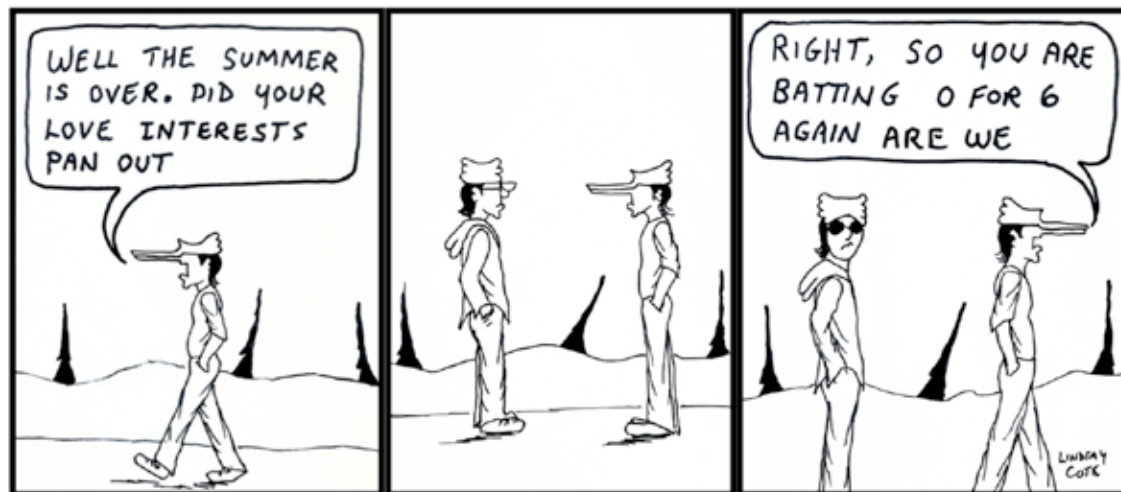

Helping Your Child Maintain a Healthy Weight

Parents want their children to grow up healthy, happy and ready to succeed in life. But, childhood obesity is undermining children's health. According to Statistics Canada, almost one third of Canadians aged five to 17 are overweight or obese.

Many of the physical problems associated with being overweight or obese as a child – such as heart disease, diabetes, or arthritis - may not appear until adulthood, but the social and emotional problems start early. Some overweight kids are bullied at school. They often have low self esteem and suffer socially resulting in a higher likelihood that they will experience depression.

TIPS FOR PACKING A HEALTHY LUNCH BOX

Get your kids to help you so that healthy lunches are a family affair.

- Get out the cookie cutters – not for cookies, but for sandwiches. Kids love food in shapes.
- Serve sliced meat rolled up into tubes and offer the bread separate. Tuna salad can be offered with crackers.
- Use leftovers. If your child liked last night's beef stew, serve it up for lunch in a thermos after heating it up in the morning.
- Breakfast for lunch? Pancakes or a sliced boiled egg can be a hit too (remember to put in an ice pack though).
- Fruits and veggies are always a part of a nutritious lunch. To make them more fun, include a dip.

TIPS FOR BEING PHYSICALLY ACTIVE

On average only 4% of Canadian children take part in enough physical activity. Children need physical activity to build strength, coordination and confidence. All of these characteristics lay the groundwork for leading a healthy lifestyle in the future.

- Children should participate in at least 60 minutes of physical activity per day.
- Limit the amount of screen time your children have. In fact, if they are younger than 2 years of age, the Canadian Paediatric Society does not recommend any screen time at all. If they're between two and five years of age, the recommendation is one hour per day – that's right, just one hour!
- Be aware of the opportunities your community offers to help your family stay healthy.

Physical activity can include everyday activities like walking the dog, planting a garden, playing tag, building a snowman or tobogganing, and even household chores like sweeping or shoveling the driveway. Be your child's role model and set a positive example by being physically active as a family.

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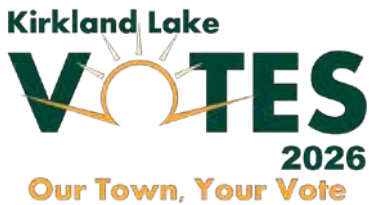

KEY INFORMATION TO ELECTORS ON
THE 2026 MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Who Can Vote?

A person is entitled to vote in a municipal election, if on voting day, they:

- reside in the local municipality, or is the owner or tenant of land in the municipality, or the spouse of such owner or tenant; and
- is a Canadian citizen, and
- is at least 18 years old, and
- is not prohibited from voting under the *Municipal Elections Act*, 1996 or otherwise prohibited by law.

Who Cannot Vote?

The following cannot vote:

- a person who is serving a sentence of imprisonment in penal or correctional institution;
- a corporation;
- a person acting as executor or trustee or in any other representative capacity, except as a voting proxy in a traditional election;
- a person who was convicted of the corrupt practice described in subsection 90 (3) if voting in the current election is less than five years after voting day in the election in respect of which her or she was convicted.

Are You on the Voters' List?

The list of eligible voters (Voters' List) for the 2026 Kirkland Lake municipal and school board elections has been prepared by the Returning Officer/Clerk.

As of September 1, 2026, all voters should ensure that their names and relevant information are correct on the Voters' List. To be added, deleted or to make any other corrections to your information, please contact or attend the Municipal Office with proper identification and proof of residence during office hours beginning September 1, 2026, up to and including the close of voting on October 26, 2026, at 8 PM.

You may also attend at any Advanced Poll, or on Election Day, to verify if you are on the list.

Traditional Paper Ballot with tabulators

Electors will be voting by traditional ballot with tabulators.

To vote, the elector must attend at a specified Advanced Poll (October 7, 14 or 17) or on Election Day (October 26, 2026) and cast their ballot.

To be added to the Voter's List, the voter must have acceptable identification and proof of residence.

"Since 1956, we have been committed to providing seniors with a safe, welcoming and supportive place to call home. As a not-for-profit retirement home, our focus is our residents. The resources we receive are reinvested into resident care, programs, services and improvements to our home.

"But what truly makes Northdale special is the people. Our staff know our residents, families become familiar faces and volunteers

become part of our Manor family. Northdale Manor isn't simply where our residents live - it is their home."

When asked about some of the biggest challenges Northdale Manor has experienced over the years, Hopkins points to the realities of operating a non-profit retirement home without government funding for its day-to-day operations.

"It creates challenges on another level. When our residents' beloved ice and water dispenser needs to be re-

placed, for example, we have to review available funds across different accounts, research potential grant opportunities and reach out to community contacts and supporters who may be able to assist.

"That process is still ongoing as we explore every possible avenue to secure the funding needed for a replacement. Unfortunately, we can't just call head office and have it replaced; we face the hard reality head-on.

"There are ever-rising op-

erating costs, an aging building, changing regulations, staffing challenges and increasingly complex resident needs, which keep this small residence on its toes. Limited resources mean we have had to be creative and responsible. Through careful budgeting, fundraising, grant opportunities and strong community partnerships, we have continued to move forward.

"What impresses me most is that whenever Northdale Manor faces a challenge, people step up. Our employees, Board, volunteers, residents, families and community supporters have all contributed to our success."

FUNDRAISING

Hopkins says fundraising continues to play an essential role.

"It helps us provide programs, equipment, transportation, activities and improvements that may not be

possible through our regular operating budget. Events such as our Auction, Hearty Temiskaming Lunch, Christmas Bazaar, Summer Social and Fall Fair Raffle bring the community together while helping us raise these funds."

Donations are equally meaningful and gratefully appreciated.

"When we are presented with a donation from current or past residents and their families, it shows their support and gratitude for how their loved one was cared for here. That is what keeps us going. It's the biggest thank you this non-profit can receive - knowing we provided residents and their families with compassion, care, support and reassurance."

“Our greatest accomplishment will always be the compassionate care we provide our residents, but from a safety perspective, our generator project is something I am extremely proud of.

“It took approximately five years of fundraising, planning and community support to install a generator capable of operating the entire Manor during a power outage. Completing that project was a tremendous achievement for a not-for-profit organization and a perfect example of what can happen when our Manor and community work together.”

And what does Hopkins hope Northdale Manor will look like when it celebrates its 100th anniversary?

“I hope Northdale Manor continues to grow and adapt while never losing the personal touch and sense of family that make it special. I would love to see continued building improvements, greater accessibility, new technology and expanded programs for our seniors.”
