Council OKs rezoning for retail store in business

TEMISKAMING SHORES - City council has approved a rezoning application that would permit the addition of a retail store to an existing business in the Dymond Industrial Park.

In doing so, Temiskaming Shores councillors turned down a recommendation from the city planner that the application be refused.

The application seeks permission to locate a 2,500-squarefoot store, operated by another

business and selling outdoor recreational equipment and supplies, inside the existing Brownlee Equipment building.

In a September 6 report to Temiskaming Shores council, city planner Jennifer Pye said the municipality's official plan

and existing Dymond zoning bylaw identify other areas for commercial development.

She said retail establishments are permitted in manufacturing industrial zones, provided they're clearly subordinate to the main industrial use of the

property and do not change its industrial nature.

In this case, she said the proposed retail store is a separate business from the main industrial use and does not require location in an industrial area.

OPP actively recruiting new officers

DISTRICT -- The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are actively recruiting people who are interested in embarking on a career as a police constable.

In the North, there is a particular interest in recruiting Northerners who would remain in the North during their career, explained Timiskaming Detachment Inspector Brent Cecchini.

At this time, across the province, the OPP are looking at growing numbers of the OPP force members who are approaching retirement age.

At the Timiskaming detachment alone, among the administrators and supervisors, "we have five people who can retire in the next two years," said Inspector Cecchini.

This will lead to possibilities to advance for younger staff members. On the Timiskaming detachment the frontline officers have anywhere from one to 15 years of experience, he said.

The retirement of senior officers will create openings for them, and more opportunities for constables coming on to the force.

To become a constable with the OPP, there is orientation training, police college, and then front line experience on a police detachment, outlined Inspector Cecchini.

More information on the career can be found at opp.ca under careers.

"There's always a push for recruitment," said Inspector Cecchini. "We are looking particularly for people from the North who want to stay in the North." He added that while there is a minimal age of 18 for young people interested in the career, there is no upper age limit. "We are always looking for people who have a varied life experience."

The OPP also have a community safety officer who attends the local schools to speak with the students about the career.

Obtaining Northern people to work in Northern communities is helpful to the police detachments, because of the concern that people from southern communities will work in the North for a short period of time only before moving away, or quit policing entirely, which would be even worse, commented Inspector Cecchini.

Council OKs rezoning for retail store in business

No other examples of this arrangement have been approved for the park, she said.

Council heard a different interpretation from a consultant planner retained by property owner and applicant Brian Brown-

Consultant Jeff Celentano argued that the project is consistent with the city's policies and the Provincial Policy Statement that guides municipal planning.

"The proposal contemplates a commercial retail use within an existing industrial building, rather than a free-standing Commercial land use," he wrote.

It would add only a retail store and a small number of complementary service commercial-type uses to those now permitted under the existing zoning, he said.

In the end, councillors approved the rezoning.

Councillor Doug Jelly said the issue was discussed at length at a recent meeting of the protection to persons and property committee.

COMPONENTS

There are already commercial and retail components to some of the enterprises in the park, he said.

"We feel we would be remiss if we didn't get the message out that we are open for business," he said.

"We have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars in services into the industrial park in Dymond. We are not full, we are not half full, we may be quarter full. That's a lot of taxpayer money," said Councillor Mike McArthur, who also supported the rezon-

The city is beginning the process of drafting a new comprehensive zoning bylaw, said Mayor Carman Kidd.

It may look at moving to a business park model, rather than an industrial park designation, for the Dymond development, he said.

A formal bylaw approving the zoning bylaw amendment will be presented to council September 20.

EDITORIAL

School bus safety

The big yellow school buses are back on the road this week as area students return to class.

Now is a perfect time to think about school bus safety.

It is important for motorists, parents, caregivers and students to know how to keep children safe when they are on and around school buses.

Perhaps the most important thing about school bus safety is the fact that vehicles must stop when a school bus has flashing red lights.

You can never pass a school bus with flashing red lights.

Drivers can be charged with a first offence of between \$400 and \$2,000 and six demerit points.

Each following offence brings a \$1,000 to \$4,000 fine, six demerit points and possible jail time.

Hopefully, no one ever gets to that point because this indicates a complete lack of understanding of red flashing travelling behind a school bus.

It is always a good idea to slow down near school zones and be on the lookout for children either walking along streets or perhaps heading to board or unload from a school bus.

And you must wait until everyone has crossed the street at crosswalk zones located near schools.

You must wait until all children and the crossing guard arrives safely to the other side of the road before moving your vehicle.

There are several large billboards in the region reminding drivers of what happened to little Adam Ranger when he was killed by a truck that failed to stop for a school bus flashing red light.

We mustn't forget Adam Ranger's death or the fact that accidents can and do happen in the blink of an eye.

Watch carefully if you find yourself

Englehart resident Fred Deacon, who died last week at the age of 77, was one man who put the "U" in community.

He went above and beyond for the town he loved so dearly.

As not-for-profit organizations strug-

gle to attract and retain volunteers, perhaps Mr. Deacon's life could be a model for those who say they don't have time to give back.

He always had time for his community and for others.

Efforts underway to re-establish wildlife rehabilitation service


DYMOND TOWNSHIP -- Liz Cowell is looking to start up her wildlife rehabilitation service

Over the past 15 years she has tended and rehabilitated hundreds of animals including most mammals, birds including raptors and waterfowl, and lizards.

Authorized as a wildlife custodian, she is also a trained veterinary technician, although the work she has done has been as a volunteer, and she has paid for the cages and almost all of the care received by the animals.

A flood of her former Uno Park property put an end to that era of her services however, sweeping away or destroying cages and other items she was storing in sheds on the property.

Now at her new home in Dymond Township, she would like to start again, but this time with a different approach. With a job and two children, she would like to establish a network of foster caregivers who could care for the animals on their own properties as they are gaining strength to be returned to the wild.



She emphasized that there are rules and regulations, provided by the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), which have to be followed during the rehabilitation.

Under the proposal, people would first bring the injured or orphaned animal to an office and triage area she would establish at her home.

"I would do the triage and rehabilitation planning, and then transfer the animal to a foster caregiver," she says of the out-

"They'd be authorized to be a foster caregiver under my authority."

She said she would train the caregivers, and there are also online training courses available for certain aspects of the

Local efforts are also underway to establish a board for the wildlife rehabilitation service so that it can become a registered charity, she explained.

Harry Cooper is heading up that aspect of the proposal.

Ms. Cowell also has an account with the Temiskaming provided her with discounted medical services for wildlife. She said people could help financially, by donating to her account at the Temiskaming Veterinary Services for the medical services needed.

Ms. Cowell stated that the next nearest wildlife rehabilitation service is located in North Bay, and another in Sudbury. "I don't know if there is one north of me."

This past year she has been

turning away requests to aid wild animals since the loss of Veterinary Services, which has her Uno Park property. "I get anywhere between 50 to 100 calls from spring to fall," she

She said of the work that "the best part is releasing" the animal back to the wild. She attempts to involve the person who first brought the animal to her, so that they can experience that as well, she said.

She stated that she works well with the MNRF in Kirkland Lake and North Bay districts.

About Arthritis

What is Arthritis?

The word arthritis means inflammation of the joint. Inflammation is a medical term describing pain, stiffness, redness and swelling. Arthritis is a disease that can involve any of the joints in the body, often occurring in the hip, knee, spine or other weight-bearing joints, but can also affect the fingers and other non-weight-bearing joints. Symptoms of arthritis include joint pain, swelling, stiffness and fatigue. Untreated inflammation can eventually lead to joint damage, destruction and disability.

Arthritis consists of more than 100 different conditions ranging from mild forms of tendinitis and bursitis to crippling forms like rheumatoid arthritis. It includes pain syndromes like fibromyalgia and arthritisrelated illness such as systemic lupus erythematosus that involve every part of the body. Other forms of the disease, like gout, are almost never thought of as arthritis.

Arthritis affects people of every age, gender and ethnic background. Genetics, age and lifestyle can all play a part in increasing a person's risk of developing arthritis. For example, the likelihood of developing osteoarthritis increases with age, a physically demanding job (e.g. athlete, heavy machinery operator) and/or previous joint injury.

DID YOU KNOW:

- There are two main types of arthritis:
 - o Inflammatory Arthritis
- Arthritis is the most common chronic condition reported by women and the third most common by men
- There is no cure for arthritis
- Within a generation, there will be a new diagnosis of osteoarthritis in Canada every 60 seconds
- Joint damage caused by osteoarthritis accounts for more than 80 per cent of hip replacement surgery and over 90 per cent of knee

Treating Arthritis

Early diagnosis is critical to the outcome of the disease, since it only gets progressively worse and therapies work best when started as early as possible.

Temiskaming hospitals get \$2.7 million for repairs, upgrades

ENGLEHART – The district's three hospitals are getting more than \$2.7 million for repairs and improvements to their buildings and properties.

The money is coming from Ontario's Health Infrastructure Renewal Fund.

It covers projects ranging from replacement and repair of roofs, windows and ventilation systems to the purchase of back-up generators.

Funding is up substantially, said Gary Sims, chief executive officer at the Englehart and Kirkland hospitals.

In the past, he said small hospitals had been disadvantaged under the fund's criteria.

He said they expressed their concerns to the North East Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) and the Ontario Ministry of Health.

The new formula recognizes smaller hospitals and exceptional circumstances, he said.

Across Ontario, the North East LHIN said the province added another \$50 million to the fund to help address the critical need for hospital repairs. About \$11 million of that went to 22 hospitals in the Northeast.

At Englehart and District Hospital, Mr. Sims said its original allocation of about \$68,835 increased to \$355,828.

While the list of work has not yet been finalized, he said a number of projects are under discussion.

They include repairs to the exterior brick, helipad and pedestrian sidewalk, a hot water tank, water softener and conditioner, ambulance area flooring, and parking lot paving.

The list is even longer at Kirkland and District Hospital, where its original allocation of just under \$204,000 was increased to \$2.077 million.

Temiskaming Hospital is receiving \$321,575.

Part of the money will be used to expand emergency power distribution to several areas of the hospital, said chief executive officer Margaret Beatty.

She said the region experienced "significant" power outages and brownouts in the past year, and the hospital was left without power for an eight-hour period in August, 2015.

It has installed a new, more powerful generator.

DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

It'll use infrastructure funding, she said, to extend its distribution system to provide lighting in washrooms, for example, and the kitchen.

It'll avoid the need to use flashlights and long extension cords, she said.

Improvements to patient and public entrances and to prevent water back-ups and the subsequent risk of flooding are also scheduled.

Ms. Beatty too was pleased at the level of investment in the district's three hospitals.

She said the work improves the environment for patients and hospital employees.

The funding is also good for the local economy, she said, because hospitals tend to use local contractors.

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
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
