Capital spending? **Council takes first**

TEMISKAMING SHORES – As city council looks at the first draft of its 2018 budget, it's facing a \$1.9 million question.

look at budget '18

That's the shortfall contemplated in the first draft of spending plans for big-ticket capital items in Temiskaming Shores next year.

Councillors took their first look at the budget November 14.

City staff said the budget, if adopted as-is, leaves council with four avenues to cover the shortfall borrowing, increasing taxes, drawing on reserves, or putting proposed projects on hold.

After three hours of discussions, council decided to refer the department budgets to their committees for another review in the coming weeks.

Councillor Danny Whalen said he begrudges nothing proposed in the budget, "but we've got to pay for it."

With the passing of the Comprehensive Zoning By-law the Zoning By-laws currently in effect will be repealed, including the Township of Dymond Zoning By-law 984, as amended, the Town of New Liskeard Zoning By-law 2233, as amended, and the Town of Haileybury Zoning By-law 85-27, as amended.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the City of Temiskaming Shores before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the City of Temiskaming Shores to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the City of Temiskaming Shores before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

First major snowstorm whacks Temiskaming region

DISTRICT (Staff) - The weather experts warned of a winter storm approach packing high winds and upwards of 5- to 10-centimetres (cm) of snow at the end of last week, but what they didn't say was the storm delivered much more to the South Temiskaming region.

On Thursday, November 9, Environment Canada issued a weather warning for the region saying upwards of 15cm of snow and heavy gusts of wind in the 60 mile per hour (mph) range was coming our way.

In fact, in a 24-hour period upwards of 15-25cm of heavy snow fell on South Temiskaming affecting visibility and resulting in public bus transportation being halted and school Quebec was closed and several and periods of snow forecast for buses cancelled, highway clo- events were postponed because the weekend.

The fast change in temperatures caused a layer of ice to form on what had been warm pavement, which created all kinds of problems for area driv-

New paramedic response unit in district

DISTRICT (Staff) - The Timiskaming Emergency Medical Services (EMS) has a new vehicle in its fleet.

EMS Chief John McCarthy related that the new paramedic response unit (PRU) will be primarily driven by an EMS chief or deputy chief while they are conducting business across the district.

"All EMS management are certified paramedics and therefore can rapidly respond to emergencies across the district during their travels," he said in a press release.

"This serves to enhance quicker response when 911 is called should the situation arise where the paramedic response unit is closer to the call than the responding ambulance," he continued.

"These units will also be deployed to large-scale EMS calls such as large motor-vehicle collisions where multiple patients may require a paramedic's care or there is a need for overall scene management due to multiple casualties. As a back-up when ambulances are challenged with other calls, the PRU can be sent as a first-response unit to initiate rapid patient care on-scene until an ambulance arrives," he added.

"When the management team FEATURES is not using these response units, they can serve as deployable units for front-line paramedics to use and respond to calls when and where necessary."

McCarthy said the SUV-style of vehicle is more practical than the previously used pickupstyle of vehicle.

"It is more practical as it allows for safe and secured transportation within an enclosed cab area that maintains a constant temperature all year round. This is critical in storing emergency equipment and drugs, especially in the northern climate that we live in," he explained.

"The 2017 Chevrolet suburban PRU is also equipped with an auto idle/ anti-theft device which automatically stops and starts the truck engine while parked outside to maintain in-McCarthy noted that this is terior temperature and battery the first SUV-style body vehicle level, ensuring a constant interior temperature is maintained and all batteries are operational. The truck does not have to have the engine running at all times to do this," he continued. He added that the engine will only need to be running in idle when heat, air conditioning or battery charging is required.

"This will serve to save emissions in the environment, engine wear and tear, and overall fuel efficiency, resulting in less dollars spent to operate the

McCarthy continued, "the unit has state-of-the-art emergency lighting and reflective decals for high visibility at the scene of an emergency response. It has an onboard computer tablet, GPS locator, GPS vehicle tracking, ambulance dispatch radio and a dispatch satellite radio that can be used to communicate in the far remote backcountry corners of

Flu is Expected to Hit Canadians Hard **During the Holiday Season!!**

WHEN IS THE FLU EXPECTED TO APPEAR IN ONTARIO?

The Windsor-Essex County Health Unit has already confirmed its first case of influenza in the area.

According to the most recent weekly influenza reports:

- Influenza activity continues to increase
- The percentage of laboratory tests positive for both influenza A and B is higher for this time of year compared to previous seasons. The majority of influenza detections continue to be A (H3N2).
- The number of influenza-related hospitalizations and regions reporting sporadic activity are above the expected levels for this time of year.

H3N2 is a virus that traditionally affects older patients more, leading to serious complications and higher rates of hospitalizations.

There are typically two peaks of influenza - one in December as kids return home from school for their holiday break and again in January and into February as colder temperatures set in. It is expected that by January an upswing of illness should hit and is expected to linger for about four weeks before it dies down.

Approximately 64% of Canadians go to work when they're sick or send their kids to school if they're sick? When you do that you're spreading germs and increasing illness. If you're not feeling well – stay home!

Please be mindful of others. If your child is sick, he or she could infect others who are more vulnerable - they could be dealing with asthma or other underlying health conditions.

The single best way to arm yourself against the flu is to roll up your sleeve and get vaccinated. The earlier you get the vaccine, the better. It takes about two weeks for the vaccine to be most effective, but its effects are





Credit card fraud reported

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) - Police are advising businesses to be wary when accepting credit card info over the phone.

Between June and October, Temiskaming Ontario Provincial Police received complaints of fraudulent credit card activity, including one in Temagami.

Several more have surfaced in other areas of Ontario.

Police say the callers are typically making large purchases, such as generators, and provide credit card numbers and driver licences that match the names on the cards.

When police have checked the card number and account information, they've discovered that the cards are registered to people who don't realize their cards have been defrauded.

Police say the following could flag a fraud:

- larger than usual orders;
- multiple orders for the same product in a short period of time;
- orders for products that can be easily converted to cash, such as gift cards:
- orders from repeat customers that differ from their usual purchasing patterns;
 - requests for express or overnight delivery;
 - single card uses with multiple shipping addresses;
 - delivery to an international address;
 - a billing address that differs from the shipping address;
- orders with differing names, addresses and card numbers, but from the same IP address;
 - Internet addresses at a free email service;
- the use of multiple cards for one order because cards are continually declined;
- a first-time customer whose order does not fit the average purchase pattern.

SAFETY TIPS

Temiskaming OPP remind credit card holders to keep these safety tips in mind:

- Keep your credit card in a safe place and never lend it to any-
- Protect your PIN. Do not disclose it to anyone. Memorize it and do not write it down.
- Watch out for "shoulder surfers" who read your PIN as you enter it. Always use your hand and body as a shield to prevent others from seeing you enter your PIN.
- If your card is lost or stolen, notify your financial institution immediately.
 - Review your transaction history regularly.
- Only conduct credit transactions when and where you feel se-
- If anyone tries to distract you while making a purchase, complete what you are doing and retrieve your card before talking to them.

If you suspect that your card has been compromised or an attempt made to compromise it, or if you are a victim of fraud, police request that you provide information to your local OPP detachment and contact your bank immediately.

Capital spending? Council takes first look at budget '18

"We still as politicians have to have discussions."

OPERATING BUDGET

Under the first draft, the proposed operating budget for 2018 tallies just under \$16.5 million. That's up about \$13,600 from the previous year.

It would provide a surplus of almost \$684,000, which would be allocated to capital projects.

But the budget includes a number of unknowns, said city manager Chris Oslund.

They include costs beyond the municipality's control for policing and levies to the Timiskaming Health Unit and the district's social services administration board.

The draft budget forecasts a two per cent drop in policing costs and a two per cent increase in levies to the health unit and the district's social services administration board.

Funding for 2018 from the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund – the main source of provincial funding to communities – has not yet been released.

Also unknown are staffing costs.

Negotiations with the city's unionized workers on a new collective agree-

ment and discussions with management staff have begun, Oslund said.

He said the city is also monitoring Bill 148 which would, among other things, raise the minimum wage and impact working provisions for part-time, temporary, casual and seasonal employees.

When it comes to covering the shortfall, provincial and federal government sources are limited, said treasurer Laura Lee MacLeod.

MacLeod said some funds are open to applications only every other year, and few sources are available to sectors like fire and recreation.

She said borrowing is an option.

But servicing increased debt would limit surpluses next year for that year's capital spending, she said.

At this point, she said the city still owes more than \$8.7 million.

She said the city has been drawing on reserves for major infrastructure projects.

Its working reserve fund has dipped below the \$1.3-million that staff believe it should have in case of emergencies, she said.

The proposed budget includes setting aside \$266,000 to help rebuild reserves.

HIGHLIGHTS

Among the highlights from the first round of budget discussions:

•The city is receiving \$2 million less from the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund than it did 10 years ago, Oslund said.

And yet some municipalities have seen their funding "not drop a penny," Whalen commented.

It's a political problem, he said, that the municipality must address.

•An archeological master plan, at \$75,000, is under consideration.

Given the number of waterways and length of shoreline in the city, Oslund said almost any proposed development would require a first phase archeological assessment.

Having a master plan would mitigate the need for some proponents to undertake studies on their own, he said.

•City staff pointed to the impact of rising electricity costs on both water and sewage treatment and recreational facilities.

Costs at the New Liskeard arena, for example, are expected to increase by \$30,000; at the Haileybury arena, \$27,500, and at the Pool and Fitness Centre, \$39,400.

The draft budget includes \$1 million on upgrades to the aging Pool and Fitness Centre.

They're expected to save some money on energy costs, said Oslund.

The increases are being driven by the province, said Councillor Jeff Laferriere, who urged that municipalities launch a joint effort to lobby for change.

"This is ludicrous," he said.

When it comes to ensuring access for all to recreational opportunities, "hydro is going to have a significant impact on affordability in the future," Oslund said.

•Thanks to the introduction of curbside recycling, the city is seeing expenditures on waste management decrease.

•Under contemplation is a \$2.8-million road program that includes work on Armstrong Street, Lakeshore Road and Ferguson Avenue, Rorke Avenue and King Street, and the West Road.

A provincial infrastructure program and federal gas tax program would cover all but \$451,600 of that sum.

•The budget includes \$1.2-million in vehicle and equipment replacements under a long-term plan that's been approved by council.
