New pumpertanker ordered for Haileybury station

TEMISKAMING SHORES – A new pumper-tanker is coming to the Haileybury fire station.

Temiskaming Shores council has approved the purchase of the new vehicle, at a cost of \$417,000 plus taxes for a total estimated at \$428,000.

Fire Chief Uttley said the new pumper-tanker will actually replace two – a 1989 pumper and a converted milk truck.

It'll mean the vehicle complement at the Haileybury station will drop from four to three.

He said the delivery date for the new truck, which is custom-made to a client's specifications, will be in 300 to 330 days.

The purchase is over the \$370,000 originally budgeted for the new vehicle.

But it is within the city's overall 2018 budget for fleet upgrades, and it is part of the fire department's vehicle replacement plan.

The city first issued a request for bids from truck suppliers in January.

When they all came in over budget, a committee of fire department representatives

RECYCLING PROGRAM

Residents of the City of Temiskaming Shores continue to ensure our diversion rate is maintained or increased by the recycling efforts they have done since the program started in 2014.

However, the processor of the City's recyclables has recently noticed an increase in the amount of garbage or non-recyclable materials in our shipments.

Non-recyclable materials can cause problems during the sorting process and are expensive to dispose of, as the processor hand sorts the materials to get the garbage out. Mixing garbage with recycling significantly increases program costs, and ultimately the cost to the taxpayer.

Beginning immediately, random inspections will be completed by looking inside the recycling bins to check for garbage. Recycling bins found with unacceptable materials will be tagged to identify why the notice was issued, and to ensure the bin is not collected. Further occurrences may lead to fines or the suspension of collection services.

Please help to reduce the amount of garbage found in our recycling, and do not place the following prohibited materials in the blue recycling bin:

- **Batteries**
- Clothing, shoes, other fabric materials
- Christmas Lights
- Diapers
- Electronics
- Wood
- **Extension Cords**

Garbage Bags and Diapers

- Garden Hoses
- Plastic Shovels, Toys, **Buckets**
- Large Plastics: Tarps. Pool Covers/Liners
- Yard Waste: grass clippings, leaves, sticks, branches

Prior to setting out your recycling bin for collection, please ensure all of your mixed recyclable materials are placed in the bin loosely (except for shredded paper packaged in a clear plastic bag). Any items received at the processing facility in garbage bags are considered non-recyclable, as these bags are not opened and the contents are not sorted.



City hopes to repeat as showcase lead

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) - City officials believe investing in a Northern Ontario presence at an annual mining conference is paying dividends.

Temiskaming Shores is applying to FedNor once again for support to lead the Northern Ontario Mining Showcase at the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada (PDAC) conference

It also wants to secure the services of Markey Consulting of Sturgeon Falls to continue coordinating the event.

The city has served as the lead agency for the regional showcase for the past five years.

It's grown from a one-day event with 35 exhibitors in 2014 to a five-day showcase with 100 exhibitors from across Northern Ontario this year.

It focuses on small- and medium-sized mining-related businesses and organizations.

This year, they were exposed to more than 25,000 visitors from around the world who came to the PDAC conference.

In an April 3 report to council, Temiskaming Shores economic development officer James Franks said participants have been pleased with the impact of the showcase.

Almost half of all participants reported making new sales at the event and all attendees created new leads, he said.

In a survey, almost all judged the showcase "extremely" or "quite" useful or valuable.

Rosacea Awareness

Rosacea is a common, chronic, inflammatory skin conditions causing redness on the face and for some people, small red bumps and pimples.

It often begins as a tendency to flush and blush frequently and in time, persistent areas of redness appear on the cheeks and nose. The chin, forehead and neck can also be affected. Tiny blood vessels may be seen on the cheeks and nose. The skin is often very sensitive and may feel dry, rough or swollen. Up to half of people with rosacea also experience eye involvement causing red, watery eyes, frequent styes and an irritated, dry or gritty feeling.

Who Gets Rosacea?

Most often:

- People between the ages of 30 and 50
- People with fair skin
- More women than men are affected
- Those with a family history of rosacea
- Those with extremely sensitive skin

When is it time to see a health care provider?

- Do you have noticeable areas of redness on your face that do not go away?
- Do you feel embarrassed, socially anxious, frustrated, or low about deep ing or redness on your face or neck?
- Does your skin burn, sting or swell during periods of flushing?
- Do you have pimples, red bumps and persistent red areas on your face?
- Are your eyes frequently bloodshot, watery and irritated?
- Is there an area of thickened, bumpy, red skin on the nose, chin forehead or 6.

If you answer yes to any one of these questions, you should consider scheduling an appointment with your health care provider. The Temagami FHT is an OTN Telederm Site which means that you could have a consultation with a dermatologist right here at the clinic. Diagnosis and treatment recommendations are typically turned around within one week.

Conservation work done by these ornithologists uses science to understand birds and our world.

The last of the winter birds are nibbling on fallen seeds at bird feeders. Some ducks and swans have found their way back to ponds and lakes but the spring ice is defiantly holding strong.

For six months the lakes lay dormant covered in their winter shell but soon canoe travel will be possible.

Did you hear that folks? Canoe travel will soon be possible.

Amongst the rocks and pines and waterways of the Boreal forest I am most alive.

I understand the who, what, where and when of wilderness

travel but it is the why that I comprehend the most. This realization has only taken about 50 or so years.

My entertainment need not be turned on but rather to unfold in front of me.

In the canoe, life slows down, the senses tingle and life is for living as this forest and its waterways are teachers.

Why do I travel the wild places of Temiskaming? I feel so incredibly alive.

Empty promises

2018 budget last week at Queen's Park.

It seems all three political parties - the Liberals, Progressive Conservatives and New Democratic Party - have all been busy making promises to the taxpayers of Ontario.

These promises are largely a result of the upcoming provincial election.

The promises involve free dental health care, free child care, lower hydro bills, Ring of Fire development and on and on.

Specifically for the North, the Liberals pledged \$490 million over 10 years to refurbish the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission.

They also set aside \$85 million for electricity rebates to support businesses in the mining and forestry sectors.

The debt-ridden Wynne government continues to push the boundaries of fiscal responsibility. But it sure seems easy to spend when the public purse is seemingly bottomless.

A vision to create a truly great Ontario would include plans to look after the needs of the North.

The needs of the North are many and involve improved health care, job creation and poverty reduction.

A clear plan to address these important issues hasn't as yet been revealed by the Queen's Park elite.

Justin Trudeau's Liberals aren't taking Canada's opioid crisis se-

According to the latest statistics released by Public Health Agency of Canada, 2,923 Canadians died from opioid-related overdoses in the first nine months of 2017. It is expected that number will be over 4,000 for all of 2017, well over the 2,800 deaths in 2016. Justin Trudeau must recognize the scope of this growing epidemic.

Conservatives recognize the serious harm caused by the opioid crisis. These drugs can tear families apart, lead to criminal behaviour and destroy lives. And yet, Justin Trudeau continues to offer but a fraction of the support required to fight this growing epidemic compared to nearly a billion dollars he is spending to legalize marijuana.

took a second look at what was required in a new vehicle.

It revised the specifications and invited the two lowest bidders - Fort Garry Fire Trucks of Winnipeg and Carrier Centres of Brantford – to submit a second bid.

Carrier was the lowest at almost \$414,000. Fort Garry's bid was a little higher, at just over \$417,000.

But the latter's proposal was more than \$31,300 lower than its original bid, and its warranty package covered a longer period.

The municipality will finance the new vehicle through a \$422,000 debenture through the Ontario Infrastructure and Lands Corporation.

Englehart hospital upgrades IV medication pumps

ENGLEHART (Special) - New equipment at Englehart hospital upgrades the delivery of intravenous medications.

The hospital recently purchased 10 new Plum 360 intravenous (IV) pumps, at a cost of \$45,000.

They're described as "the next generation" of the IV pump that the hospital had been using.

"The new pumps are ready for the future of medication administration in hospital settings," the hospital announced in a news release.

"The pump can incorporate scanning of the bar code from the patient's identification band, the intravenous bag, and the medication order and show the unique dosage instructions and settings for each individual patient."

Another feature of the new equipment will come into use next year.

The pumps have a built-in medication library that keeps nursing staff up to date with medication drug limits.

The Englehart hospital will begin using the medication library feature in a joint initiative with Kirkland and District Hospital in 2019.

"This joint initiative means standardized IV equipment across both sites resulting in standardized training, policies and overall efficiencies for patient safety," the hospital stated.

"All of this helps us meet patient quality improvement initiatives and patient safety goals."

It added that the transition to the new pumps was fairly smooth, given their similarity to the equipment the hospital had been using.

The hospital said the need for the new pumps became apparent over the past few months as patient numbers increased and the equipment was in short supply.

To cope, it used surplus pumps from Kirkland and District Hospital.

The hospital credited donations from an annual fundraiser conducted by "a dedicated group of sponsors and volunteer organizers" with making the purchase possible.





Tracking progress on age-friendly community

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Older adults have been taking steps to be active this winter as participants in indoor walking sessions at Northern College and Timiskaming District Secondary.

Their goal was to collectively put enough mileage on their sneakers to make a symbolic trip to Florida.

As of March 21, they'd walked a combined total of 947 miles, or 1,524 kilometres. "That brings us to just outside of Atlanta, Georgia," said Danielle Covello, coordinator of the Age-Friendly/Get Active initiative, in an email.

The indoor walking program is one of the activities launched under Temiskaming Shores' efforts to make itself a more age-friendly community.

The planning began in 2015 with funding from the province. A survey and consultation sessions drew input from almost 2,000 people.

A formal plan was adopted by the municipality the following year, and a broad-based committee meets regularly in conjunction with the project.

In recognition of the implementation of the plan and its evaluation, the city is receiving a 2018 Ontario Age-Friendly Community Award.

Covello recently provided a progress report on the initiative.

Among the highlights are the coordination of a 1-800 line, provided through Timiskaming Home Support, to help local seniors find appropriate transportation options

There was also an info fair for older adults held in the fall of 2016, the compilation of a community services guide, the launch of weekly coffee hours to learn and socialize, and physical activity opportunities.

With warm weather and great fishing around the corner, here is a little refresher on how to



When it comes to walleye fishing, jigs are the most consistent type of fishing lure. They are effective in either shallow or deep water, in warm and cold conditions such as ours, fishing during the day or night, and literally the whole year round.

Successful walleye catchers know how to work a jig. Keeping the following in mind can help you accumulate great catches or at least add to your fish stories:

Jigs come in various shapes, designed for specifically different fishing situations. Choosing the right one can make all the difference.

The most common shape is the ball-style jig. These are very versatile and can be used in the current or in still water. If in doubt, this is almost always a good walleye lure option. Ball-style jigs can be casted or trolled and are great for vertical jigging as well.

When you're fishing in the weeds for walleye, try a swimming snagging and tempts those walleye to come out from their hiding spots.

Pancake jigs are designed to cut through moving water (also called "current cutters"), and are best used while walleye fishing in rivers and streams.

Fishing lure size is another important factor. A 1/8 oz. jig is a pretty good place to start in most fishing conditions. The most important thing to consider is whether you are getting all the way to the bottom. If you can, try going lighter with a 1/16 oz. Or you may need to go a bit bigger with a 1/4 oz. or 3/8 oz. These four walleye lure sizes should cover most situations, but other options in your tackle box are great too.

If you're fishing at night or in murky water you might try a bulkier walleye lure with fluorescent colors for increased visibility. No matter what, it is always a good policy to keep trying new fishing lure colors. Light conditions change very quickly underwater and good part of walleye fishing will always be a game of chance.

After you have the right walleye lure picked out, consider tipping it with either live bait or a plastic substitute. Both options have their advantages and you're better off having both available to you. When it comes to live walleye bait, minnows, leeches, and night crawlers will work best. Generally minnows work best in cooler water (spring and fall), leeches in warmer, and night crawlers in either. You should experiment, however, with all three regardless of when you are walleye fishing.

Plastic substitutes are nice because they require less maintenance and can be just as effective as live bait. This will make it more comfortable on your hands when the weather is chilly and you don't want to be fumbling with minnows.


Of course, you still need to find the fish. Electronic fish finders can be a fisherman's best friend. Once you've found them and your lure is in the water, you should vary the lure motion on your retrieve. First, let the walleye lure sink all the way down. Try popping it off the bottom then let it sink, dragging the fishing lure along the bottom with subtle shakes, and slowly lifting and dropping it as you reel in. These methods take some practice to perfect but will help make your fishing lure look more natural and attractive to 'the big one'.

Promotion takes bite out of kids' dental woes

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) - Parents are being urged to "brush up on the facts" to keep their kids' teeth healthy.

In honour of Dental Health Month, the Timiskaming Health Unit is joining its counterparts across Ontario and the Ontario Association of Public Health Dentistry (OAPHD) in an awareness campaign.

"When kids have dental pain, it is more than just having a cavity," said Ryan Peters, the health unit's oral health manager, in a media release.

"Children need to keep their teeth healthy for their overall health."

The health unit notes that cavities are not only painful, but can also affect children's ability to chew properly, pay attention at school and enjoy activities and impact their sense of self-esteem.

The health unit recommends that children visit a dental professional at least once a year to prevent problems from starting.

"Get dental issues checked immediately, regardless if they have 'baby teeth or 'adult teeth."

To reduce the risk of dental problems, the health unit recommends limiting sugary snacks and drinks and helping children brush and floss
