Englehart, Kirkland Lake hospitals enhancing services

ENGLEHART – A new CT scanner and upgraded intensive care suite in Kirkland Lake are expected to shorten wait times for patients and save money, says the CEO of the Kirkland Lake and Englehart hospitals.

"We believe this investment will save lives while also improving long-term outcomes for the population we serve," said Gary Sims.

A \$3.2 million donation from Kirkland Lake Gold will cover the full cost of the equipment and upgrades.

Sims said the project has been some two years in the making.

At this time, patients from both hospitals must travel outside the area, often to Temiskaming Hospital, for a diagnostic CT scan.

The costs of transporting patients and dedicating staff to accompany them to outside facilities are borne by the hospitals, he said.

That has put a stress on the resources of Englehart and District Hospital, he said.

He said those costs will now be reduced, in light of the full integration now underway between the Kirkland Lake and Englehart hospitals.

"It actually saves the hospital money," he said.

For Temiskaming as a whole, he said a second CT scanner in the district should help cut wait times for patients.

CT scans are considered essential diagnostic tools by incoming surgeons, he said.

When a patient must be transported out of the area for the scan and then brought back for the actual surgery, "you're losing hours and hours of what could be critical time."

When the new equipment is in place, the scans will throughout the district.

Kirkland and District Hospital currently has one general surgeon and several specialist surgeons, for example, who visit regularly.


Sims would like to see surgical services expanded, and said the hospital has been in discussions over the addition of a second anaesthetist.

Temagami firefighters were contacted around 2:15 p.m. April 16, said Temagami Fire Chief Jim Sanderson.

He said the property owner looked outside and saw his ATV, which was parked just inside the garage, was on fire.

"By the time we got there, it was fully engulfed," he said.

About eight Temagami firefighters responded to the call, and a water shuttle was requested from the Marten River department.

No one was injured in the blaze.

Irritable Bowel Syndrome

Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS) is a chronic, often debilitating, disorder with symptoms that include abdominal pain, bloating, constipation or diarrhea. It's estimated that IBS affects 13-20% of Canadians at any given time.

Thirty Second IBS Test

- Have you had discomfort or pain anywhere in your abdomen 2-3 times or more during the past 3 months?
- Does the discomfort or pain sometimes get better after a bowel movement?
- Is the discomfort or pain associated with a change in the frequency of bowel movements?
- Is the discomfort or pain sometimes associated with constipation or

If you answered NO to any of these questions, then it's likely you do not

If you answered YES to ALL of these questions, then you might have IBS. There are a number of treatment options available to decrease or eliminate your symptoms and improve your quality of life.

As the symptoms of IBS are varied and there are no organic tests to determine specifically whether a person has IBS, part of the diagnostic process is to rule out other known disease. Typically, a health care provider will take a medical history, do a physical examination, and investigative testing – for example, gastroscopy and/or colonoscopy, routine blood and stool tests.

Over time, with understanding and compliance with a treatment plan, many people with IBS can look forward to a significant improvement in their

City reviewing out-oftown user fees

TEMISKAMING SHORES -The city is looking into the possibility of establishing fees for the use of municipal services and facilities by out-of-town residents.

Temiskaming Shores council directed municipal staff to provide information to council to further discussion.

The move was initiated April 3 by Mayor Carman Kidd.

In a memo to council, he said the district's social services board system "fairly charges" for services like ambulances, social housing and Ontario Works.

But he pointed to other regional services, such as libraries, arenas, the Waterfront Pool/ Fitness Centre, the Northdale Manor and the Earlton-Timiskaming Regional Airport.

They "are being used by all, but the costs are not shared evenly," he continued.

The methods it involves require more hands on deck to control the spread of weeds and combat pests, for example. Finally, organic farming offers consumers food choices (dairy products, maple syrup, fruits and vegetables, meat, cereals, etc.) that are healthy, nutritious and delicious! What more can you ask for?

About 3,800 people were estimated to have attended the

higher turnout at the Earlton two-day show, up from 3,100-plus last year.

"It was awesome," said Norm Koch, chair of the organizing committee.

Koch said organizers did more promotion in Quebec in the lead-up to the April 13-14 show.

That led to more Quebec visitors, including some who reported dropping by for the first time.

But attendance from the Verner area and even Southern Ontario, among both vendors and visitors, was also up, he said.

A Saturday morning breakfast, which paid tribute to the late Ron Wight as a leader in the Temiskaming agricultural scene, drew some 360 people.

An estimated 340 turned out for a kickoff luncheon Friday.

And as for the weather, he acknowledged that conditions were too wintry to be on the land, but favourable for coming to the show.

Among the visitors on the Friday were an estimated 450 students from École catholique Assomption in Earlton, Kerns Public, Englehart Public and Holy Family in Englehart.

The arena of the Earlton Recreation Centre was filled with more than 60 booths from agribusinesses and organizations.

There was also a chance for non-farming visitors to catch a glimpse of calves, sheep, goats, chickens and rabbits.

Koch said this year's show had the benefit of a number of "excellent, excellent" high school volunteers who helped throughout the two-day

Several organizations, businesses and government agencies took advantage of the show to host info sessions.

Topics ranged from new farm equipment and sheep industry programs to funding opportunities under the new Canadian Agricultural Partnership program.


