## Job openings Cobalt discusses two

# new department heads

COBALT - Cobalt town council is preparing to hire two department heads.

The town will be looking for a new chief administrative officer and a public works director.

At a special council meeting Tuesday, July 31, council reviewed the job description for the public works director.

Councillor George Othmer wanted to ensure that existing public works staff would be able to apply for the position, to which Mayor Tina Sartoretto replied that anyone could submit an application, although the position would be a nonunion one.

Othmer stated that would be understood. He suggested the "working conditions" description should be altered from "may be required" to "must" for attending evening meetings, and emergency situations.

Sartoretto agreed that altering that wording would be all right.

Sartoretto suggested the job opening should be posted in the first week of August. But she added that the closing date would be after a new chief administrative officer

was in place.

### **FINANCING QUESTIONED**

Councillor Perry Wuest commented that he thinks the job description is "pretty standard," but he questioned the financing that has been put in place for the position.

He noted that \$70,000 has been put into the 2019 budget for the position, and pointed out that would include the benefits package.

"We may need a staff report on this," he

But chief administrative officer Michelle Larose said that "salaries have been rejigged." She said that if council wanted to discuss the salary allocation, she had provided "some calculations for council to discuss in closed session."

Wuest expressed concern about ensuring an appropriate contract. He stated that a local lawyer had said the last contract signed was the worst contract ever signed.

"We do need a contract and we need a good one."

Sartoretto responded, "the contract we prepare for both positions will be vetted by this council." She added that the contract Continued on 5a

### IMPORTANT NOTICE TO TAXPAYER

Legislation related to the amount of time that property taxes have to be owing before the municipality can start the tax sale process has changed from three (3) years to two (2) years.

What this means is that a property cannot have taxes owing for more than current taxes plus one year. The legislation allows action to be taken if any portion of the prior year taxes are owing, the full amount billed does not have to be outstanding before the collection process can begin.

For example, if a property has taxes owing for 2017 (any amount) and 2018, then the municipality can proceed with the collection process of registering a lien on the property for the amount of the tax arrears on January 1, 2019.

Letters have been mailed out to all properties that will be affected by the updated legislation. In order to avoid a lien being registered on a property, the property taxes for all prior years up to and including 2017, plus all applicable penalty and interest charges would be required to be paid in full by December 31, 2018. The City wishes to advise that it will be utilizing the new legislation and its collection processes to their full

We understand that a lump sum payment to clear the prior year taxes may not be feasible for all property owners; however, I would urge you to contact the undersigned to discuss payment arrangements.

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# Remembering Korean War Veterans Day

Every year in Canada, July 27 is known as National Korean War Veterans Day.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau issued the following statement:

"In 1950, just five years after the end of the Second World War, Communist armies from the North crossed the 38th Parallel and invaded South Korea. Today, we remember the thousands of brave Canadians - many answering the call of duty for a second time who fought in the Korean War and defended the sovereignty of South Korea.

"Over the course of more than three years, the Korean War claimed millions of lives, many of them civilians, as the North and its communist allies attempted to gain control of the South.

"Canada was one of 16 United Nations member countries to deploy combat forces in support of South Korea. Nearly 27,000 Canadians put their lives on the line to repel the invasion, restore peace, and protect democracy and freedom.

"Canadians served on land, in the air, and at sea, and often fought in conditions that recalled the horrors of the First World War. Frontlines deteriorated into trench warfare.


"Soldiers endured extreme and unpredictable weather as dangerous as the enemy. They fell asleep with water up to their chest, after monsoon rains melted their trenches into sludge and muck. During the winter months, they faced the constant threat of frostbite and hypothermia as bitter cold jammed weapons and turned rations into ice.

"Sixty-five years ago today, an armistice brought active fighting in the war to an end. Thousands of Canadians soon returned home, bearing the physical and emotional scars of war. Over 500 Canadians made the ultimate sacrifice. They are honoured in the Books of Remembrance in the Memorial Chamber of the Peace Tower on Parliament Hill - their names inscribed alongside those of more than 118,000 others who have died in service to and defence of our country.

"We must never forget those who gave their lives to help restore peace. We must never forget their courage. We must never forget that, thanks to the efforts of our troops and allies, South Korea today is a prosperous nation and a dear friend to Canada.

"On behalf of the Government of Canada, I invite all Canadians to learn more about the Korean War, participate in activities that honour our Veterans, and take time to reflect on our country's contributions to peace and freedom around the world. Active service members, Veterans, and their families - during the Korean War and continuing to this day - have given so much to protect and defend the values that we hold dear.

"We will remember them."

# Fiery future?

It is a fact. North America is burning up this summer as hot, dry conditions per-

From California to British Columbia to Parry Sound and the Temiskaming region, forest fires have grabbed our atten-

Environment Canada senior climatologist Dave Philipps spoke recently about the forest fires and climate change, warning people to get used to hot temperatures as the future looks fiery and hot for planet earth.

He said across Canada, the average summertime temperature has increased by 1.5 degrees above the 1961-1990 average. Winter is even more dramatic at a 3.4 C rise.

He says the earth hasn't warmed up in a dramatic fashion, but it is steadily warming, making it much more easy to ignore the increased temperatures.

By July 15, at least 70 people had died in Quebec from heat related complica-

Is this the summer that climate change finally gets real?

Despite the scorching hot summer we are experiencing, the same basic advice from the world's scientists regarding climate change still exists - to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and make changes to reduce the adverse impacts of a thinning ozone layer.

The switch from fossil fuel consumption to green energy initiatives has been slow.

Would impending elections then need to focus on serious climate change related legislation and action?

Aside from doing what each one of us can do to minimize our footprint, it is important to support greener initiatives.

And let's not get complacent with the idea that if it doesn't sound like it will affect us during our lifetime then we shouldn't worry about it.

# 3uck-a-beer

The brain trust at Queen's Park, the new Progressive Conservative government, is creating a buck-a-beer program.

Do Doug Ford and his counterparts know that alcoholism ruins lives and that it further costs the Ontario taxpayers billions (\$5 billion annually) in alcohol related costs?

While most Ontario adults drink safely, about one-quarter engage in high-risk drinking and one in ten binge drink every week, says the Canadian Institute for Health Information.

for the public works director "will be vetted by the incoming CAO."

### **HIRING COMMITTEE**

Rochelle Councillor Schwartz asked about a hiring committee.

Sartoretto said the hiring committee for the public works director position will include Councillor Mike Harrison, Sartoretto and the incoming clerk.

Othmer suggested that because the person coming in will be an acting chief administrative officer, additional council person should be on the hiring committee.

Sartoretto proposed that "the person we end up hiring (for the CAO position) may want to contribute to this conversation."

Council has now entered a "lame-duck" period (prior to the appointment of a new council in December) during which a council's abilities are limited, including the hiring of new staff.

Larose said the clerk would sign off on the contract with the public works director, but that is usually with consultation with council.

Wuest also brought up a concern that the town does not have a vehicle for a new public works director. The integration of the public works director into the staff was raised as a concern by Wuest, suggesting preparations should be made.

"It takes this council six months to buy a new pen."

He said training also needs to be considered.

"I think your comments are a little cavalier," said Sartoretto.

"This council spends a lot of thoughtful time deliberating." She said the details will be

pursued. Othmer asked if the council would be allowed to see the applications for the public works director position and

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## City resident on college exec committee

TIMMINS (Special) - A Temiskaming Shores resident will serve as first vice-chair of Northern College's board of governors' executive committee.

Doug Walsh, public works director for the City of Temiskaming Shores, was recently elected a member of the committee.

"Northern College is very fortunate to attract the calibre of individuals who volunteer their time and energies that contribute to the growth and progressive nature of our college," said Fred Gibbons, Northern's president and CEO, in a news release.

In addition to "the invaluable private and public sector skills and experience" each brings to the board of governors, this year's executive committee has 10 years of combined service on the board itself, Gibbons continued.

The college said Walsh's 18 years of municipal service in the city and the region give him an important appreciation of the training and education needs in the college's southernmost region.

The executive committee is chaired by George Pirie, who has worked in an executive capacity in the mining industry for more than 18 years.

Domenic Rizzuto, second vice-chair, serves as the human resources manager at Goldcorp Canada Ltd., Porcupine Gold Mines

Carly Stringer, governor at large, is the principal practicing lawyer at Stringer Law, located in Timmins, focusing on employment, commercial and governance law.

"One of our main priorities will be to find ways, as is the case with other colleges in the North, to increase domestic student enrolment at our four campuses," said Pirie.

Hepatitis is an inflammation of the liver. It can be caused by viruses and can lead to serious health consequences. There are a number of different forms of the virus, but the most common types of viral hepatitis in Canada are hepatitis A, B and C all of which are contagious.

### How Do You Get Hepatitis?

The Hepatitis A Virus (HAV) is spread through contact with the feces (poop) of an infected person either directly (person to person, including sexual activity) or indirectly through food or water that's been contaminated with the virus. Spread through infected blood or blood products has also been reported. There is no medication available to treat Hepatitis A but most people recover on their own.

The Hepatitis B (HBV) and C (HCV) viruses are spread through contact with contaminated blood, but Hepatitis B is also sexually transmitted. Both viruses can lead to serious liver damage, liver cancer and the need for liver transplantation. In Canada, about 600,000 people are living with Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C.

### What are the Symptoms?

Not everyone who becomes infected shows symptoms. Regardless of the type of hepatitis virus infection, the symptoms are similar:

- · Jaundice (yellowing of the skin and eyes)
- Fatigue (feeling tired)
- Loss of appetite (not feeling hungry)
- Stomach pain
- Dark urine
- Nausea Vomiting
- Joint pain

### What Can You Do To Reduce Your Risk of Infection?

- Wash your hands properly before and after preparing and eating food;
- Practise safe sex (such as using a condom);
- · Do not share personal materials that may come into contact with blood (such as needles, razors, toothbrushes, nail clippers, etc.)

Changing behaviours that increase risk is key to protecting yourself from infection and to preventing the spread of infection to others.



# Camp welding new career choices

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Where's the one location where you could find cowbells, steel flowers, and dog tag pendants?

For one week in July, that place was the metal fabrication shop at Timiskaming District Secondary School.

Nineteen students as young as 12 took in Mind over Metal, learning about welding and leaving with their steel creations.

It was the second year that the school had hosted the camp.

In 2017, it was reserved for girls. But by popular demand it was opened to boys this year, said instructor Chris Code.

Over five days, students learned the basics of welding, from safety practices to different techniques.

They took a field trip to NorArc near Earlton and learned about training opportunities at Northern College.

They also chatted via Skype with Jamie McMillan, an ironworker and boilermaker from Hamilton who co-founded KickAss Careers, which promotes the skilled trades.

And the cost of the course – including breakfasts and lunches, materials and safety gear – was covered by the CWB Welding Foundation.

One of the foundation's goals is addressing the shortage of welders.

When it comes to skilled trades, "I would use the word 'critical," said Code.

The foundation offered the first camp in 2014 as a pilot project. Last year, there were more than 50.

The camps expose young people to welding and the role it plays in daily life.

Steel is a constant presence, said Code, who summed it up this way:



# Electrical service upgrades coming to Bear Island

BEAR ISLAND (Special) – Electrical service upgrades are coming to Bear Island, thanks to FedNor support.

The Federal Economic Development Initiative for Northern Ontario recently pledged almost \$300,000 to enable the Temagami First Nation (TFN) to extend three-phase electrical services to Bear Island.

When complete, the upgrade will pave the way for a new multiuse facility now under construction as well as 17 new homes and a 10-unit elders' residence.

"We are pleased to partner with the Government of Canada through FedNor to further position the Temagami First Nation as open for business," said Chief Arnold Paul in a statement at the time of the July 17 announcement.

"Today's announcement clearly demonstrates that the federal government

recognizes the unique needs of Indigenous communities by investing in our social and economic future," he continued.

"By assisting the community to deliver on this strategic infrastructure initiative, we are helping to strengthen the economic outlook for all Indigenous families and businesses in the region," said Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Anthony Rota at that time.

He made the announcement on behalf of Navdeep Bains, the minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development with responsibility for FedNor.

In a statement, Bains said the targeted investment "will support a strong economy by helping to maximize social and economic opportunities in Temagami First Nation."




# BCATING
