# Attention for Albert

#### City seeking help for street reconstruction

TEMISKAMING SHORES – The city is making a bid for provincial funding to offset the cost of reconstructing Albert Street in Haileybury.

It is applying for almost \$1.35 million in top-up support from the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) for the work.

The total estimated cost of the long-awaited project is \$3.07 million.

It would see the reconstruction of about 570 metres of Albert Street, including the underground infrastructure as well as the road surface, from Rorke Avenue to Bruce Street.

It would also extend the STATO trail from Georgina Avenue to Bruce.

"It's probably one of the worst roads in the whole city," said Mayor Carman Kidd after Temiskaming Shores council met August 14.

The city is not guaranteed the funding. Its application in 2017 for more than \$1 million in top-up OCIF funding for general road improvement projects was turned down.

But Kidd said it's typically been successful in its ing process could begin. funding applications every other year.

#### ATTENTION ALL TEMISKAMING SHORES RESIDENTS

The City of Temiskaming Shores would like to advise all residents that the municipal fire ban that has been in place since July 5, 2018 has been lifted.

Although open air fires are now permitted, the Fire Department would like to remind everyone to use extreme caution when burning. The Fire Department would also remind all residents of the

- Burning permits are required for any open air burning in
- No open-air burning is permitted between the hours of 8:00am
- · Only burn during the coolest and calmest time of the day. Don't even consider burning when it is windy;
- · Keep your fire small, only burn what you can effectively control;
- You may only burn dry woody type materials. You may not burn grass, garbage, petroleum products, plastics, rubber or anything that will cause excessive smoke:
- · Respect your neighbour, don't burn where smoke will bother your neighbour or blow across roadways and hamper visibility;
- · Stay with your fire, you must take all necessay steps to tend the fire, keep it under control, and make sure it is extinguished before leaving the site. A responsible person (18 years of age or older) must be present to supervise the fire at all times

#### IMPORTANT NOTICE TO TAXPAYER

Legislation related to the amount of time that property taxes have to be owing before the municipality can start the tax sale process has changed from three (3) years to two (2)

What this means is that a property cannot have taxes owing for more than current taxes plus one year. The legislation allows action to be taken if any portion of the prior year taxes are owing, the full amount billed does not have to be outstanding before the collection process can begin.

For example, if a property has taxes owing for 2017 (any amount) and 2018, then the municipality can proceed with the collection process of registering a lien on the property for the amount of the tax arrears on January 1, 2019.

Letters have been mailed out to all properties that will be affected by the updated legislation. In order to avoid a lien being registered on a property, the property taxes for all prior years up to and including 2017, plus all applicable penalty and interest charges would be required to be paid in full by December 31, 2018. The City wishes to advise that it will be utilizing the new legislation and its collection processes to their full extent.

We understand that a lump sum payment to clear the prior year taxes may not be feasible for all property owners; however, I would urge you to contact the undersigned to discuss payment arrangements.





## 17th Foire gourmande offering tasty regional treats

VILLE-MARIE (Staff) - This weekend's foodie event on the shores of Lake Temiskaming will have an Italian flair.

Stefano Faita is the special guest chef at the 17th edition of the Foire gourmande de l'Abitibi-Témiscamingue et du Nord-Est ontarien in Ville-Marie.

Faita is a TV personality, cookbook author and the co-owner of three restaurants in Montreal.

But he began his career selling vegetables in the Jean Talon market in Montreal and helping his mother at her cooking school.

He'll prepare a fresh pasta dinner for diners who have reserved a seat.

He's also among the experts leading classes in, for example, pasta, wine, beer, and pastry prep.

It's all part of this year's Foire gourmande, where more than 40 exhibitors from the region and beyond will provide samples of their wares.

Exhibitors from the Ontario side of the border include Bison du Nord of Earlton and Leisure Farms of Sturgeon Falls.

The Northern Ontario Farm Innovation Alliance (NOFIA), which is headquartered in New Liskeard, and Northeast Bites, which provides a guide to the region's restaurants, producers, farmers' markets and food-related events, will also be on

In addition to the food, there will be live music, children's entertainers and activities, and a tent for artisans.

Admission is free. However, a \$6 electronic bracelet must be purchased and then loaded with cash to buy food, drink and crafts.

The Foire opens Friday, August 17, at 5 p.m., with the final band taking to the stage after midnight.

It reopens Saturday, August 18, at 11 a.m., with the music continuing past 12:30

It runs Sunday, August 19, from 11 p.m. until 5 p.m.

A free shuttle is also available from New Liskeard.

It departs from the Don Shepherdson Memorial Arena, making one round trip on Friday, two on Saturday and one on Sunday.

#### Momentous days

Two occasions of national significance were marked on August 15: National Acadian Day as well as National Liberation Day in Korea where Canadians fought valiantly from 1950-53.

#### **ACADIAN DAY**

Pablo Rodriguez, the Minister of Canadian Heritage and Multiculturalism and Mélanie Joly, the Minister of Tourism, Official Languages and La Francophonie, remarked on National Acadian Day August 15.

"The Great Upheaval, which began in 1755, saw thousands of Acadians deported by the British, who set fire to their homes and confiscated their land.

"This dark chapter of our history could have wiped out this culture forever, were it not for the courage, strength and determination of the Acadian people.

"Over 250 years later, Acadians from all walks of life are celebrated across the country and around the world for their artistic, cultural, sport and economic achievements. Acadia is recognized everywhere in Canada and the Francophonie for its cultural vitality, as well as its natural beauty."

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau added:

"Acadians hold a special place in our country's history and in our Canadian identity. Among the first French settlers in North America, the Acadians were the victims of persecution for centuries. But in the face of deportation, exile, and oppression, they showed resilience, courage, and determination. Against great odds, Acadians worked together to defend their culture, promote their language, and build prosperous communities.

"Today, Acadians remain proud of their heritage and deeply rooted in their culture. Many continue to live off the land and the waters around them, while others continue to succeed across various industries, on both the national and international stage."

#### **KOREAN LIBERATION**

Also on August 15, the Prime Minister recognized the National Liberation Day of Korea.

"Today, Koreans around the world celebrate the 73rd National Liberation Day of Korea. This day in 1945 marked the end of the Second World War and set South Korea on a path that ultimately allowed it to become the vibrant democracy and prosperous country that it is today.

"This is also an occasion to celebrate the close bonds that unite Canada and South Korea - bonds forged as Canadian forces fought alongside South Koreans to protect their freedom during the Korean War."

From 1950 through 1953, Canadian service members fought for freedom in Korea then remained to support peace in the years that followed.

More than 26,000 Canadians served in the war and 516 of those brave Canadians gave their lives in their determination to bring the dangerous conflict to an end.

# Thornloe Cheese tops awards

HARLEY - New and unique products have earned Thornloe Cheese another accolade.

The dairy processor is one of only five recipients in the country of a 2018 Leadership Award, presented by Food in Canada magazine in partnership with Grant Thornton LLP.

Thornloe Cheese joins a gluten-free bakery in British Columbia, a microgreens grower in the Hamilton area, a coldpressed juice producer in Toronto, and a manufacturer of meat products in Edmonton on the awards list.

"It is very clear that these Canadian producers understand where their industries and markets are evolving and trending," said James Menzies, Grant Thornton's national manufacturing leader, in a statement announcing the winners.

Food in Canada, founded in 1937 and covering Canada's food and beverage processing industry, issued a call for award nominees early this year.

"We talked a bit about Thornloe's history, our ties with the community, the fact that all of our milk is local, that it's a unique agricultural region, and we try to promote that," said Thornloe Cheese business administrator Lace Laframboise.

Thornloe Cheese received the 2018 Community and Industry Leadership Award.

#### **INNOVATION**

Laframboise said the award recognizes Thornloe Cheese's focus on innovation.

It produces a number of specialty cheeses, which are named for Temiskaming townships and landmarks.

Last fall, it launched Canada's first Dairy Farmers of Ontario-verified line of cheeses from grass-fed milk.

Six Temiskaming farms are currently supplying milk that meets criteria grass-fed status.

Evaluation criteria included cows' diet, for example, must business growth, innovation, come from forages and grass. Cattle must also have access to outdoor grazing at least 120 days each year.

#### **Summer Safe Food Handling Tips**

Picnic and BBQ season bring lots of opportunities for outdoor fun with family and friends, but with the warm weather also comes opportunities for foodborne bacteria to thrive. As food heats up in the summer temperatures, bacteria can quickly multiply.

#### **Pack and Transport Food Safely**

- Keep cold food cold place it in a cooler with ice or frozen gel packs.
- Organize cooler contents. Pack drinks separately, that way as you open and reopen the drink cooler, the perishable foods won't be exposed to warm temperatures
- Keep coolers closed. Limit the number of times the cooler is opened. This helps to keep the contents cold longer.
- Don't cross contaminate. Be sure to keep raw meat, poultry, and seafood securely wrapped. This keeps their juices from contaminating prepared/cooked foods or foods that will be eaten raw, such as fruits and vegetables.
- Clean produce. Rinse fresh fruits and vegetables under running tap water before packing them in the cooler. Dry them with a clean cloth towel or paper towel.

#### Safe Grilling Tips

- Marinate safely in the refrigerator never on the kitchen counter or outdoors. Don't reuse marinade.
- Cook food thoroughly. Have your food thermometer ready. Always use it to be sure your food is cooked thoroughly.
- Don't reuse platters or utensils. Using the same platter or utensils that you previously used for raw meat, poultry or seafood allows bacteria to spread to the cooked food. Instead, have a clean platter and utensils ready to serve your food.
- Check for foreign objects in food. If you clean your grill with a bristle brush, check to make sure that no detached bristles have made their way into your food.

#### **Outdoor Hand Cleaning**

If you don't have access to running water, use a water jug, some soap, and paper towels or consider using moist disposable towelettes for cleaning your





It's producing 10,000 sticks of grass-fed butter a week, she said. Together, the new products mean that the plant will increase the volume of local milk it processes this year to some five million litres, up from three to 3.5 million litres in 2017.

To handle milk dedicated to the grass-fed products, it has invested in new equipment, storage tanks and staff training.

"It's all very exciting," Laframboise said.

#### **HISTORY**

Thornloe Cheese traces its roots to 1940 and the opening of a cheese plant first in the village of Thornloe.

In 2006, it faced closure by then-owner Parmalat.

It was purchased by Gencor, a farmer-owned cattle genetics coop now known as EastGen, early in 2007.

It has 25 full-time employees with additional workers hired in the summer.

Wood herself has hopes that the physical facility itself will one
