# **Planting** the seed for new business growth

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The city has rezoned some properties to open their use to marijuana production facilities.

Temiskaming Shores council approved the rezoning earlier this week of three parcels of land zoned for manufacturing industrial use.

They're located in the Dymond Industrial Park; an area west of New Liskeard bordered by highways 11 and 65 West and the Ontario Northland tracks; and a small parcel at the northeast intersection of Hwy. 11 and Radley Hill Road.

It applies only to properties on municipal water and sewer services.

The city has been approached by a company proposing a medical marijuana growing operation.

But that wasn't the only marijuana-related item on council's January

It also threw its formal support behind a local proposal for an education program on the safe consumption of marijuana edibles.

Haileybury business owner Nicole Guertin has drafted what she's calling the Can Eat Smart initiative.

It would be directed at first-time users of edibles who are unfamiliar with cannabis.

An online course in multiple languages would offer consumers information on types of cannabis, doses, cooking, safe consumption and safe

"The key to the program is to have the Can Eat Smart poster in each establishment that will be selling cannabis and edibles," Guertin told council.

Online sales sites would also link to the program.

The inspiration for the program came when Guertin recently tried a cookie for the first time that included marijuana.





She shared her story at a public meeting last month when council sought feedback on the question of permitting recreational marijuana retail stores in the municipality.

Guertin said her experience was a frightening

"Imagine a child eating that same cookie, which could happen easily. How scary it could be for them," she said at the time.

But it prompted her to draft a business proposal for the initiative in the lead-up to the anticipated federal approval for cannabis edible products later this year.

She plans to submit the strategy to the Health Canada committee reviewing edibles by the February 20 deadline for comment.

She hoped to include formal expressions of support from the municipality and Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities.

"Hopefully we can be a leader in the North, in Ontario, and in Canada," she said earlier this week.

Council gave its endorsement and agreed to forward it to other municipalities in the North for support.

# How to Fight Muscle Loss (Sarcopenia) Due to Aging

From the time you are born to around the time you turn 30, your muscles grow larger and stronger. But at some point in your 30s, you start to lose muscle mass and function.

Physically inactive people can lose as much as 3 to 5% of their muscle mass each decade after the age of 30.

# Symptoms and Causes:

Although sarcopenia is seen mostly in people who are inactive, there are other factors including:

- Reduction in the nerve cells responsible for sending signals from the brain to the muscle to start movement
- A decrease in the ability to turn protein into energy
- Not getting enough calories or protein each day to sustain muscle mass

In keeping with Oliver's famous defiant quote, "It is my life and I can do with it what I please."

Her prose has allowed me to understand connecting with nature is more powerful than conquering nature.

I have often felt the same as her, astonished by the beauty of a sunset, amazed by a fox's inquisitive gaze and astounded by a simple walk in a forest cano-

She said, "Instructions for living a life. Pay attention. Be astonished. Tell about it."

Oliver said stillness was the door to the temple. When I sit in my canoe on still waters I feel the holiness of nature. I am amazed when the great blue heron lands close by me searching in the marsh for its dinner.

I only ever wish to pay attention to my life, to be astonished by it and to tell about it.

And when Oliver asked, "What is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?" I hope to say plenty.

A quote of hers, "When it is over, I want to say I was a bride married to amazement."

Her words describe the beauty of life, the ordinary everyday things we don't notice because we are distracted by technology.

I refuse to allow technology (cell phone) to follow me around a green shoreline with the haunting sound of the loon calling in a far off bay.

One of my most pleasurable moments last summer was sitting quietly in my canoe hearing the wind whispering through the pine trees high up on the ridge. This sound is called psithurism.

Oliver knew nature and language share the same sheets, they have the power to unite, astound and inspire.



# Earlton water treatment plant upgrades started

EARLTON (Staff) - Capital improvements have started at the Earlton water treatment plant.

The work started Wednesday, January 23, and will continue through to March 29, according to a press release received from Armstrong Township.

"The capital improvement is necessary to refurbish the purification and filtration components within the Earlton drinking water treatment plant," the press release stated.

The current unit is badly corroded and the rehabilitation will increase its life, the township stated.

"The alternative option was the full replacement of the filter system and although this would extend the life greatly, a modification to the building and structure would be necessary to accommodate a new system," it was explained. "The alternative was well beyond the budget of the project, thus not a feasible option."

The release explained that "the system is a Roberts Pacer Pre-Packaged Water System with a two-part filter. One filter will be isolated during construction while the other is able to adequately service the town. We do not foresee any disruption in service, however it is recommended to conserve water where possible."

The township stated that Continental Carbon Group Inc. from Stoney Creek, Ontario, has been hired as the contractor for the project at an estimated cost of \$242,400.

The municipality has applied under the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund Top-Up Fund with approval pending. If successful in their application, the OCIF fund will cover up to 90 per cent of the costs.

The township stated that in the event that the provincial application is denied, the municipality will use its federal gas tax revenues to fund the majority of the project costs.



# **Police arrest** two youths

**TEMISKAMING SHORES** (Staff) - Two youths were arrested after police were informed that people were going through vehicles on Farah Avenue in New Liskeard.

Temiskaming Ontario Provincial Police say they responded to a call January 13 shortly before 1:30 a.m.

A 13-year-old and a 15-yearold were arrested.

In a news release, police reminded the public that a professional thief can steal a vehicle in just 30 seconds, without having a key.

Police say an unsecured home is just as vulnerable and described an unlocked door or an open window as "an invitation to thieves."

The Lock It or Lose It program encourages drivers to take a few simple steps to protect their vehicles and their contents.

Keep valuables out of sight. If you have to leave them in the before you park at your final destination.

Always park your vehicle in a well-lit area.

Never leave your vehicle unattended while it is running.

Lock your doors at all times.

# MPAC raising fee for service

COBALT (Staff) - The Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) levy to Cobalt is increasing 2.1 per cent.

Cobalt interim chief administrative officer David King told council that the quarterly fee, paid every three months, will now be \$4,240.

MPAC provides a service to the town by calculating the assessments of the properties in the town.

Through those assessments the town determines how much each of the properties should pay in taxes.

"Every municipality in Ontario pays for that," he said of the levy.

He noted that the town is being advised by MPAC that there will be assessment changes by property class.

"It's down slightly in some categories," he said, explaining that could affect the amount the town can levy for taxes.



# **Cobalt still seeking** solution for Hoist Room

COBALT - Cobalt Mayor George Othmer says he is continuing to work to find a solution for the Hoist Room in the town.

A large collection of gym equipment is now lying idle in the upstairs location of the former Cobalt arena, where it had been operating up until this fall.

With the new ownership of the building, the Hoist Room has now closed and the town has been seeking a new loca-

The town has also been negotiating with the owner of the Cobalt arena about the costs associated with the Hoist Room's current location.

At the town's Tuesday, January 22, meeting, council was given a spreadsheet of the Hoist Room costs and revenue over the years. The spreadsheets revealed that the Hoist Room area has always been a positive revenue generator. However, that

fact was questioned by some Room. councillors who pointed to the costs associated with the rest of the arena area, and suggested that those costs should be included in the Hoist Room costs.

Councillor Mike Harris said the ice plant at the arena has been shut down for years, and all costs associated with the entire building should be viewed as Hoist Room costs.

"We're in the hole," he said of the gym's costs.

But Othmer emphasized his goal "to provide facilities for the people of this community." He added that "there is a motion on the books" to retain the Hoist Room equipment.

Councillor Angela Adshead sought clarification that the town is no longer heating the

Councillor Bill Gabbani said he agreed with the goal of keeping the Hoist Room equipment if possible.

### "PEOPLE ASKING"

He said, "people are asking" about the future of the Hoist

Othmer told council he was scheduled to meet with the owner of the building January 23. He said he plans "on entertaining every possibility."

One option that has been put forward is for the lighter equipment to be moved to the former doctor's office next to the municipal office area.

Othmer said that if that is the best option the town can find, that will be the option it will take.

Councillor Matthew Johnson stated that municipalities usually run deficits with recreational facilities. He said that he is "in agreement that we should exhaust all opportunities" to re-establish the Hoist Room.

Councillor Doug Wilcox said the numbers presented regarding past years of the Hoist Room operation "look promis-

Adshead emphasized, though, that the solution for the Hoist Room "needs to be in a handicap accessible location."

# Haileybury arena renaming proposed

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – The Haileybury figure skating community is proposing that the Haileybury arena be renamed in honour of a long-time coach.

The sudden death of Shelley Herbert-Shea in September at the age of 59 "was felt by our entire community," wrote Amanda Quehe in a letter to Temiskaming Shores council.

She was writing on behalf of Haileybury figure skating coaching staff, executives, skaters and their parents.

"Shelley dedicated most of her life to her love of skating and her presence in the coaching world at all of our local arenas will be greatly missed," Quehe wrote.

She said Herbert-Shea spent "countless hours coaching and mentoring" local youth.

She had been involved in figure skating programs in both New Liskeard and Haileybury as well as working with minor hockey organizations.

"She was also known for her longstanding community volunteer work in the annual Fall Fair Harvest Queen contest," Quehe wrote.

"In short, Shelley dedicated herself to building our youth up, she made every kid feel like they were something special and we feel her lifelong dedication to our community merits the renaming of the Haileybury arena in her honour."

She said the club would seek local sponsors to cover any costs associated with changing signage at the arena if the renaming is approved.

On December 19, Temiskaming Shores council referred the request to the city's senior management for review.

# Be safe and share the road with buses

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) - Some days there's a snow-break from school, but most days there are lots of buses on the road and police are reminding motorists to be cautious.

Despite red flashing lights and other safety equipment, police say that collisions with buses still occur.

Across the Northeast, Ontario Provincial Police responded to 29 collisions involving school buses between January 1, 2016, and September 1, 2017.

"Thankfully, there were no serious injuries sustained to any of the involved drivers or passengers," note police in a news release.

Police remind drivers that they must stop for a stopped school bus that has activated its overhead flashing red signal lights.

Failure to stop can result in a fine of \$400 to \$2,000 for a first offence and six demerit points on a driver's licence.

In Ontario, bus drivers and other witnesses can report vehicles that have illegally passed a school bus.

The same fines may be applied to the vehicle's registered owner.

Police note that school buses are 16 times safer than any other vehicle because of their design and safety features, and bus drivers also receive "extensive train-

But winter driving demands added attention, from both drivers and school bus passengers.

In Temiskaming, police note there are many rural bus routes that require the bus to stop on the highway.

"Drivers must remain alert for the morning and afternoon school bus stops and watch for the students who are let off at the roadside.

"Being inattentive can change lives forever."

Police remind motorists to remain a safe distance from a stopped school bus with flashing lights.

Extra caution is needed when blowing snow and cold weather exhaust reduce visibility, and winter roads demand increased stopping distances.

Drivers are also reminded to exercise extra caution in and around school zones.

Hoods and hats reduce children's peripheral vision.

"Slippery surfaces and snow banks add to the danger and a fall could put them in your vehicle's path," police

If a driver's morning route includes dropping off youngsters at school, police also advise added atten-

"With a car full of children, it's easy to become distracted. Choose your stopping area with care and do not impede school bus loading zones.

"If the drop-off area is congested park away from the school and walk your children to the school ground entrance."



TEMISKAMING SHORES - A New Liskeard high school grad and nursing student is headed to Tanzania in the spring, and hopes to raise some money to offset the cost of the trip.

Deseree Villneff will join her classmates on a two-week trip to the East African country in May.

"I like the idea of travelling for nursing, so I'm definitely excited for this experience to see if it's something I do want to continue to pursue," said Villneff in a phone interview.
